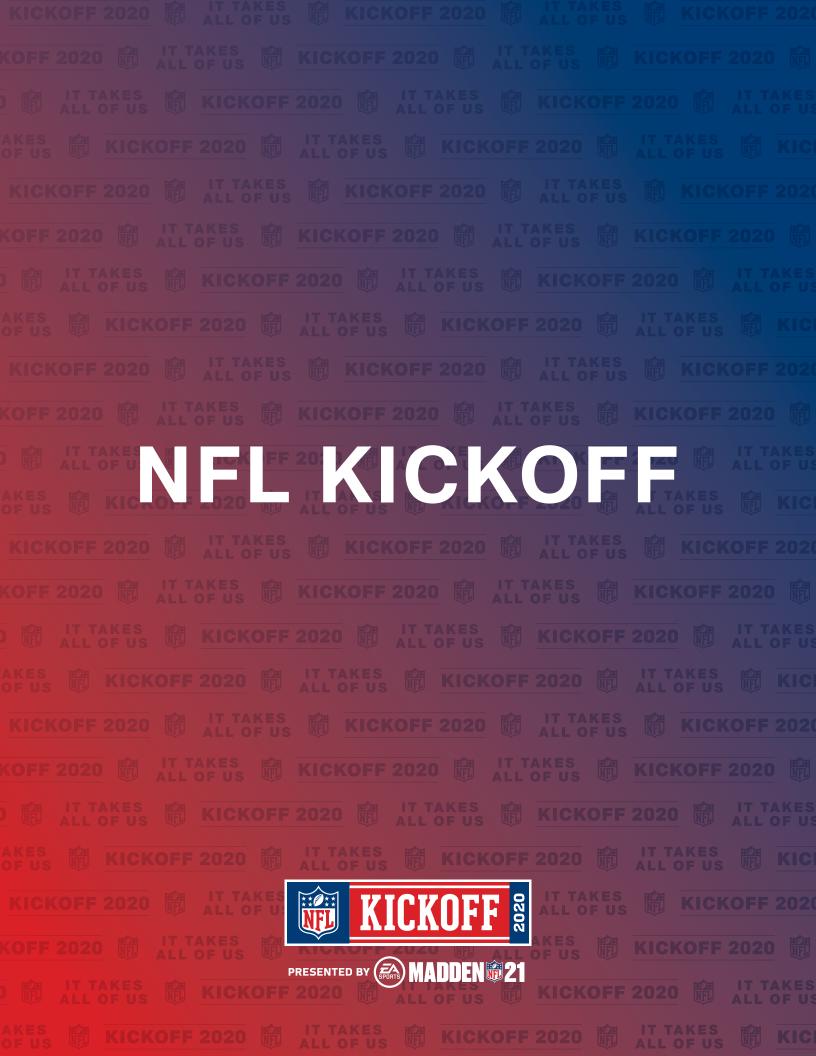




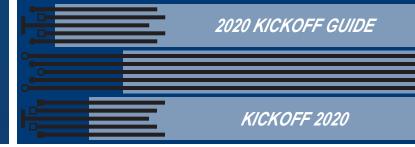

It's time to get "Back to Football!"

The 2020 season begins with the NFL's annual primetime kickoff game. The opener on Thursday, September 10 on NBC (8:20 PM ET) will feature the Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs hosting the Houston Texans at Arrowhead Stadium in a rematch of the 2019 AFC Divisional playoffs.

Kickoff Weekend begins on Thursday, September 10 in primetime on NBC as the defending Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs welcome Houston to Arrowhead Stadium. <u>Below is a sampling of notable active NFL Kickoff streaks:</u>

- The KANSAS CITY CHIEFS host the HOUSTON TEXANS during the opening game of Kickoff Weekend. The Chiefs have won their past five Kickoff Weekend games, the longest active streak in the AFC and tied for the longest active streak in the NFL.
- The defending AFC North champion BALTIMORE RAVENS, who visit the CLEVELAND BROWNS in Week 1, have won their last four Kickoff Weekend games, the AFC's second-longest active streak.
- The GREEN BAY PACKERS open their season on the road against the MINNESOTA VIKINGS.
 The Packers have won 57 games on Kickoff Weekend, the most in the NFL. Green Bay has won their past five Kickoff Weekend games while the Vikings enter the 2020 season having won their past four on Kickoff Weekend.
- The DALLAS COWBOYS visit the LOS ANGELES RAMS on Sunday Night Football in Week 1. With a winning percentage of .658 (39-20-1), the Cowboys own the best Kickoff Weekend winning percentage in the NFC.
- In the first of two *Monday Night Football* games on Kickoff Weekend, the **NEW YORK GIANTS** host the **PITTSBURGH STEELERS**. The Giants have 50 wins on Kickoff Weekend, third-most among all teams, while Pittsburgh's 43 wins on Kickoff Weekend are the most among AFC teams.
- The **DENVER BRONCOS**, who begin the season by hosting the **TENNESSEE TITANS** on *Monday Night Football*, have posted a .658 winning percentage (39-20-1) on Kickoff Weekend, the top mark in the AFC. Denver has won seven of its past eight Kickoff Weekend games.

HEAD COACHES: New England's BILL BELICHICK is 17-8 (.680) on Kickoff Weekend and his 17 wins are the most among active head coaches...Belichick and Kansas City's ANDY REID (13-8; .619) are the only active head coaches who have won at least 10 Kickoff Weekend games...Reid has won five consecutive games on Kickoff Weekend, the longest current streak among active head coaches... Philadelphia's DOUG PEDERSON (4-0), Los Angeles Rams' SEAN MCVAY (3-0), Denver's VIC FANGIO (1-0) and Green Bay's MATT LAFLEUR (1-0) are the only active head coaches with perfect records on Kickoff Weekend...Three head coaches – New York Giants' JOE JUDGE, Carolina's MATT RHULE and Cleveland's KEVIN STEFANSKI – make their Kickoff Weekend debuts...Two coaches – Dallas' MIKE MCCARTHY (9-4; .692) and Washington's RON RIVERA (4-5; .444) – make their debut with their new clubs on Kickoff Weekend in 2020.

NFL CLUBS APPROVE EXPANSION OF POSTSEASON

14 TEAMS TO QUALIFY FOR PLAYOFFS BEGINNING WITH 2020 SEASON – ONE ADDITIONAL WILD CARD TEAM ADDED IN EACH CONFERENCE

CBS, NBC TO BROADCAST ADDITIONAL WILD CARD GAME

NFL clubs voted to expand the postseason by two teams beginning with the 2020 season.

Expanding the NFL postseason was addressed in the new NFL-NFLPA Collective Bargaining Agreement. Players and clubs both recognized that nothing energizes fans like the chance to see their team qualify for the playoffs and compete for the Super Bowl.

The vote during a league meeting in March held remotely follows the recommendation of the Competition Committee, Management Council Executive Committee and Media Committee on increasing the number of playoff teams from 12 to 14.

Two additional Wild Card teams – one each in the American and National Football Conferences – will qualify for the playoffs. The No. 1 seed in each conference will receive a bye in the Wild Card round. The remaining division champions in each conference with the best records will be seeded 2, 3, and 4, followed by the next three teams per conference with the best records seeded 5, 6, and 7.

AFC and NFC Wild Card games will feature the 2 seed hosting the 7 seed, the 3 seed hosting the 6 seed and the 4 seed hosting the 5 seed.

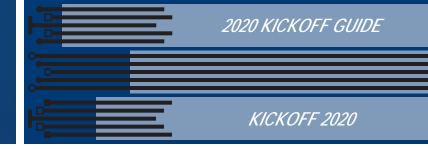
Wild Card Weekend for the 2020 season will consist of three games on Saturday, January 9, and three games on Sunday, January 10, 2021.

CBS will broadcast one additional Wild Card game on January 10 with kickoff at approximately 4:40 p.m. ET. The game will also be available via a livestream on CBS All Access. Additionally, as part of CBS' coverage, a separately produced telecast of the game will air on Nickelodeon, tailored for a younger audience.

NBC, its new streaming service Peacock, as well as Telemundo will all broadcast an additional Wild Card game on January 10 with kickoff at approximately 8:15 p.m. ET.

The NFL last expanded the playoffs for the 1990 season, increasing from 10 to 12 the number of teams to qualify for the postseason. Since 1990, at least four new teams have qualified for the playoffs that missed the postseason the year before – a streak of 30 consecutive seasons.

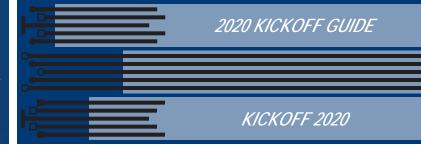


With only 16 games per team, every game is important, and each week brings a noteworthy contest, including a league-wide celebration in Week 2. After enjoying a season-long recognition of the league's 100th season last year, the NFL will celebrate their 100th birthday on September 17th, when the Cleveland Browns will host the Cincinnati Bengals on Thursday Night Football, with the broadcast paying tribute to the birthplace of the NFL in nearby Canton, Ohio.

New teams making the playoffs and winning divisions, consistent teams excelling once again, records falling and young players making their mark all combined to help shape the story of the 2019 season.

Again, Week 17 came right down to the wire as two playoff spots and two division titles – the NFC East and NFC West – were decided on the last day of the season. The excitement of Week 17 was due in part to having 16 divisional games played on the season's final day, a tradition instituted in 2010.

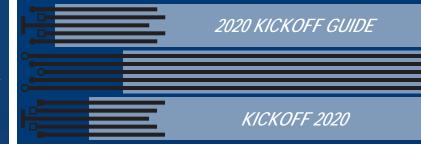
Every team enters the 2020 season with a trip to Tampa Bay and Super Bowl LV in mind, and below are a few reasons why.

• Since the NFL adopted the 12-team playoff format in 1990, at least four teams every season have qualified for the playoffs after failing to make the postseason the year before. Five teams that missed the postseason in 2018 – Buffalo (10-6), Green Bay (13-3), Minnesota (10-6), San Francisco (13-3) and Tennessee (9-7) – accomplished the feat in 2019.

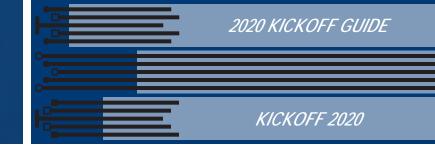

- The **KANSAS CITY CHIEFS** won their second Super Bowl title in 2019 and begin their quest to repeat as champions as the race to Tampa Bay's Raymond James Stadium for Super Bowl LV kicks off. Only eight teams have repeated as champions since the first Super Bowl in 1967, with the 2004 Patriots (Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX) being the last team to accomplish the feat.
- Five teams enter the 2019 season with a new head coach MATT RHULE in Carolina, KEVIN STEFANSKI in Cleveland, MIKE MCCARTHY in Dallas, JOE JUDGE with the New York Giants and RON RIVERA in Washington.
- Five rookie head coaches have led their teams to the playoffs over the last three seasons: MATT LAFLEUR (Green Bay) in 2019, MATT NAGY (Chicago) and FRANK REICH (Indianapolis) in 2018, and SEAN MCVAY (L.A. Rams) and SEAN MCDERMOTT (Buffalo) in 2017.
- Four quarterbacks LSU's **JOE BURROW** (No. 1 overall, Cincinnati), Alabama's **TUA TAGOVAILOA** (No. 5, Miami), Oregon's **JUSTIN HERBERT** (No. 6, L.A. Chargers) and Utah State's **JORDAN LOVE** (No. 26, Green Bay) were selected in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft. At least one rookie quarterbacks has started in Week 1 in 12 consecutive seasons, the longest streak in the NFL since at least 1950.
- Several notable players were on the move during the offseason, including quarterbacks TOM BRADY (Tampa Bay) and PHILIP RIVERS (Indianapolis); running backs MELVIN GORDON (Denver) and TODD GURLEY (Atlanta); wide receivers STEFON DIGGS (Buffalo) and DEANDRE HOPKINS (Arizona); tight ends AUSTIN HOOPER (Cleveland) and JASON WITTEN (Las Vegas); offensive linemen BRIAN BULAGA (L.A. Chargers), JACK CONKLIN (Cleveland) and RUSSELL OKUNG (Carolina); defensive end CALAIS CAMBELL (Baltimore); defensive tackles DEFOREST BUCKNER (Indianapolis) and JURELL CASEY (Denver); linebackers CORY LITTLETON (Las Vegas) and KYLE VAN NOY (Miami); cornerbacks BYRON JONES (Miami) and DARIUS SLAY (Philadelphia); and safeties HA HA CLINTON-DIX (Dallas) and MALCOLM JENKINS (New Orleans).

FROM WORST TO FIRST



Competitive balance, one of the hallmarks of the NFL, gives fans hope entering each season.

In 15 of the past 17 seasons, at least one team finished in first place in its division the season after finishing in last or tied for last place. In fact, of the 48 teams in league history to go from "worst-to-first," 25 of them have done so in the past 17 years (2003-19), including an NFL-record three such teams in 2005 and 2006.

Two teams during that span, the 2009 New Orleans Saints and the 2017 Philadelphia Eagles, won the Super Bowl after finishing in last place in their division the season before.



FROM WORST TO FIRST



Since 2003, the NFL's 25 teams to go from "worst-to-first" in their division are the most among the four major professional sports leagues in the United States.

In the NBA, only three teams since the 2003-04 season have finished first in their division after placing in last or tied for last the previous season. There have been seven such teams to accomplish the feat in the past 17 seasons in both the MLB and the NHL.

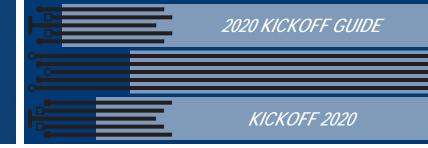

The 2009 New Orleans Saints and 2017 Philadelphia Eagles exemplified the feeling of hope that every team enters an NFL season with, both winning the Super Bowl the season after finishing in last place in their divisions.

DIVISION TITLES? UP FOR GRABS



In the 18 seasons since realignment in 2002, 29 different teams have won division titles. In 2019, three divisions – NFC East (Philadelphia), NFC North (Green Bay) and NFC West (San Francisco) – saw a new team finish in first place.

Both the Packers and 49ers won their division after missing the postseason in 2018 and at least two teams have won their divisions the season after missing the playoffs in 16 of the past 17 years.

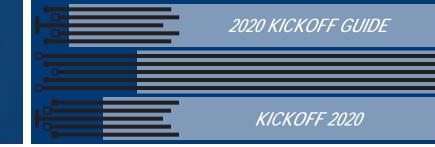

In 2019, the four teams to appear on Championship Weekend - **GREEN BAY**, **KANSAS CITY**, **SAN FRANCISCO** and **TENNESSEE** - began with a combined 12-3 record during the first month of the season, with the two Super Bowl teams, Kansas City and San Francisco, beginning a combined 7-0.



BEST NFL RECORDS - PAST 10 YEARS



Over the past 10 years, five NFL teams – **NEW ENGLAND** (125-35, .781), **PITTSBURGH** (102-57-1, .641), **GREEN BAY** (102-56-2, .644), **SEATTLE** (100-59-1, .628) and **NEW ORLEANS** (100-60, .625) – have won at least 100 regular-season games during the past decade. Those five clubs have combined for 38 playoff berths, nine Super Bowl appearances and five Super Bowl championships over that span.

The New England Patriots, under the guidance of head coach **BILL BELICHICK**, have the best regular-season record over the past 10 years, qualifying for the postseason every season and winning Super Bowls XLIX, LI and LIII.

"When you look at these guys and what they've done in terms of consistency, where that really is the truest measure of performance," Los Angeles Rams head coach **SEAN MCVAY** said about the Patriots. "Nobody has done it better than they have over the last handful of years and that's why you have so much respect and appreciation for them."

Three teams – the **NEW YORK GIANTS**, **SEATTLE SEAHAWKS** and **TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS** – each went to overtime twice during the 2019 regular season.

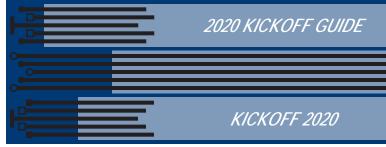
In the postseason, two of the four Wild Card games were decided in overtime. In the AFC, Houston defeated Buffalo, 22-19, as kicker **KA'IMI FAIRBAIRN** connected on a gamewinning 28-yard field goal with 3:20 left in overtime. In the NFC, Minnesota quarterback **KIRK COUSINS** found tight end **KYLE RUDOLPH** on a four-yard touchdown pass on the first possession of overtime to give the Vikings a 26-20 win over New Orleans.

In Week 17, Atlanta Falcons linebacker **DEION JONES** registered a 27-yard interception return for a touchdown in overtime and became the seventh player with a game-winning interception return for a touchdown in overtime since 2002 and the first since **ROBERT ALFORD** (October 11, 2015).

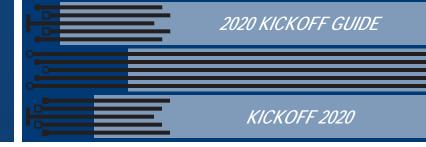

MODIFIED SUDDEN DEATH OVERTIME



For the 2010 postseason, the NFL installed a modified sudden death overtime system to determine the winner when the score is tied at the end of regulation. In 2012, the system was expanded to cover all NFL games.

Teams have the opportunity to possess the ball at least once in the extra period unless the team that receives the overtime kickoff scores a touchdown on its first possession.

A look at the NFL's overtime procedures:

PRESEASON AND REGULAR SEASON

At the end of regulation time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at the center of the field in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pregame toss. The captain of the visiting team will call the toss prior to the coin being flipped.

- Following a three-minute intermission after the end of the regulation game, there shall be a maximum of one 10-minute period. Each team must possess or have the opportunity to possess the ball unless the team that has the ball first scores a touchdown on its initial possession.
- Play continues in sudden death until a winner is determined, and the game automatically ends upon any score (by safety, field goal or touchdown) or when a score is awarded by the referee for a palpably unfair act. Each team shall be entitled to two timeouts, and if there is an excess timeout, the usual rules shall apply. The try is not attempted if a touchdown is scored. Disqualified players are not allowed to return.
- If the score is tied at the end of the 10-minute overtime period, the game shall result in a tie.
- Instant Replay: No challenges. Reviews to be initiated by the replay official.

POSTSEASON

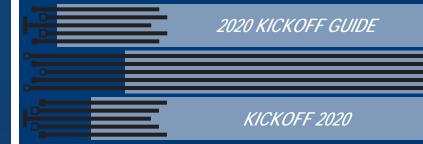
At the end of regulation time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at the center of the field in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pregame toss. The captain of the visiting team will call the toss prior to the coin being flipped.

- Following a three-minute intermission after the end
 of the regulation game, play will be continued in
 15-minute periods until a winner is declared. Each
 team must possess or have the opportunity to
 possess the ball unless the team that has the ball
 first scores a touchdown on its initial possession.
- Play continues in sudden death until a winner is determined, and the game automatically ends upon any score (by safety, field goal or touchdown) or when a score is awarded by the referee for a palpably unfair act. Each team has three timeouts per half and all general timing provisions apply as during a regular game. The try is not attempted if a touchdown is scored. Disqualified players are not allowed to return.
- Instant Replay: No challenges. Reviews to be initiated by the replay official.

KEY DEFINITIONS

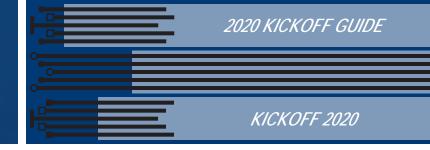
- **POSSESSION**: Actual possession of the ball with complete control. The defense gains possession when it catches, intercepts or recovers a loose ball.
- OPPORTUNITY TO POSSESS: The opportunity to possess occurs only during kicking plays. A kickoff
 is an opportunity to possess for the receiving team. If the kicking team legally recovers the kick, the receiving
 team is considered to have had its opportunity. A punt or a field goal that crosses the line of scrimmage and is
 muffed by the receiving team is considered to be an opportunity to possess for the receivers. Normal touching
 rules by the kicking team apply.

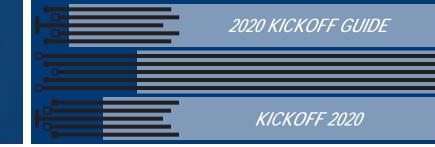

100th	The National Football League was born in Canton, Ohio on August 20, 1920.
95th	Tim Mara and Billy Gibson were awarded a new NFL franchise, the New York Giants, for \$500 (1925).
95th	All-America halfback Red Grange signed with the Chicago Bears. Team went on barnstorming tour of 19 games in 66 days (1925).
85th	The NFL adopted Bert Bell's proposal to hold an annual draft of college players, to begin in 1936, with teams selecting in an inverse order of finish, May 19 (1935).
85th	The New York Giants retired the uniform number of receiver Ray Flaherty (No. 1), thus becoming the first professional athlete to have his name and number retired (1935).
80th	Chicago defeated Washington 73-0 for the NFL championship in the most decisive victory in NFL history. The game popularized the Bears' T-formation with a man-in-motion. It was the first NFL championship carried on network radio (1940).
70th	The Los Angeles Rams became the first NFL team to have all of its games televised (1950).
65th	The Baltimore Colts made an 80-cent phone call to Johnny Unitas and signed him as a free agent (1955).
60th	Pete Rozelle was elected NFL Commissioner as a compromise choice on the 23rd ballot, January 26. Rozelle moved the league offices to New York City (1960).
55th	The NFL added a sixth official, the line judge, February 19. The color of the officials' penalty flags was changed from white to bright gold, April 5 (1965).
55th	Commissioner Rozelle negotiated an agreement on behalf of the NFL clubs to purchase Ed Sabol's Blair Motion Pictures, which was renamed NFL Films, April (1965).
55th	Field Judge Burl Toler became the first black official in NFL history, September 19 (1965).
55th	According to a Harris survey, sports fans chose professional football (41 percent) as their favorite sport, overtaking baseball (38 percent) for the first time, October (1965).
50th	The AFL and NFL merged into one league (1970).
45th	Referees were equipped with wireless microphones for all preseason, regular-season, and playoff games (1975).
40th	Rules changes placed greater restrictions on contact in the area of the head, neck, and face. Under the heading of "personal foul," players were prohibited from directly striking, swinging, or clubbing on the head, neck, or face. Starting in 1980, a penalty could be called for such contact whether or not the initial contact was made below the neck area (1980).
40th	The NFL Draft was televised for the first time by ESPN, April 29 (1980).
35th	The 1985 Super Bowl XX champion Chicago Bears performed the Super Bowl Shuffle.

10th	NFL owners voted to amend postseason overtime rules to a modified sudden death format, guaranteeing at least one possession for each club if the receiving team fails to score a touchdown on its first overtime possession, March 23 (2010).
10th	The NFL Draft debuted a new three-day format, with the first two days broadcast in primetime. A record combined total of 45.4 million viewers tuned in to watch the 75th NFL Draft on NFL Network, ESPN and ESPN2, April 22-24 (2010).
5th	The extra point was moved from the two-yard line to the 15-yard line, essentially making the PAT a 32-yard field goal. The new rule also gave the defense the ability to score two points on PAT or two-point conversion returns (2015).

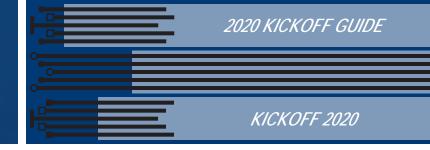

The **MIAMI DOLPHINS** will wear a jersey patch commemorating the life of Pro Football Hall of Famer and legendary Dolphins head coach, **DON SHULA**, with his name and the number "347", to signify his all-time career wins, the most in NFL history. The **NEW YORK JETS** will also wear a patch in memory of **BETTY WOLD JOHNSON**, mother of Jets CEO **CHRISTOPHER JOHNSON**.

A look back at statistical highlights from games played on Sunday, September 8, the first week of the 2019 season.

- There were a total of 13 offensive touchdowns of 40-or-more yards, the second-most on Kickoff Weekend in NFL history. Only Kickoff Weekend of the 1991 season (14) had more such offensive scores of at least 40 yards.
 - 13 quarterbacks had a passer rating of 115 or higher (minimum 10 attempts) in Week 1, surpassing Week 3 of the 2017 season (12) for the most in any week since 1970.
- Four rookies Tennessee wide receiver A.J. BROWN (100 receiving yards), Baltimore wide receiver MARQUISE
 BROWN (147), Detroit tight end T.J. HOCKENSON (131) and Washington wide receiver TERRY MCLAURIN (125) each recorded at least 100 receiving yards in their NFL debuts on Kickoff Weekend.

It marked the first week in which three-or-more rookies have each recorded at least 100 receiving yards in their debuts in NFL history.

With 131 receiving yards, Hockenson surpassed **MONTY STICKLES** (123 receiving yards on September 25, 1960) for the most receiving yards by a tight end in his NFL debut in league history.

 The BALTIMORE RAVENS defeated Miami 59-10 on Kickoff Weekend. Baltimore scored 42 points in the first half, the most by any team in the first half of a season-opening game in NFL history. The Ravens, who scored 47 points on Kickoff Weekend in 2018, are the fifth team in league annals and first since the 1967-68 OAKLAND RAIDERS to score at least 40 points in consecutive season-opening games.

Baltimore quarterback **LAMAR JACKSON** completed 17 of 20 attempts for 324 yards with five touchdowns and zero interceptions for a 158.3 passer rating in the victory. Jackson is the seventh quarterback in NFL history and first since **BEN ROETHLISBERGER** (November 11, 2018) with at least 300 passing yards, five touchdowns and a 158.3 passer rating, the highest attainable mark, in a single game in NFL history.



Baltimore rookie wide receiver **MARQUISE BROWN** recorded touchdowns of 47 and 83 yards on his first two catches in his NFL debut. Brown became the first player in NFL history with two touchdown receptions of at least 40 yards in his NFL debut and his 83-yard touchdown reception is the second-longest by a player in his NFL debut in the Super Bowl era, trailing only **RICK UPCHURCH** (90-yard touchdown reception on September 21, 1975).

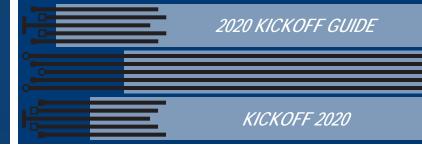
• Kansas City quarterback **PATRICK MAHOMES** passed for 378 yards and three touchdowns for a 143.2 passer rating in the Chiefs' 40-26 win at Jacksonville.

Mahomes, who has 5,759 passing yards in 18 career games, surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer **KURT WARNER** (5,613 passing yards) for the most passing yards by a player in his first 20 career games in NFL history. Mahomes' 53 touchdown passes are also the most by any player in his first 20 career games.

Chiefs wide receiver **SAMMY WATKINS** had nine receptions for 198 yards and three touchdowns in the win. Watkins is the fourth player in NFL history to record at least 195 receiving yards and three touchdown receptions in a season-opening game, joining **FRANK CLARKE** (September 16, 1962), **IRVING FRYAR** (September 4, 1994) and **HUGH TAYLOR** (September 28, 1947).

Jaguars rookie quarterback **GARDNER MINSHEW** completed 88 percent of his pass attempts (22 of 25), the highest completion percentage (minimum 15 attempts) by a quarterback in his NFL debut in league annals. Minshew completed his first 13 pass attempts, the longest streak to start a career among players who made their NFL debut over the past 40 seasons.

KICKOFF WEEKEND 2019



 Dallas quarterback DAK PRESCOTT completed 25 of 32 attempts for 405 yards with four touchdowns and zero interceptions for a 158.3 rating in the Cowboys' 35-17 victory against the New York Giants.

Prescott is the fourth quarterback to register a 158.3 passer rating, the highest attainable mark, on 30-or-more pass attempts in NFL history, joining **JARED GOFF** (33 attempts on September 27, 2018), **KEN O'BRIEN** (32 attempts on November 2, 1986) and Pro Football Hall of Famer KURT WARNER (30 attempts on October 1, 2000).

 The LOS ANGELES CHARGERS defeated the Indianapolis Colts 30-24 in overtime while the ARIZONA CARDINALS and DETROIT LIONS played to a 27-27 tie at State Farm Stadium on Kickoff Weekend. At least one game on Kickoff Weekend has gone to overtime in five of the past six seasons.

Sunday's contest between the Cardinals and Lions marked the second consecutive season in which a game ended in a tie in Week 1 and the third tie overall on Kickoff Weekend. The Pittsburgh Steelers and Cleveland Browns tied on September 9, 2018, while the Miami Dolphins and Denver Broncos played to a 10-10 tie on September 19, 1971.

Chargers running back **AUSTIN EKELER** totaled 154 scrimmage yards (96 receiving, 58 rushing) and three touchdowns (two receiving, one rushing) in the victory. Ekeler is the first undrafted player to record at least 150 scrimmage yards, two receiving touchdowns and a rushing touchdown in a single game since **DAN REEVES** (156 scrimmage yards, two receiving touchdowns and two receiving touchdowns) on November 5, 1967.

Arizona wide receiver **LARRY FITZGERALD** recorded eight catches for 113 yards and one touchdown, the 117th touchdown catch of his NFL career. He surpassed **ANTONIO GATES** (116 touchdown receptions) for the sixth-most in NFL history.



Other notable performances from Kickoff Weekend 2019 include:

- Carolina running back **CHRISTIAN MCCAFFREY** had 129 rushing yards and two touchdowns, along with 10 receptions for 81 yards, in the Panthers' Week 1 loss.
 - McCaffrey, who also had 125 rushing yards and 11 receptions in Week 12 of the 2018 season, is the first player in the Super Bowl era to record at least 120 rushing yards and 10 receptions in multiple games.
- New York Jets running back **LE'VEON BELL** totaled 92 scrimmage yards (60 rushing, 32 receiving) and a touchdown reception in the Jets' Week 1 loss.

Bell, who has 8,088 scrimmage yards in 63 career games, surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer **ERIC DICKERSON** (64 games) to become the fastest player to reach 8,000 scrimmage yards in NFL history.

69 YEARS AGO ON KICKOFF WEEKDEND: THE DUTCHMAN GOES WILD

Los Angeles Rams quarterback **NORM "THE DUTCHMAN" VAN BROCKLIN** entered the 1951 season entrenched in a duel for the starting position with veteran **BOB WATERFIELD**. A Waterfield injury sidelined the incumbent quarterback prior to the season opener against the New York Yanks on September 28 and opened the door for Van Brocklin to show his worth. He took advantage of the opportunity by producing the most prolific passing performance in NFL history.

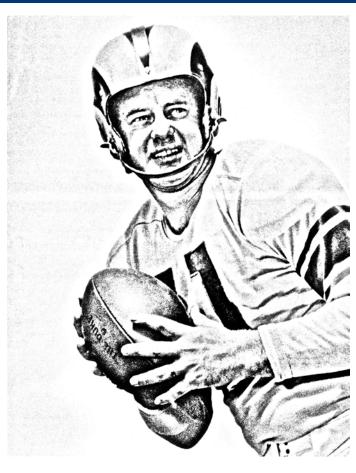
Van Brocklin threw for an NFL-record 554 yards in a 54-14 rout of the Yanks at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback tossed five touchdowns and completed 27 of 41 passes.

"It's the finest exhibition of passing I've ever seen," said Rams coach **JIMMY PHELAN** after the game. "Van Brocklin was hitting them in the eye practically every time he threw the ball."

Van Brocklin, who passed away in 1983, remained subdued about the performance. "Everything I threw seemed to be caught and run for a long gain," he said.

The Rams' **TOM FEARS** averaged 23.1 yards on his seven catches and **ELROY "CRAZYLEGS" HIRSCH** averaged 19.2 yards on nine receptions. Los Angeles amassed an NFL-record 735 total yards and 34 first downs.

"They don't need me out here anymore," said Waterfield after the game. The two quarterbacks would split time for the rest of the season as the Rams captured the 1951 NFL Championship.



Van Brocklin's record has stood for the past 69 years. Quarterbacks **MATT SCHAUB** and **WARREN MOON** have come the closest to breaking Van Brocklin's mark. In 2012, Schaub, then with the Houston Texans, passed for 527 yards against Jacksonville on November 18, while Moon had a 527-yard day for the Houston Oilers against Kansas City on December 16, 1990.

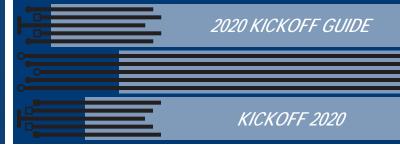
Quarterback **PHILIP RIVERS**, who started 224 consecutive regular-season games for the Chargers before joining Indianapolis this offseason, has the longest active streak in the league and the second-longest streak in NFL history. Seattle quarterback **RUSSELL WILSON** has the second-longest active streak with 128 consecutive starts. Atlanta quarterback **MATT RYAN** started 154 consecutive games from 2009 to 2019, the fifth-longest streak in league annals.

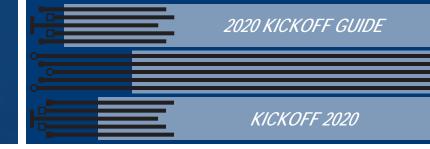

OFFICIATING: NEW OFFICIALS & NEW RULES FOR 2020



The NFL roster of game officials for the 2020 season will include six individuals in their first NFL season and one new referee.

Launching their NFL officiating careers in 2020 are side judge **TRA BLAKE** (ACC), field judge **JOE BLUBAUGH** (Big 12), line judge **MIKE DOLCE** (Big Ten), down judge **FRANK LEBLANC** (Big 12), side judge **CLAY REYNARD** (Pac-12) and umpire **TAB SLAUGHTER** (Big 12). The six are graduates of the NFL Officiating Department's Officiating Development Program, which trains top college football officials in all aspects of NFL officiating.

LAND CLARK (right) has been promoted to referee for the upcoming season, following two seasons as a field judge. He was a referee in the Pac-12 Conference prior to entering the NFL and has been part of the NFL's Referee Training Program since his first season in the league.

The 2020 roster of officials includes three former NFL players – back judge **STEVE FREEMAN**, field judge **NATE JONES** and umpire **TERRY KILLENS**.



Freeman, entering his 20th season as an NFL official, was a defensive back for 13 seasons, 12 with Buffalo and one with Minnesota.

Jones joined the NFL officiating staff in 2019 from the Pac-12, following an eight-year career as a defensive back with Dallas, Miami, Denver and New England.

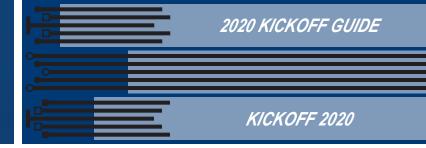
Killens, who also joined the NFL officiating ranks last season from the American Athletic Conference, was a linebacker during his seven NFL seasons, entering the league as a member of the Houston Oilers before the franchise became the Tennessee Titans. He also played for San Francisco and Seattle before beginning his officiating career.

Line judge JEFF BERGMAN, entering his 29th NFL season, remains the longest-serving official.

Officials will be enforcing three new playing rules that were approved by owners and will be implemented for the 2020 season, as outlined below:

- REVIEWABLE PLAYS EXPANDED: Makes permanent the expansion of automatic replay reviews
 to include scoring plays and turnovers negated by a foul, and any successful or unsuccessful Try
 attempt (extra point or two-point conversion).
- **EXPANDED PROTECTION OF DEFENSELESS PLAYER**: Expands defenseless player protection to a kickoff or punt returner who is in possession of the ball but who has not had time to avoid or ward off the impending contact of an opponent.
- **PREVENTION OF GAME CLOCK MANIPULATION**: Prevents teams from manipulating the game clock by committing multiple dead-ball fouls while the clock is running.

NFL ON TV IN 2020



The NFL announced today its 17-week, 256-game regular-season schedule for 2020, which kicks off on Thursday night, September 10, in Kansas City and concludes with 16 division games on Sunday, January 3.

The NFL's 101st season begins with the league's annual primetime kickoff game, as the defending Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs host the Houston Texans at Arrowhead Stadium on September 10 (8:20 PM ET, NBC) in a rematch of the AFC Divisional playoffs.

Week 1 is a FOX national weekend with key divisional games on Sunday, September 13, featuring the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at the New Orleans Saints (4:25 PM ET) and the Arizona Cardinals visiting the San Francisco 49ers (4:25 PM ET). CBS kicks off its coverage in Week 1 with a host of rivalry games, including the Baltimore Ravens welcoming the Cleveland Browns (1:00 PM ET) and the Miami Dolphins traveling to New England to face the Patriots (1:00 PM ET).



The 2020 NFL schedule features the debut of two world-class venues – SoFi Stadium in Los Angeles and Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas. The Los Angeles Rams will meet the Dallas Cowboys on NBC's *Sunday Night Football* (8:20 PM ET) on September 13 in their new home, while the Los Angeles Chargers welcome the Chiefs to SoFi Stadium in Week 2 on September 20 (4:25 PM ET, CBS). Also in Week 2, the Raiders host the first-ever regular-season NFL game in Las Vegas at Allegiant Stadium when they face the New Orleans Saints on ESPN's *Monday Night Football* (8:15 PM ET, with a simulcast on ABC) on the 50th anniversary of the first *Monday Night Football* game in 1970.



The ESPN slate begins with a Kickoff Weekend doubleheader. The New York Giants will host the Pittsburgh Steelers on September 14 (7:10 PM ET) in the first game, followed by the Tennessee Titans visiting the Denver Broncos in the nightcap (10:10 PM ET).



ESPN will televise one game each Monday night in Weeks 2-16. There will be no Monday night game on the final regular-season weekend (Week 17) to provide more flexibility for the scheduling of the opening weekend of the NFL playoffs.

All 32 clubs are again scheduled for at least one nationally televised Thursday, Sunday or Monday game.


Thursday Night Football will air exclusively on NFL Network in Weeks 2-4, while FOX kicks off its Thursday night slate in Week 5. FOX will broadcast 10 *Thursday Night Football* games between Weeks 5-15 (excluding Thanksgiving night) as well as the Friday, December 25, game between the Minnesota Vikings and New Orleans Saints (4:30 PM ET). Those FOX games are slated to be simulcast via NFL Network, distributed in Spanish on FOX Deportes, and streamed on Amazon Prime Video, beginning with Tampa Bay at Chicago on October 8.

NFL Network will exclusively televise seven games – with FOX producing the full slate of 18 games – including a very special Thursday night contest on September 17. On that day, the 100th birthday of the National Football League, the Cleveland Browns will host the Cincinnati Bengals (8:20 PM ET), with the NFL Network broadcast paying tribute to the birthplace of the NFL in nearby Canton, Ohio.



A select number of games will be "cross-flexed," moving between CBS and FOX to bring potentially underdistributed games to wider audiences. Some of those contests were announced today and other "cross-flexed" games will be decided during the season.

NFL ON TV IN 2020



Thanksgiving will feature a tripleheader on Thursday, November 26. The first game will send the Texans to Detroit to face the Lions (12:30 PM ET, CBS). The late afternoon game will feature Washington visiting Dallas (4:30 PM ET, FOX). The Thanksgiving Day festivities conclude with an AFC North showdown as the Ravens travel to Pittsburgh to face the Steelers on NBC (8:20 PM ET).

The regular season will conclude with Week 17 on Sunday, January 3. For the 11th consecutive year, all 16 games scheduled for Week 17 are division contests, enhancing the potential for more games with playoff ramifications.

The NFL's 32 teams will each play 16 games over 17 weeks. Byes will begin in Week 5 and end in Week 13.

"Flexible scheduling" will be used in Weeks 11-17. Additionally, in Weeks 5-10, flexible scheduling may be used in no more than two weeks. In Weeks 5-16, the schedule lists the games tentatively set for *Sunday Night Football* on NBC. Only Sunday afternoon games are eligible to be moved to Sunday night, in which case the tentatively scheduled Sunday night game would be moved to an afternoon start time.

For Week 17, the Sunday night game will be announced no later than six days prior to January 3. The schedule does not list a Sunday night game in Week 17, but an afternoon game with playoff implications will be moved to that time slot. Flexible scheduling ensures quality matchups in all Sunday time slots in those weeks and gives "surprise" teams a chance to play their way into primetime.

Flexible scheduling will not be applied to games airing on Thursday or Monday nights.

In each of Weeks 15 and 16, up to three of five designated matchups will be played on Saturday with the remainder to be played on Sunday. Specific dates and start times for such designated Week 15 and Week 16 matchups will be determined and announced no later than four weeks prior to game day.

Beginning this year, two additional Wild Card teams – one each in the American and National Football Conferences – will qualify for the playoffs. The No. 1 seed in each conference will receive a bye in the Wild Card round. The remaining division champions in each conference with the best records will be seeded 2, 3, and 4, followed by the next three teams per conference with the best records seeded 5, 6, and 7.

AFC and NFC Wild Card games will feature the 2 seed hosting the 7 seed, the 3 seed hosting the 6 seed and the 4 seed hosting the 5 seed.

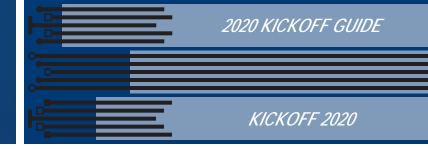
Wild Card Weekend for the 2020 season will consist of three games on Saturday, January 9, and three games on Sunday, January 10, 2021.

The NFL last expanded the playoffs for the 1990 season, increasing from 10 to 12 the number of teams to qualify for the postseason. Since 1990, at least four new teams have qualified for the playoffs that missed the postseason the year before – a streak of 30 consecutive seasons.

Wild Card Weekend winners join the top division champions in each conference in the Divisional Playoffs on Saturday and Sunday, January 16-17. The AFC and NFC Championship Games will be played on Sunday, January 24. The winners meet two weeks later on Sunday, February 7, in Super Bowl LV at Tampa Bay's Raymond James Stadium (CBS).

The NFL is the only sports league that presents all regular-season and postseason games on free, over-the-air television in local markets. All postseason games are televised nationally.

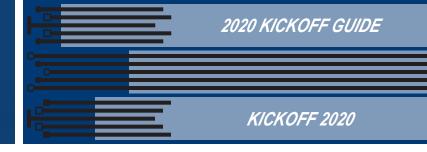

WOMEN'S CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM



Diversity, equity and inclusion is a priority across the NFL and all 32 clubs. As part of its ongoing commitment, the NFL offers innovative career development programs aimed to inspire, engage, and connect women with careers in football. Hosting these events is part of the League's overall efforts to develop a pipeline of qualified women for Football Operations positions and provides women with critical knowledge, tools and resources to pursue careers in football.

As part of these efforts, the NFL created the NFL Women's Careers in Football Forum. The Forum educates and connects female candidates working in football operations. Participants interact with NFL club owners, general managers, head coaches and club executives in the NFL and college football programs.

Prior to the Forum's inception in 2017, there had been one full-time female coach and one female coaching internship. In its first three years, the Forum has resulted in 89 opportunities for women to work in football operations across the professional, collegiate, and high school levels.

Among the participants of the program, there were many "firsts" including the NFL's first Black full-time female coach (Jennifer King – Washington) and scout (Salli Clavelle – San Francisco 49ers), as well as NCAA college football's first Division 1 football coach (Callie Brownson – Dartmouth College) and positional coach (Heather Marini – Brown University). In January of 2020, Brownson was hired by the Cleveland Browns as the NFL's first female Chief of Staff.


During the 2020 offseason, the Atlanta Falcons hired Shelly Harvey and Kjahna O, both participants in the Forum, as full-time members of their scouting department. Harvey is the second Black full-time female scout while O is the first full-time female Asian scout in the NFL.

The 2020 Women's Careers in Football Forum took place on Feb. 25-26 in Indianapolis, IN, alongside the NFL Scouting Combine. This year, 40 women who hold roles in college and high school football programs were selected to participate in the Forum. In addition to placements across the NFL in previous years, several NFL clubs have hired women in coaching and/or personnel roles this year. Since the Forum, the NFL has also worked with several NCAA programs and head coaches who have learned about these efforts and have committed to interviewing more women for openings on their staffs. While the NFL is encouraged by the progress, it is dedicated to further advancement and the normalization of women on the sidelines.



HISTORY OF FEMALE COACHES IN THE NFL



In 2015, Jen Welter became the first female coaching intern in the NFL, working with the Arizona Cardinals' linebackers during training camp and preseason. The next year, Kathryn Smith became the first female to be hired full-time by an NFL club, joining the Buffalo Bills as a quality control coach.

Since 2017 and the launch of the NFL Women's Careers in Football Forum, women have earned eight full-time coaching positions and 14 coaching internships with NFL clubs.

NAIA introduces Women's Flag Football as new collegiate sport

Women's flag football is on its way to becoming an official National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) varsity sport by 2021, thanks to a two-year partnership between the NAIA, the National Football League (NFL) and Reigning Champs Experiences (RCX).

With support from NFL FLAG and RCX, NAIA will work to develop league infrastructure and operations for the first women's flag football competition governed by a collegiate athletics association.

"Football is for everyone," NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations **TROY VINCENT** said. "This groundbreaking and historic joint venture provides an opportunity for the values, fun and competitive environment of football to be enjoyed as a varsity sport by female student-athletes attending NAIA institutions across America."





As the official operating partner of NFL FLAG and the NAIA Showcases, RCX will help facilitate women's collegiate flag football across the NAIA and drive participation through women's flag football NAIA Showcases. The NAIA will host its first Showcase open to female football athletes in the late summer or early fall of 2020.

"Increasing female participation in flag football has been a top priority for NFL FLAG," said **IZELL REESE**, RCX President and General Manager. "By teaming up with the NAIA, we're able to create even more opportunities for young women to continue the sport they love, and potentially receive scholarships to continue their education and compete at the next level."

"The NAIA is thrilled to partner with the NFL and RCX in launching women's flag football," said **JIM CARR**, NAIA president and CEO. "This is a fantastic opportunity for our members to expand their athletics programming with support from valuable partners like RCX and one of the most relevant and successful professional sports leagues in the world."


The NAIA will begin working with NFL FLAG and RCX immediately to outline competition guidelines and next steps for schools and conferences interested in instituting women's flag. The first competitive season will be held in the spring of 2021.

The NAIA will host an emerging sport or invitational championship in the spring of 2022. An emerging sport in the NAIA is defined as at least 15 participating institutions, while invitational can be defined as at least 25. A sport must have a minimum of 40 participating institutions to be considered for full championship status.

In addition to the women's flag football initiative, the NFL will serve the presenting sponsor of the 2020 NAIA Football National Championship, scheduled for Saturday, December 19 at Eddie G. Robinson Stadium at Grambling University in Grambling, La.

QUARTERBACK COACHING SUMMIT

In partnership with the Black College Football Hall of Fame, the NFL virtually hosted the third annual Quarterback Coaching Summit from June 22-23. NFL and NCAA assistant coaches took part in the two-day program to experience professional development and networking opportunities with NFL club executives.





"The Quarterback Summit brings together the brightest, most innovative and successful offensive minds from around the country," said **TROY VINCENT**, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations. "From professional development to networking to coaching best practices, this summit should leave no doubt about the promising pipeline of championship play callers within the sport of football."

The Quarterback Coaching Summit is one of several NFL programs intended to build the coaching and personnel development pipeline and strengthen diversity across the league. In its third year, the program featured sessions and panels led by NFL owners, current and former NFL coaches, and college football coaches including: Pittsburgh Steelers president and NFL Workplace Diversity Committee chair **ART ROONEY II**, Buffalo Bills president **KIM PEGULA**, Kansas City Chiefs offensive coordinator **ERIC BIENIEMY**, Tampa Bay Buccaneers offensive coordinator **BYRON LEFTWICH**, San Francisco 49ers defensive coordinator **ROBERT SALEH**, and Buffalo Bills assistant head coach and defensive coordinator **LESLIE FRAZIER**.

Sessions focused on varying topics including building a coaching staff, quarterback position fundamentals, and other best practices for career advancement. Attendees also had an opportunity to hear from and network with members of the NFL's Workplace Diversity Committee. New this year, past NFL Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship participants were invited to attend, continuing pipeline candidate's relationship with the league.

"We are excited to continue this partnership with the National Football League as qualified coaches and executives come together to advance their careers," said **DOUG WILLIAMS**, co-founder of the Black College Football Hall of Fame (BCFHOF).

The 2019 Quarterback Coaching Summit was hosted at Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia. In its first year as an NFL co-sponsored event, the Summit connected three dozen participants with NFL club coaches and executives to help identify and develop more diverse candidates for offensive coaching positions.









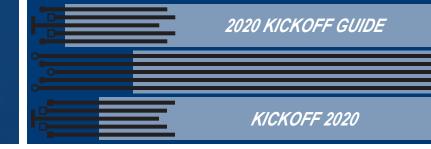

TAMPA BAY TO HOST SUPER BOWL LV



Raymond James Stadium, home of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, will host its third Super Bowl when Super Bowl LV is played on February 7, 2021.

"The final approval of Super Bowl LV is a great source of pride for the Glazer family, the Buccaneers organization and the entire Tampa Bay region," Buccaneers Co-Chairman **BRYAN GLAZER** said. "We have made substantial improvements in recent years to ensure that Raymond James Stadium could ultimately host the game for a third time and we appreciate that our fellow owners have recognized the stadium and our area's long and distinguished history as a world-class host city."

Raymond James Stadium has proven to be a global entertainment destination since its opening in 1998, serving host to two Super Bowls (XXXV, XLIII), the 2017 College Football Playoff National Championship, other major college football bowl games and conference championships, and other various major sport and enterntainment events. In 2016, Tampa approved rennovations to the stadium, including new HD video boards, sound system, suites, concessions and lockers rooms, all of which will be on full display for Super Bowl LV.

In total, Super Bowl LV will be Tampa Bay's fifth Super Bowl and first since 2009, when **SANTONIO HOLMES**' touchdown reception in the final minute led the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII on February 1, 2009. Super Bowl XXXV marked the first Super Bowl played in Raymond James Stadium and featured the Baltimore Ravens and their historic defense, led by Pro Football Hall of Fame and Super Bowl MVP linebacker **RAY LEWIS**, domininating the New York Giants, 34-7, on January 28, 2001.

The city's first two Super Bowls were played in Tampa Stadium and featured the New York Giants defeating the Buffalo Bills, 20-19, in Super Bowl XXV on January 27, 1991, and the Los Angeles Raiders defeating Washington, 38-9, in Super Bowl XVIII on January 22, 1984.

While the economic impact of hosting the Super Bowl is clearly significant, the Tampa Bay Super Bowl Host Committee believes it is the Super Bowl's social impact that will leave an eternal legacy on the Tampa Bay community. While there will be programs that impact numerous causes and social issues, the Tampa Bay Super Bowl LV Host Committee is pleased to unveil "Forever 55", the local host committee's primary social legacy initiative representing the everlasting impression that Super Bowl LV will have on the community.

Together, the NFL and the Tampa Bay Super Bowl LV Host Committee alongside community and civic partners will collaborate in an intentional and strategic way to create, support, and implement long-lasting initiatives throughout Tampa Bay. Forever 55 includes a \$2 million investment by the local Host Committee and the NFL, via the NFL Foundation, focusing on pillars that best reflect the needs in the Tampa Bay community. These pillars; early childhood education, food insecurity, families, health and wellness, sustainability, and systemic justice represent our commitment to moving our community Forward. Forever, Together.

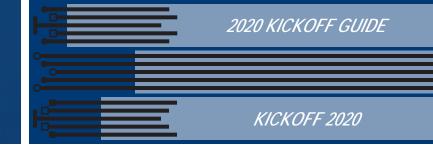




The teams of the NFC West (99,023) have the highest combined mileage total of all divisions.



How The NFL Is Advancing Player Health And Safety



The National Football League is committed to advancing progress in the diagnosis, prevention and treatment of sports-related injuries, enhancing medical protocols and further improving the way our game is taught and played.

COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

In preparation for the 2020 season, the NFL, together with the NFLPA, established a COVID Medical Advisory Task Force made up of a variety of medical experts and clinicians to develop COVID-related player safety protocols on screening and testing; isolation and exposure mitigation; treatment and management; disinfection and equipment; return-to-participation and acclimation; and medical ethics. These protocols have been reviewed by infectious disease and public health experts including Infection Control Education for Major Sports (ICS), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and state and local leaders in clubs' communities. Before reopening facilities to staff, clubs were required to meet criteria including the implementation of operational guidelines; acquisition of adequate amounts of protection supplies; each club's creation of an Infectious Response Team; each club's designation of an Infection Control Officer; and the completion of each returning club employee's COVID-19 hygiene and safety training. In preparation for player return, clubs were required to implement an additional set of facilities and education-focused protocols, including the creation of an Infectious Disease Emergency Response Plan and mandatory player, staff, and family education. The NFL and NFLPA continue to closely monitor developments and consult with leading experts to develop, implement, and evolve protocols that are comprehensive and measured.

PLAYER HEALTH AND WELLNESS

The NFL is making changes on and off the field in an effort to protect the health and safety of every player in the NFL.

- The Team Behind the Team: On average, there are 30 healthcare providers at a stadium on game day to give immediate care to players. In conjunction with the NFLPA, the league has added unaffiliated medical personnel and adopted new technology to assist in the identification and review of injuries, with a specific focus on concussions.
 - Unaffiliated Neurotrauma Consultant (UNC): The NFL Head, Neck and Spine Committee and the NFLPA have selected and credentialed neurotrauma consultants, who are unaffiliated with either team, to staff the sidelines and monitor the broadcast feeds of every NFL game, and to assist the team medical staffs in identifying, screening and diagnosing concussions. Three UNCs are on staff at each game; two are positioned on the sidelines and one is in a booth above the field.
 - Visiting Team Medical Liaisons (VTML): When traveling across state lines, every visiting team is required
 to retain a local board-certified and locally licensed emergency physician, who is typically affiliated with the
 trauma center nearest the NFL stadium. The VTML works with the visiting team to provide medical care for its
 players while they are traveling.



- Booth ATC Spotters and the Medical Timeout: For all preseason, regular season and postseason games, two certified athletic trainers—retained by the league and unaffiliated with any NFL teams—are stationed in a booth overseeing the field to observe the game and monitor the broadcast feed to identify potential player injuries, with an emphasis on concussions and other head and neck injuries. In what was the first rule of its kind in professional sports, the booth ATC spotter has the authority to stop the game by calling a medical timeout to permit the medical evaluation of a player who the spotter believes may have suffered a concussion or head injury, yet appears likely to remain in the game without an evaluation from the team's medical staff. This medical timeout does not count against either team. Game officials also have the authority to send a player off the field for medical evaluation.
- » Chief Medical Officer: The NFL named Dr. Allen Sills as the league's Chief Medical Officer (CMO), a new full-time position, in March 2017. Dr. Sills—a neurosurgeon who has specialized in the treatment of athletes—joined the NFL from Vanderbilt University Medical Center, where he serves as Professor of Neurological Surgery, Orthopaedic Surgery and Rehabilitation and Founder and Co-Director of the Vanderbilt Sports Concussion Center. In the CMO role, he works closely with team medical staffs across the league, the NFLPA and its advisors and the many medical and scientific experts who comprise the NFL's medical committees and guide the NFL's health and safety efforts.
- Video Monitors: Medical staff from each team and the UNCs have access to sideline video monitors. With the Injury Video Review System (IVRS), medical staff can review the mechanism of an injury as part of their examination of the player on the sideline to focus their examination, guide their diagnosis and design the best care for a player. The sideline video and communications equipment permit both teams' medical staffs to communicate with the booth ATC spotters.
- » Electronic Medical Records: Every club's medical staff has instant access to their players' complete medical records via the Electronic Medical Record (EMR) system. Players can access their records at any time via a secure online portal, which remains active after the player retires. The EMR system has greatly enhanced the NFL's Injury Surveillance System, increasing the league's ability to make data-based changes in rules and permissible techniques used in play in an effort to make the game safer.
- » Electronic Tablets: The NFL requires clubs to use electronic tablets with specially designed applications for injury diagnosis. The C3Logix app, which includes a step-by-step checklist for assessing players suspected of head injury, as well as all players' concussion baseline tests and historical data, is now an established component of in-game concussion diagnosis and care.
- Emergency Action Plans: Every club is required to design and implement an Emergency Action Plan to follow in instances of severe trauma. These plans are reviewed by the NFL and NFLPA and must be approved by thirdparty experts prior to the start of each season. This plan, which the club is required to practice prior to the start of the season, also requires the home team to designate a Level One Trauma Center and to retain two certified crews of paramedics and advanced life support ambulances.
- Concussion Protocol: NFL medical professionals follow the step-by-step NFL concussion protocol when they are identifying, diagnosing and treating player concussions. The first version was developed in 2011 by the NFL Head, Neck and Spine Committee, a board of independent and NFL-affiliated physicians and scientists, including advisors to the NFLPA, revised in 2017, and updated in 2020. The concussion protocol is reviewed each year in an effort to ensure players are receiving care that reflects the most up-to-date medical consensus on the identification, diagnosis and treatment of concussions. The 2020 NFL Concussion Diagnosis and Management Protocol and the corresponding "Concussion Game Day Checklist" were adapted from the 2017 consensus statement from the Berlin Conference on Concussion in Sport. In December 2017, the NFL and NFLPA, in conjunction with the Head, Neck and Spine Committee, made additional enhancements to the protocol, including



the requirement that a player who exhibits gross motor instability or significant loss of balance must be taken to the locker room for evaluation if it is not diagnosed as an orthopaedic injury. In an effort to ensure consistent implementation of the protocol, the NFL and NFLPA have developed an enforcement policy. The NFL and NFLPA follow a strict and fair process to investigate incidents and determine appropriate discipline, including club fines and possible forfeiture of draft picks, for clubs that fail to follow the protocol. In 2018, the NFL Concussion Diagnosis and Management Protocol was published in the British Journal of Sports Medicine (BJSM), which marked the first sports league protocol of its kind to be published in a peer-reviewed medical journal. The 2020 revision reflects the ongoing process of updating the protocol in an evidence-based fashion.

- Return-to-Participation Protocol: The NFL and NFLPA have established a five-step process that every NFL player diagnosed with a concussion must follow before being cleared to fully practice or participate in an NFL game This process, developed from internationally accepted guidelines, seeks to ensure that every player in the NFL receives consistent treatment. After a player has progressed through the five-step process and is cleared for full participation by his club physician, he must be seen and separately cleared by an Independent Neurological Consultant (INC), who is jointly approved by the NFL and NFLPA and who is not affiliated with any NFL club. Until cleared by this independent physician, a player may not return to contact practice or play in an NFL game.
- » **Sideline Medical Exam Tents**: NFL games now feature sideline medical examination tents to allow for immediate evaluations of players in private following an injury.
- » Health and Safety Education: The NFL and NFLPA, with their medical advisors and committees, developed a standard preseason health and safety presentation that is to be shown by every team to every player at the start of training camp. The presentation was developed by subject matter experts and includes information on exertional heat stroke, concussion diagnosis and management, mental health, infection control, substance abuse and performance-enhancing substances.
- Season Structure: The new season structure, as defined in the 2020 Collective Bargaining Agreement between the NFL and the NFLPA, builds in more time for player acclimation and for clubs to teach and practice proper tackling techniques in an effort to reduce the risk of injury, including a five-day acclimation period at the start of training camp, a maximum of 16 padded practice days, lengthening training camp by an average of two to three days, and by limiting joint practices in training camp, and the formation of a new committee to study and advise on additional changes to the season structure. These adjustments to the training camp schedule aim to better prepare players for the start of the preseason and regular season.
- » Medical Research: The NFL is investing in and supporting preeminent experts and institutions to advance progress in the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of head injuries.
 - Funding Neuroscience: In 2016, through the Play Smart. Play Safe. initiative, the NFL allotted \$40 million in funding for medical research primarily dedicated to neuroscience. The NFL assembled a Scientific Advisory Board (SAB)—chaired by Peter Chiarelli, U.S. Army General (Retired)—comprising leading independent researchers, experts, doctors, scientists and clinicians to develop and lead a clear process to identify and support compelling proposals for scientific research to be funded. The SAB's goal was to seek innovative translational research being conducted by investigative teams focusing on the diagnosis and treatment of concussion (mild traumatic brain injury) and associated comorbid conditions, including chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE), in addition to the natural history of concussion and associated comorbid conditions.

In November 2018, the NFL announced the funding of five research projects recommended by the SAB. The projects being funded are as follows:



- Prevalence of Brain Health versus Neurodegeneration in Professional Football Retirees led by researchers at the University of Pittsburgh and University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC)
- A Prospective, LONGitudinal and Translational Study for Former National Football League Players led by William P. Meehan III, MD at Boston Children's Hospital and Harvard Medical School
- Surveillance in High Schools to Reduce Concussions in Youth led by Carolyn Emery, PhD at the University
 of Calgary
- Transforming Research and Clinical Knowledge in Traumatic Brain Injury (TRACK-TBI Longitudinal) led by Geoff Manley, MD, PhD at the University of California San Francisco
- The Spectrum of Concussion: Predictors of Clinical Recovery, Treatment and Rehabilitation, and Possible Long-Term Effects led by Grant Iverson, PhD at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital and Harvard Medical School

- Foundation for the National Institutes of Health (FNIH): The NFL contributed approximately \$14 million to the Foundation for the National Institutes of Health to advance medical research on brain injuries, especially among athletes and veterans. The grants included:
 - \$12 million for pathology studies through the Sports and Health Research Program (SHRP): two \$6 million cooperative agreements dedicated to defining the long-term changes that occur in the brain after a head injury or multiple concussions.
 - The Boston University School of Medicine and U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs received \$6 million for a study on CTE and post-traumatic neurodegeneration.
 - Mount Sinai Hospital and the University of Washington received \$6 million for a study on the neuropathology of CTE and Delayed Effects of TBI.
 - Six pilot projects totaling more than \$2 million, to provide support for the early stages of sports-related concussion projects.
- Government-Funded Projects to Advance Neuroscience Research: In January 2018, the NFL allocated \$16.3 million to a series of government-funded projects—including prospective, longitudinal, multi-site, peer-reviewed efforts to answer leading questions on traumatic brain injury, concussion and provide insights on neurodegenerative diseases, including CTE, as well as other cognitive impairments related to aging:
 - \$7.65 million to the Department of Defense to support the Concussion Assessment Research and Education ("CARE") Consortium Grand Alliance, which monitors all athletes for concussive injuries at 30 university sites.
 - \$7.65 million to support TRACK-TBI (Transforming Research and Clinical Knowledge in TBI), an NIH-funded study that collects detailed information on patients with head injuries and their outcomes.
 - \$2.25 million to support the National Institute of Aging, the branch of the NIH focused on aging processes and age-related diseases.
- Concussion Symposium at University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC): In October 2015, UPMC held
 a first-of-its-kind two-day symposium, funded by a grant from the NFL Foundation, that brought together
 leading concussion clinicians and researchers from around the country to propose guidelines for treating
 concussions and consider areas for further research. As a result of their discussions, the experts published



- a Statement of Agreement in the journal Neurosurgery designed to propose and share nationally the participants' agreement on the best practices, protocols and active therapies for treating concussions.
- International Professional Sports Concussion Research Think Tank: The league hosted its second international think tank on concussions in October 2015, convening representatives of the world's major sports leagues and concussion experts to share best practices and protocols and collaborate on ways to advance progress, such as a new study on the potential long-term effects of concussions in sports. These meetings have identified research priorities that are being addressed through several joint research initiatives:
 - The NFL collaborated with the Canadian Football League (CFL) to jointly examine how an eye-movement test—the King-Devick test—may improve concussion diagnosis on the sideline.
 - Scientists at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Medical College of Wisconsin received a \$2.6 million grant from the NFL for a study, one of the first of its kind, that will examine the efficacy of two clinically supervised management strategies, including both the international concussion return-to-play protocol and early therapeutic interventions on concussions.
 - The NFL announced a partnership with the International Concussion and Head Injury Research Foundation (ICHIRF) to fund research into the potential long-term effects and risk factors associated with high-impact sports, including horse racing.

EQUIPMENT AND INNOVATION

The NFL is championing new developments in engineering, biomechanics and material science designed to better protect against injuries in sports and recreation, as well as for the military. In order to advance this effort, the league is collaborating with the NFLPA and bringing in the world's foremost biomechanical engineers and material scientists as advisors.

- » Leveraging Data: Throughout the year, comprehensive NFL player injury data is compiled and analyzed by IQVIA, an independent, third-party company. Results are then shared with the NFL, the NFL Players Association (NFLPA) and the NFL medical and football committees. Guided by the experts at IQVIA, NFL medical committee members examine the data for trends in how, where and when injuries happen. Their analysis covers all injuries impacting players, including concussions and ACL/MCL tears, and considers how protocols and rules changes are making an impact on player safety.
- Taking Data to the Next Level: In 2019, the NFL began a partnership with Amazon Web Services (AWS) to transform player health and safety using cloud computing, machine learning and artificial intelligence (AI). The partnership combines the NFL's extensive set of game data with AWS technologies to provide a deeper understanding of the game than ever before. The NFL and AWS are working to develop new tools and generate deeper and better-informed insights into injuries, specifically the impact of a variety of factors such as game rules, equipment, and rehabilitation and recovery strategies. Over time, the collaboration aims to also build the capability to predict injuries before they happen.
- Rules on the Field: The NFL continues to evaluate rules and evolve the game to try to improve protections for players. Since 2002, the league has made more than 50 rules changes intended to eliminate potentially dangerous tactics and reduce the risk of injuries. Recent rules changes include:
 - In 2009, the NFL prohibited a defender from using his helmet, forearm or shoulder to make contact with the head or neck area of a "defenseless" receiver.



- In 2010, the NFL expanded that rule to protect all "defenseless players" from contact to the head by an opponent's helmet, forearm or shoulder. The rule was expanded again in 2012 to include certain defensive players.
- In 2011, the NFL moved the restraining line for the kicking team from the 30- to the 35-yard line to reduce the risk of injury on kickoffs. Further, in 2016, the NFL moved the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a kickoff from the 20- to the 25-yard line.
- In 2013, the league prohibited a runner or tackler from initiating contact against an opponent with the top or crown of the helmet.
- In 2016, the NFL expanded the horse-collar rule to include when a defender grabs the jersey at the name plate or above and pulls a runner toward the ground.
- In 2017, the NFL prohibited the "leaper" block attempt on field goal and extra point plays, gave a receiver running a pass route defenseless player protection and reduced the length of overtime in the preseason and regular season to 10 minutes.
- In 2018, the NFL made it a foul if a player lowers his head to initiate and make contact with his helmet against an opponent, and modified the kickoff play for one year only.
- In 2019, the NFL made permanent the kickoff rule changes that were implemented during the 2018 season and expanded protection to defenseless players, making it a foul if a player initiates a block when his path is toward or parallel to his own end line and makes forcible contact to his opponent with his helmet, forearm, or shoulder.
- In 2020, the NFL expanded defenseless player protection to include a kickoff or punt returner who will now
 be afforded the same protection as a pass receiver both before, during, and after the opportunity to receive
 the kick. The protection extends until he can avoid or ward off impending contact from an opponent..
- In 2020, the NFL emphasized removing certain illegal techniques from line play, such as using the helmet as part of a bull rush, or any block by an offensive lineman that involves initiating contact with the helmet. Game officials continue to focus on identifying fouls in line play, specifically mobile blocks, cut blocks, and certain pass rush techniques, where initiating contact with the helmet occurs.
- The Engineering Roadmap: The NFL allocated \$60 million from the Play Smart. Play Safe. initiative toward the Engineering Roadmap, a comprehensive effort—funded by the NFL and managed by Football Research, Inc. (FRI)—to improve the understanding of the biomechanics of head injuries in professional football and to create incentives for helmet manufacturers, small businesses, entrepreneurs, universities and others to develop and commercialize new and improved protective equipment, including helmets.
- » Comprehensive Video Review: As part of the Engineering Roadmap, biomechanical engineers have completed a comprehensive video review of all reported concussions sustained in NFL games each season beginning in 2015 to better understand concussion-causing impacts. The data is shared widely with helmet manufacturers, designers, innovators, entrepreneurs, universities and others to stimulate new ideas and designs for protective equipment.
- The NFL Helmet Challenge and Symposium: In 2019, the league launched the two-year NFL Helmet Challenge, an innovation challenge that aims to stimulate the development by experts, innovators and helmet manufacturers of a new helmet for NFL players that outperforms all helmet models currently worn by NFL players. The challenge will culminate in July 2021 with teams submitting helmet prototypes for laboratory testing for the chance to win the \$1 million prize. To kick off the challenge, the NFL hosted a symposium in Youngstown, Ohio in November of 2019 that brought together over 300 engineers, manufacturing experts and innovators



from across the country for information- sharing and collaboration. The symposium provided potential challenge applicants with background on the current state of the science around helmets and head injuries in the NFL.

- WheadHealthTECH Challenges: The NFL and FRI created the HeadHealthTECH Challenges, which are attracting innovative grant proposals from institutions, individuals and corporations that are interested in designing the next generation of protective equipment. These proposals range from concepts to commercially-ready products for use by athletes, including most recently support for Helmet Challenge applicants to develop their helmet prototypes. The TECH Challenges are structured to stimulate research and innovation, as well as encourage connections with mentors and/or venture capitalists, with the goal of spurring developments in engineering, biomechanics, advanced sensors and materials science. The TECH Challenges are operated and managed by Duke University's Clinical and Translational Science Institute, which provides constructive feedback for all applicants. Thus far, the NFL and FRI have awarded grants totaling nearly \$3 million to help advance the development of 17 new technologies.
- Ist and Future: Each year since 2016, the NFL has teamed up with partners to host the 1st and Future Super Bowl start-up competition to drive innovation and spur technology advancements in athlete safety and performance. Innovators and entrepreneurs compete and showcase their technologies that could improve player health and safety, including but not limited to: protective equipment, medical devices, sensors and training devices. In 2019, an Analytics Competition was added to 1st and Future, tapping the data science community to analyze NFL data sets to propose rule changes designed to reduce player injury during punt plays while maintaining the integrity of the game. In 2020, the Analytics Competition focused on strategies to reduce lower extremity injuries.
- » Head Health Initiative: In 2013, GE and the NFL teamed up to launch the Head Health Initiative, a four-year, \$60 million collaboration that has accelerated innovations designed to improve prevention, diagnosis and treatment for traumatic brain injury. The initiative included the following:
 - A four-year, \$40 million research and development program to develop next-generation brain imaging technologies. This includes substantial clinical trials at seven leading research centers across the country where individuals with head injuries participate in a rigorous test methodology to learn more about imaging and brain injury. The initiative has fostered the development of several novel technologies.
 - An open innovation challenge fund to invest up to \$20 million in grants to scientists, academics, experts and entrepreneurs worldwide across three innovation challenges to help spur advancements to better understand, diagnose and protect against traumatic brain injury. Under Armour and the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) are also supporting this effort.
 - More than 1,000 applicants submitted ideas through the challenge's three parts, resulting in innovations in equipment and technology:
 - New diagnostic tools—such as blood tests, biomarkers and MRI technologies—to aid in the detection of traumatic brain injury
 - Helmet and turf technologies designed to absorb impact
 - Rate-dependent tethers that attach to a player's helmet and torso designed to provide high-force resistance during collisions
 - Advanced materials designed to better absorb or mitigate force from helmets, pads and other sports and consumer products.



» Protective Equipment and Field Surface Safety:

- The NFL, in collaboration with the NFLPA, through their respective appointed biomechanical experts, coordinates extensive laboratory research to evaluate which helmets best reduce head impact severity in the tested conditions. Each year, the results of the laboratory tests are displayed on a poster and shared with NFL players and club medical, training, coaching and equipment staffs to help inform equipment choices. The results of the helmet study should not be extrapolated beyond the NFL, including to collegiate, high school or youth. In 2019, based on the results of this study, discontinuation of certain helmets by the manufacturer, and/or the opinions of the biomechanical experts involved, the NFL and NFLPA have prohibited 11 helmet models from being worn by NFL players. Pursuant to the NFL's rules, players are required to wear helmets that are: (1) certified based on the standards established by NOCSAE (National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment), (2) under 10 years old, and (3) not prohibited pursuant to the NFL and the NFLPA's joint Helmet Laboratory Testing program.
- The NFL Musculoskeletal Committee has coordinated extensive research on athletic shoe safety and performance, including in laboratory testing. Laboratory test conditions are intended to represent potentially injurious lower extremity loading in the NFL. That information is disseminated to teams to help inform players' selection of footwear, along with other factors, including fit, shoe structure, comfort, durability, player position and the player's medical history. The results of the cleat pattern study should not be extrapolated beyond the NFL, including to collegiate, high school, or youth football.
- The NFL requires players to wear thigh and knee pads during games to better protect them from leg injuries.
 As with helmets, players not wearing the mandatory protective equipment are not permitted onto the playing field and may be fined.
- In 2016, the NFL and NFLPA established the Field Surface Safety & Performance Committee to perform research and advise on injury prevention, improve testing methods and adopt tools and techniques to evaluate field surface performance and playability. It also oversees the NFL stadium inspection program, which includes testing of NFL playing surfaces by engineers retained by the NFL, under observation by NFLPA experts.
- » Sharing Progress: Where appropriate, the NFL is sharing applicable learnings across all levels of football—and to other sports and society at large.
 - Heads Up Football: USA Football's grant program has awarded nearly \$2 million in resources to benefit youth athletes in 2018, including new equipment, uniforms and other supplies. Grants are valued up to \$1,000 each and are distributed based on merit, need and a school's or sports organization's commitment to coaching education and best practices. More than 600,000 coach certifications have been completedthrough USA Football's Heads Up Football program since its 2012 inception. The Heads Up Football Program strives to improve player safety for youth and high school players by training and certifying coaches on safety fundamentals; teaching proper tackling techniques; appointing Player Safety Coaches for every youth league to enforce safety protocols; helping ensure proper equipment fitting; and teaching coaches, parents and players districts enrolled in Heads Up Football in 2018. USA Football, the sport's national governing body and a member of the U.S. Olympic Committee has awarded more than \$14 million in grants to school-based and youth football programs since 2006.
 - Increasing Access to Athletic Trainers: Nearly two thirds of high schools lack a full-time athletic trainer (AT) and almost 30 percent of high schools do not have any athletic trainer at all. In 2014, the NFL Foundation established a matching grant program designed to help NFL teams increase access to ATs in their communities. To date, 22 NFL clubs have used this grant to support local schools and leagues. In October 2016, the NFL Foundation, in collaboration with Gatorade, the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA),



the Korey Stringer Institute (KSI) and the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society (PFATS), launched a pilot program in four states (Arizona, Illinois, Oklahoma, Oregon) which has provided funding to more than 70 public high schools with football programs that have limited or no access to an AT. Grants, each in the amount of \$35,000, have been awarded over a three-year period to help fund an athletic training program.

- Raising Awareness about Concussions: A poster and related player fact sheet were developed by the NFL, in partnership with the CDC and others, to educate NFL players about the symptoms and possible consequences of concussions and advise them to report any related symptoms they may experience. A similar poster, endorsed by 16 national governing bodies for sport, was developed for young athletes and made available through the CDC to display in youth team locker rooms, gymnasiums and schools nationwide.
- Youth Concussion Laws: In 2010, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell took up the cause to advocate for every state to pass a youth sports concussion law. These laws are modeled after Washington's Lystedt Law, which includes three components: 1) concussion education for parents, coaches and players; 2) immediate removal from play of an athlete who has sustained a concussion; and 3) clearance by a licensed medical professional before a young athlete may return to play or practice. By 2014, all 50 states and the District of Columbia had enacted return-to-play laws. In October 2017, a study was released from researchers affiliated with the Center for Injury Research and Policy at Nationwide Children's Hospital, Temple University's Beasley School of Law and the Colorado School of Public Health at the University of Colorado—the study found state laws that address concussions in youth sports can help reduce the rates of recurrent concussions.
- NFL Foundation Grassroots Program: In 2018, the NFL Foundation Grassroots Program, a partnership between the NFL Foundation and the Local Initiatives Support Corporation, provided grants to 14 cities to improve the quality, safety and accessibility of football fields in underserved areas. Grants totaled more than \$3 million to build or refurbish neighborhood football fields. Since 1998, the NFL Foundation has provided nearly \$68 million to refurbish 551 fields nationwide for youth athletics.
- NFL PLAY 60: NFL PLAY 60 is the League's national youth health and wellness campaign to encourage kids to get physically active for at least 60 minutes a day. Since PLAY 60 launched in 2007, the NFL has committed more than \$352 million to youth health and fitness through PLAY 60 programming, grants and media time for public service announcements. The NFL and its clubs have supported programs in over 73,000 schools and constructed more than 265 youth fitness zones nationwide—giving more than 38 million children an opportunity to boost their activity levels. Research conducted by The Cooper Institute through its NFL PLAY 60 FitnessGram* Project revealed annual improvements in aerobic capacity and body mass index for students participating in NFL PLAY 60 programming when compared to schools not utilizing NFL PLAY 60 programs. Visit NFL.com/PLAY60 for more information.
- NFL FLAG: Flag football is a great way for boys and girls of all ages to learn the fundamentals of the game. In April 2019, the NFL, USA Football, GENYOUth and Fuel Up to Play 60 announced the expansion of the NFL FLAG-In- Schools program with a nearly \$1.5 million commitment from the NFL Foundation to reach 4,200 new schools and 2.3 million additional students. Since 2014, the partners' efforts have resulted in 9.1 million students becoming more active before, during and after school through the NFL FLAG-In-School program.

The helmet models are listed in order of their performance, with a shorter bar representing better performance. The rankings are based exclusively on the ability of the helmet to reduce head impact severity measures in laboratory testing. Performance variation related to helmet fit, retention, temperature-dependence, and long-term durability are not addressed in these rankings.

All helmets in green are recommended for use by NFL players. Based on a statistical grouping analysis, helmets in the Top-Performing group have been further distinguished into two different green categories. The darker green group represents those that performed better in laboratory testing than the lighter green group. Helmets with poorer laboratory performance were placed in the Not Recommended or Prohibited groups. Players may not wear helmets in the Prohibited group. The information presented here is based solely upon the results of this research and the expert opinions of the scientists involved.

Pursuant to the NFL's rules, players are required to wear helmets that are: (1) certified based on the standards established by NOCSAE (National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment); (2) less than 10 years old; and (3) not prohibited pursuant to the NFL and the NFLPA's joint Helmet Laboratory Testing program.

The laboratory test conditions were intended to represent potentially concussive head impacts in the NFL. The results of this study should not be extrapolated to collegiate, high school, or youth football.



As part of the NFL's Play Smart. Play Safe. initiative, the NFL allocated \$60 million toward the creation and funding of the Engineering Roadmap. DRIVEN BY EXPERTS: BIOMECHANICAL ENGINEERS

Football Research, Inc. (FRI), a nonprofit corporation formed and financially supported by the NFL, manages the Engineering Roadmap. The Board of Directors includes leading engineers and experts who advise FRI on how best to achieve the goal of advancing the understanding of biomechanics in football and creating an environment where new and improved protective equipment will be developed. Jeff Crandall, Ph.D., chairman of the NFL Engineering Committee, serves a leading role in managing the Engineering Roadmap. Dr. Crandall is the Nancy and Neal Wade Professor of Engineering and Applied Sciences at the University of Virginia and Principal Scientist and Consultant at Biocore. The Board also works closely with Dr. Kristy Arbogast and Dr. Barry Myers, consultants to the NFL Players Association, who each serve as co-leads on essential elements of the Engineering Roadmap.





RESEARCH: MEASURING THE ON-FIELD ENVIRONMENT AND SHARING TOOLS

As part of the Engineering Roadmap, biomechanical engineers completed a comprehensive video review of all reported concussions sustained in NFL games since the 2015 season to better understand concussion-causing impacts. The data is shared widely with helmet manufacturers, designers, innovators, entrepreneurs, universities and others to stimulate new ideas and designs for protective equipment. FRI has also collaborated with university partners to develop new tools to encourage innovation and advance equipment design, including finite element models of modern football helmets, impact test dummy components and test conditions simulating on-field impacts.

EDUCATION: EXPERTS AND INNOVATORS LEARNING FROM EACH OTHER

Experts share the latest knowledge regarding the causes of concussion in professional football, including the best tools available for assessing and optimizing the design and manufacturing of protective equipment. These discussions are an important step to educating and creating incentives for those in the marketplace to design and manufacture protective equipment that performs better than current models. Periodic symposia, webinars and other educational efforts allow experts to share the most up-to-date biomechanical and biomedical in formation.





CROWDSOURCED CHALLENGES OFFER INCENTIVES FOR ENTREPRENEURS AND SMALL BUSINESSES TO ACCELERATE INNOVATION

The NFL engages experts to stimulate new developments in engineering, biomechanics and materials science designed to better protect against injuries.





In 2019, the league launched the two-year NFL Helmet Challenge, an innovation challenge that aims to stimulate the development by experts, innovators and helmet manufacturers of a new helmet for NFL players that outperforms all helmet models currently worn by NFL players. The challenge will culminate in July 2021 with teams submitting helmet prototypes for laboratory testing for the chance to win the \$1 million prize.





HEADHEALTHTECH CHALLENGES

The NFL and FRI created the HeadHealthTECH Challenges, which are attracting innovative grant proposals from institutions, individuals and corpor ations that are interested in designing the next generation of protective equipment. These proposals range from concepts to commercially-ready products for use by athletes, including most recently support for Helmet Challenge applicants to develop their helmet prototypes. The TECH Challenges are structured to stimulate research and innovation, as well as encourage connections with mentors and/or venture capitalists, with the goal of spurring developments in engineering, biomechanics, advanced sensors and materials science. The TECH Challenges are operated and managed by Duke University's Clinical and Translational Science Institute, which provides constructive feedback for all applicants. Thus far, the NFL and FRI have awarded grants totaling nearly \$3 million to help advance the development of 17 new technologies.

SYMPTOM LIMITED ACTIVITY

The player is prescribed rest, limiting or, if necessary, avoiding activities (both physical and cognitive) which increase or aggravate symptoms. Under athletic training staff supervision, limited stretching and balance training can be introduced, progressing to light aerobic exercise, all as tolerated.

AEROBIC EXERCISE

Under direct oversight of the team's medical staff, the player should begin graduated cardiovascular exercise and may also engage in dynamic stretching and balance training. Neurocognitive and balance testing can be administered after completion of Phase Two and the results should be interpreted as back to baseline.

FOOTBALL SPECIFIC EXERCISE

The player continues with supervised cardiovascular exercises that are increased and may mimic sport-specific activities, and supervised strength training is introduced. The player is allowed to practice with the team in sport-specific exercise for 30 minutes or less with ongoing and careful monitoring.

CLUB-BASED NON-CONTACT TRAINING DRILLS

The player continues cardiovascular, strength and balance training, team-based sport-specific exercise, and participates in non-contact football activities (e.g. throwing, catching, running, and other position-specific activities). Neurocognitive and balance testing should be completed no later than the end of Phase Four with the results interpreted as back to baseline.

FULL FOOTBALL ACTIVITY / CLEARANCE

Upon clearance by the Club physician for full football activity involving contact, the player must be examined by the Independent Neurological Consultant (INC) assigned to his Club. If the INC concurs with the Club physician that the player's concussion has resolved, he may participate in his Club's next practice or game.

HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED RULES CHANGES SINCE 2002



As the NFL learns more about player health and safety, the league evaluates and changes rules to evolve the game and try to improve protections for players. Since 2002 alone, the NFL has made over 50 rules changes intended to eliminate potentially dangerous tactics and reduce the risk of injuries.

2020

- Expands defenseless player protection to include a kickoff or punt returner who will now be afforded the same protection as a pass receiver both before, during, and after the opportunity to receive the kick. The protection extends until he can avoid or ward off impending contact from an opponent.
- Emphasizes removing certain illegal techniques from line play, such as using the helmet as part of a bull rush, or any block by an offensive lineman that involves initiating contact with the helmet. Game officials will continue to focus on identifying fouls in line play, specifically mobile blocks, cut blocks, and certain pass rush techniques, where initiating contact with the helmet occurs

2019

- Makes permanent the kickoff rule changes that were implemented during the 2018 season.
- Expanded protection to defenseless players, making it a foul if a player initiates a block when his path is toward or parallel to his own end line and makes forcible contact to his opponent with his helmet, forearm, or shoulder.

2018

- Makes permanent the playing rule that changes the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line.
- It is a foul if a player lowers his head to initiate and make contact with his helmet against an opponent. It is a penalty
 that will result in the loss of 15 yards. If the foul is by the defense, it is also an automatic first down. The player may be
 disqualified.
- Modifies the kickoff play for one year only.

2017

- Prohibits the "leaper" block attempt on field goal and extra point plays.
- Extends the rule changing the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line for another year.
- Gives a receiver running a pass route defenseless player protection.
- Prohibits crackback blocks by a backfield player who is in motion, even if he is not more than two yards outside the tackle when the ball is snapped.
- Reduces the length of overtime in the preseason and regular season to 10 minutes.

HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED RULES CHANGES SINCE 2002 (CONT.)



2016

- All chop blocks are prohibited.
- The horse collar tackle rule is expanded to include when a defender grabs the jersey at the name plate or above and pulls a runner toward the ground.
- In an effort to increase touchbacks, the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a kickoff is moved from the 20- to the 25-yard line.

2015

- Rules prohibiting illegal "peel back" blocks are extended to cover all offensive players.
- Offensive backs are prohibited from chopping a defensive player engaged above the waist by another offensive player outside the tackle box.
- Defenseless player protections are expanded to cover the intended receiver of a pass in the immediate continuing action following an interception.
- When a team presents a punt, field-goal or try kick formation, defenders are prohibited from pushing teammates on the line of scrimmage.

2014

 Clipping and unnecessary roughness penalties are expanded to prohibit blockers from rolling up on the side of a defender's leg.

2013

- Players are required to wear protective knee and thigh pads.
- It is illegal for a runner or tackler to initiate forcible contact by delivering a blow with the top or crown of his helmet against an opponent when both players are clearly outside the tackle box.
- "Peel back" blocks below the waist are illegal inside the tackle box.
- The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include long snappers on field goals and PATs (point after touchdowns).
- The "bunch" formation is eliminated on field goals and PATs. No more than six defenders may be on the line of scrimmage on either side of the snapper at the snap for these plays.

2012

• The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include defensive players on crackback blocks, making it illegal to hit them in the head or neck area.

HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED RULES CHANGES SINCE 2002 (CONT.)



2011

- The restraining line for the kicking team is moved from the 30- to the 35-yard line in an effort to increase touchbacks.
- All kicking team players other than the kicker must be lined up no more than five yards behind their restraining line, eliminating the 15- to 20-yard running "head start" that had become customary for many players.
- The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include: a kicker/punter during the kick or during the return; a quarterback at any time after a change of possession; and a player who receives a "blindside" block when the blocker is moving toward his own endline and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side. Previously, these players were protected against blows to the head, but not against blows delivered by an opponent with the top/crown or forehead/"hairline" parts of the helmet against other parts of the body.
- A receiver who has completed a catch is a "defenseless player" until he has had time to protect himself or has clearly become a runner. A receiver/runner is no longer defenseless if he is able to avoid or ward off the impending contact of an opponent. Previously, the receiver who had completed a catch was protected against an opponent who launched and delivered a blow to the receiver's head.

2010

- During a field-goal attempt, punt or try-kick, a defensive team player who is within one yard of the line of scrimmage at the snap must have his entire body outside the snapper's shoulder pads.
- After a half has expired, dead ball personal fouls by either team will be enforced on the succeeding kickoff.
- A player who has just completed a catch is protected from blows to the head or neck by an opponent who launches.
- All "defenseless players" are protected from blows to the head delivered by an opponent's helmet, forearm or shoulder.
- Kickers and punters during the kick and return, and quarterbacks after a change of possession, are protected from blows to the head delivered by an opponent's helmet, forearm or shoulder, instead of just helmet-to-helmet contact.
- The ball is declared dead at the spot if a runner's helmet comes completely off.

2009

- Teams are not permitted to intentionally form a wedge of more than two players on a kickoff return in an attempt to block for the runner.
- The "bunch" formation on kickoffs is eliminated. The kickoff team must have at least three players outside each hash mark, one of whom must be outside the yard-line number.
- It is an illegal "blindside" block if the blocker is moving toward his own endline and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side, and the initial force of the contact by the blocker's helmet, forearm or shoulder is to the head or neck area of an opponent.
- It is an illegal hit on a defenseless receiver if the initial force of the contact by the defender's helmet, forearm or shoulder is to the head or neck area of the receiver.
- The rule regarding low hits on passers is clarified:
 - A. A defender cannot initiate a roll or lunge and forcibly hit the passer in the knee area or below, even if he is being contacted by another player.
 - B. It is not a foul if the defender swipes, wraps or grabs a passer in the knee area or below in an attempt to tackle him.

HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED RULES CHANGES SINCE 2002 (CONT.)



2007

A block below the waist against an eligible receiver while the quarterback is in the pocket is a 15-yard penalty instead
of a 5-yard penalty (an illegal cut block).

2006

- Low hits on the quarterback are prohibited when a rushing defender has an opportunity to avoid such contact.
- Blocks in the back above the waist by the kicking team while the ball is in flight during a scrimmage kick are illegal.
- The definition of a "horse collar tackle" is expanded to include grabbing the inside collar of the jersey.
- During a field-goal attempt or a try, a defensive player who is within one yard of the line of scrimmage at the snap must have his helmet outside the snapper's shoulder pad.
- Personal or unsportsmanlike conduct fouls that occur during halftime or during intermission between the fourth period and an overtime period will be penalized on the ensuing kickoff.
- During a free kick, at least four kicking team players must be on each side of the kicker when the ball is kicked.

2005

- It is illegal to grab the inside collar of the shoulder pads to tackle a runner ("horse collar tackle").
- Unnecessarily running, diving into or throwing the body against a player who should not have reasonably anticipated such contact by an opponent is unnecessary roughness. Previously, the rule only protected a player who is out of the play.
- A kicker/punter must not be unnecessarily contacted by the receiving team through the end of the play or until he
 assumes a distinctly defensive position. An opponent may not unnecessarily initiate helmet-to-helmet contact to the
 kicker/punter during the kick or during the return.
- An offensive player who is aligned in the tackle box at the snap and moves to a position outside the box is prohibited
 from initiating contact on the side or below the waist of an opponent if the blocker is moving toward his own end line
 and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side ("peel back block"). The near shoulder of the blocker must
 be in front of his opponent's body.

2002

- The chop block technique is illegal on all kicking plays.
- It is illegal to hit a quarterback helmet-to-helmet any time after a change of possession.

BREAKING DOWN SIDELINE MEDICAL CARE - A TEAM BEHIND THE TEAM



There is a specialized squad of medical professionals, including team physicians, unaffiliated medical staff, and physicians from the local area, that watches the field for potential injuries and is available to provide immediate care to players at every NFL game.

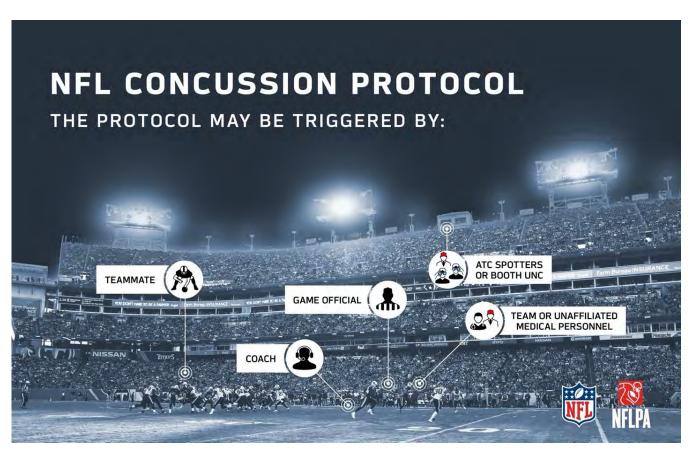
In 2012, in conjunction with the NFLPA, the NFL added two certified athletic trainers (booth ATC spotters) who provide an "eye in the sky" from a stadium box—they monitor the field and television replays to help identify players with potential injuries for team medical staffs.

The NFL added unaffiliated medical professionals in 2014—each sideline is staffed with an Unaffiliated Neurological Consultant (UNC), who supports the team medical staffs in the identification, screening and diagnosis of in-game concussions. In 2015, the NFL also authorized booth ATC spotters to stop the game and call a medical timeout—which does not count against either team—if needed to provide a player with immediate medical assistance. Game officials also have the authority to send a player off the field for medical evaluation. In 2018, a third UNC was added to monitor the broadcast video and audio feeds of each game, and notify on-field UNCs of possible head, neck or spine injuries.

Visiting Team Medical Liaisons (VTML)—board-certified physicians licensed to practice medicine in the state in which the stadium is located—work with the visiting team to provide medical care for its players, including access to leading medical centers for emergency care. Additionally, every club is required to design and implement an Emergency Action Plan to follow in instances of severe trauma. All NFL team physicians work under these plans, which are reviewed by the NFL and NFLPA and approved by third-party experts each season.

The National Football League Physicians Society (NFLPS)—a professional organization made up of world-class team doctors focused on the prevention and treatment of injuries for their patients, NFL players—compiled a list of all these professionals, illustrated in this chart:







NFL MEDICAL COMMITTEES OVERVIEW



The NFL is advised by many of the world's preeminent experts in medicine and science. Specialists in a wide variety of disciplines relevant to player health and safety volunteer their time to explore groundbreaking research and make recommendations for how the League can continually improve the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of injuries as well as invest in scientific research to promote player health and safety.

The NFL medical committees meet throughout the year to review player health and injury data and determine what policies, programs and protocols should be adopted by the League.

The diligent work of the committees normally begins in the spring at the NFL Combine in Indianapolis before the NFL draft introduces a new class of eligible players to the League. Members take this opportunity to gather for the first of several meetings throughout the year to analyze injury data from the previous season. The committees discuss statistical trends, identify outliers in the data, debate reasons for the numbers and ask important questions that need further analysis and reporting.

They also form judgments that are shared with the competition committee and the NFL about potential changes that need to be made to the rules or to medical protocols or practices.

These discussions last long after the initial annual meetings in Indianapolis and lead to a year-long effort to make the game safer.

The men and women on these committees comprise a wide range of perspectives and expertise on some of our players' most challenging health issues. They are not employed by the NFL and most receive no compensation for their involvement other than a small honorarium (less than \$1500), typical in the medical field for volunteer efforts like serving on a medical committee or advisory board, and reimbursement of travel expenses for attending committee meetings.

An overarching Health and Safety Committee—including chairs of the General Medical Committee, the Head, Neck and Spine Committee and the Musculoskeletal Committee—oversees committee efforts and facilitates cross-specialization and discussion among subject matter experts, team physicians and athletic trainers.

Two new committees were formed by the NFL and NFLPA in 2019. A joint NFL-NFLPA Pain Management Committee works to establish uniform standards for club practices and policies regarding pain management and the use of prescription medications by NFL players. A joint NFL-NFLPA Comprehensive Mental Health and Wellness Committee is charged with developing mental health educational programs for players and their families, coaches, and club personnel, as well as collaborating with local and national mental health organizations to promote mental health related stigma reduction.

An ad hoc committee of equipment and field managers focuses on keeping game day surfaces safe—bolstering the league's commitment to injury protection on the field. In the league's ongoing mission to make the game safer for those who play it, each and every medical committee includes participation by representatives from the NFL Players Association (NFLPA), including its long-time Medical Director, Dr. Thom Mayer.

ADVANCING WELLNESS THROUGH MENTAL HEALTH



The NFL and NFL Players Association (NFLPA) implemented the Behavioral Health Agreement to standardize robust behavioral health resources across all 32 clubs. All NFL players, Legends, and their families have access to clinical resources including the Cigna EAP (work/life resources), the NFL Life Line, and a skilled team clinician. Through the NFL's Total Wellness platform, the Behavioral Health agreement expands those resources, ensuring a variety of avenues for players and their families, coaches, and team staff to strive for positive mental health.





TEAM CLINICIANS

Per the Behavioral Health Agreement, every NFL team has a licensed mental health clinician on staff.

PROVIDING ON-SITE CONSULTATIONS

Clinicians spend 8-12 hours per week providing consultations and support to players and staff.

DELIVERING MENTAL HEALTH EDUCATION

Clinicians implement organization-wide education.

CREATING A REFERRAL NETWORK

Clinicians create a referral network where players can access specialized care outside of the team clinician.

SPEARHEADING CLUB MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS TEAMS

• Clinicians collaborate with other team staff including Team Physicians, Directors of Player Engagement, Athletic Trainers, and the Team Chaplain to promote mental health services and combat stigma.

PROACTIVELY SUPPORTING VULNERABLE PLAYER GROUPS

Clinicians actively support vulnerable player groups such as injured players.

OFFERING TRANSITION SUPPORT

Clinicians guide and support players during their transition process.

RESPECTING CONFIDENTIALITY

Clinicians maintain strict confidentiality, ensuring that players' information is protected.

ADVANCING WELLNESS THROUGH MENTAL HEALTH



EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

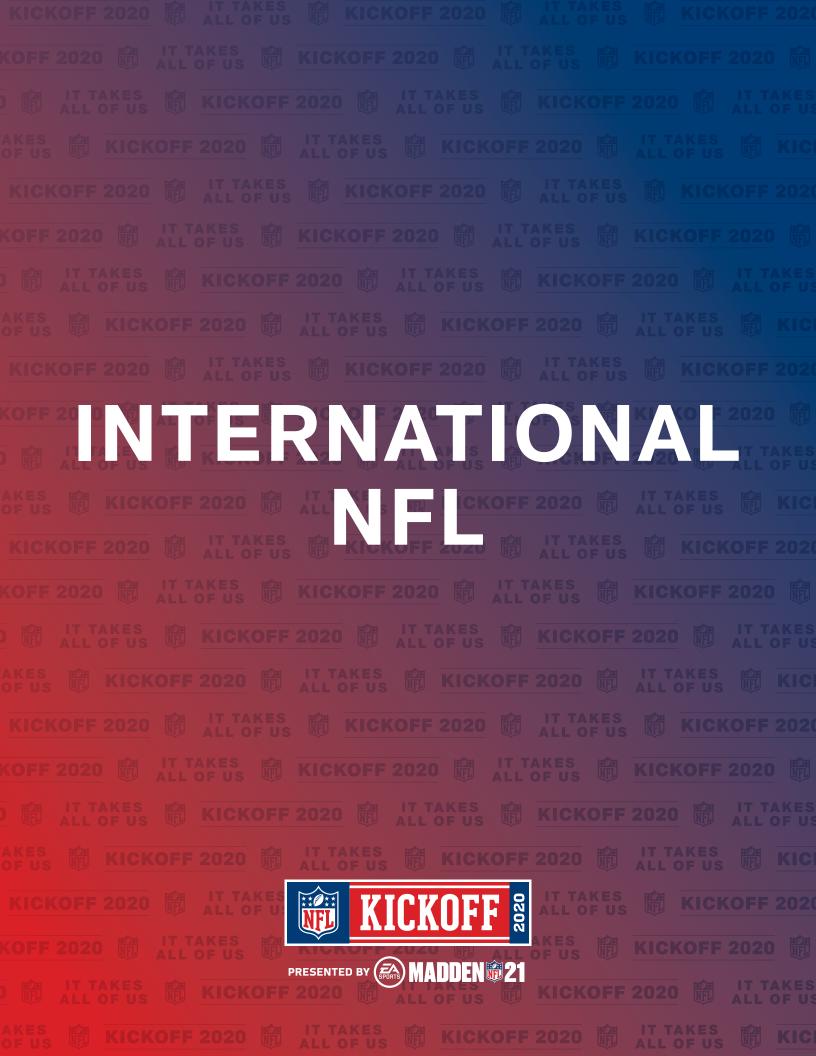
The behavioral health agreement requires that every NFL Club have a Mental Health Emergency Action Plan outlining resources and procedures to be utilized in the event of any mental or behavioral health emergency. This includes suicidal or homicidal ideation or intent, agitated or threatening behavior, player or family member death, or other major event that could cause extreme mental stress. The plans outline the primary point of contact, appropriate referral facilities, and procedures to be followed for a range of possible scenarios.

COMPREHENSIVE MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS COMMITTEE

The agreement establishes a Comprehensive Mental Health and Wellness that is charged with developing mental health educational programs for players and their families, coaches, and club personnel, as well as collaborating with local and national mental health organizations to promote mental health related stigma reduction.

INTERNATIONAL **FEEL**

While the NFL continues to grow in popularity across the globe, international players are making an increasing impact on the field.

For the 14th time in the past 15 seasons, at least one player who attended high school outside of the United States was selected in the NFL Draft.

This year, the Pittsburgh Steelers selected wide receiver **CHASE CLAYPOOL** (right) in the second round of the NFL Draft. The Canadian wide receiver recorded 150 receptions 2,159 receiving yards and 19 touchdowns during his career at Notre Dame. "When you get drafted to a team like the Steelers, it doesn't seem real. It's a super cool thought and idea of me playing for the Steelers," said Claypool. "Each day it's going to get more and more real."

In addition, the Dallas Cowboys selected **NEVILLE GALLIMORE** (below) in the third round of the NFL Draft. The Canadian defensive tackle was credited with 148 tackles, nine sacks, and five forced fumbles during his career at Oklahoma. "It's one of those things where I didn't know whether I was going to laugh, cry or scream," Gallimore said. "It was definitely a surreal moment. It was definitely worth the wait."

This season, seven teams will carry an oversees player on their practice squad during the 2020 season as part of the International Player Pathway program.

"The International Player Pathway program is an important part of our ongoing efforts to grow the game globally and provide pathways for international players to make it to the NFL."

LATINOS MAKING THEIR MARK



Latino players are making their mark on the NFL, as shown by the following players:

The 2019 season was a special one for Los Angeles Chargers cornerback **MICHAEL DAVIS** (pictured). The proud Southern California native spent portions of his childhood in Mexico and had a homecoming with 15 family members in attendance when the Chargers took on Kansas City at Estadio Azteca during *Monday Night Football*. With deep Mexican roots, Davis took the opportunity to reflect on the love he has for his mother, family and heritage.

"To me, being Latino means being prideful. Latinos carry a bunch of pride with us. We're headstrong and have strong character. My mom and my grandma used to say 'échale ganas'. 'Give it your all and try your best."





During the 2019 season, Davis played in 12 games accumulating 39 tackles, a team-high nine passes defensed and two interceptions. Davis continues to refine his craft every day during practice and it shows when he gets into the game.

"I've got to give Michael a lot of credit; he's come a long way at accepting coaching and being accountable," said Chargers defensive backs coach **RON MILUS**. "Raw, that's what he was. I thought last year he came a long way, and now it's starting to show."

"He has always had the speed, but I think his technique is catching up to his speed," said defensive coordinator **GUS BRADLEY** of Davis, who made the Chargers as an undrafted free agent. "He's starting to do it and having success with it, so it breeds confidence with him."

Newly signed Cleveland Browns safety **ANDREW SENDEJO** has become one of the most highly regarded veterans in the NFL while entering the second decade of his playing career. Admired by coaches and teammates, Sendejo is consistently looked at as a team leader on and off the field.

"I knew he was tough," said Sendejo's former defensive backs coach **JERRY GRAY**. "I knew he was smart when we watched him on special teams, but then we got a chance to play defense ... you've seen his confidence grow, 'Hey, look, I'm a starter, and I deserve to be here, and I'm going to keep proving myself that I deserve to be here."

During his ten-year career, Sendejo has recorded 380 tackles, 21 passes defensed and nine interceptions. Senjedo credits his method of preparation for the success he's seen on the field.

"If you have any downtime, you've usually got to take advantage of it to look over stuff and kind of get ready for the next week, said Sendejo. "If you go into the week already ahead of schedule, you know the things you need to look at, you're just one step ahead."

LATINOS MAKING THEIR MARK



Some would consider Washington Head Coach **RON RIVERA** a trailblazer for Latinos in the NFL. Rivera, who was drafted by the Chicago Bears in 1984, became the first person of Puerto Rican and Mexican descent to play in the NFL. Rivera never realized the positive impact he had on the Latino community until he was drafted and quickly found himself embracing his new role.

"After I was drafted, I was like, 'Hey, I have a great opportunity to be a role model," said Rivera. "I've talked to lots of groups through the years. At one point, when I was in Chicago, I worked with the National Hispanic Scholarship Fund and that was a truly great experience."

While spending nine seasons in Chicago, Rivera reached the pinnacle of his playing career in 1986 when the Bears defeated the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XX. Rivera's NFL journey did not stop there; he would eventually retire from playing after the 1992 season and make his way to the sidelines. Rivera spent time assistant coaching in Chicago, Philadelphia and San Diego before landing his first head coaching position with the Carolina Panthers.

In 2011 when taking the lead in Carolina, Rivera became the third Latino to be named an NFL head coach. While with the Panthers, Rivera accumulated a 76-63-1 record and reached Super Bowl 50. In 2020, Rivera was named the head coach of Washington.

The 2020 season welcomes center **CESAR RUIZ** to New Orleans. Ruiz, a two-time All-Big Ten honoree out of Michigan, was selected by the Saints in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft.

"Cesars's tough, he's a leader. He's just one of those players that you continue to watch, continue to watch, and I don't care what tape you put on, it all looked the same," said Saints head coach **SEAN PAYTON**. "He is one of the better interior linemen I've seen in a while. I think we're getting a player with great physical ability and we're also getting a player with fantastic makeup."

While at Michigan, Ruiz earned three varsity letters and played in 36 games throughout his career with 31 starts for the Wolverines.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYER PATHWAY PROGRAM **EXPANDS TO NFC EAST**

The International Player Pathway Program was instituted in 2017 and aims to provide international athletes the chance to compete at the NFL level, improve their skills and ultimately compete for a spot on an NFL roster. This season four NFC East clubs will carry an additional overseas player on their practice squad as part of the program.

On his experience, 2019 participant and New England Patriots fullback, **JAKOB JOHNSON** said, "You come in everyday to work and try to get better. If it's good enough, you get the call." Johnson said NFL interest in Germany is on the rise with more online streaming availability. "NFL has been getting bigger every year. When I started with football, the only game you could watch was the Super Bowl. Now you can watch pretty much every regular-season game."

The 2020 players are: **ISAAC ALARCON** (Dallas Cowboys), a Mexican offensive tackle who won the 2019 national championship while at ITESM Monterrey, **DAVID BADA** (Washington Football Team), a former football player in Germany where he played for the Schwabisch Hall Unicorns, **MATT LEO** (Philadelphia Eagles), a former ruby player in Australia and football player at lowa State, and **SANDRO PLATZGUMMER** (New York Giants), a former football player in Austria where he played for the Swarco Raiders Tirol.

This year marks the first time Austria and Mexico are represented in the program, by Sandro Platzgummer and Isaac Alarcon, as the NFL continues to expand its international reach.

After the NFL conducted an International Combine in Germany last October, the players received additional training and development alongside NFL players and draft hopefuls in Florida at IMG Academy this winter.

"On the one hand, it is a relief feeling because you have worked towards the goal for a year. I have proven myself from the invitation to the tests in Germany to the training camp in Florida. And for being looked at in the first place, you have to make a name for yourself," said Platzgummer. "The Raiders are very helpful there. But in addition to the relief, there is also a great deal of tension and anticipation, because it is only now really starting."

The NFC East was chosen in a random draw to carry an additional international player on each of their practice squads. These teams will carry the players on their rosters through training camp, then they will become eligible for an international player practice squad exemption. With such exemptions, the teams may have an extra practice squad member that is ineligible to be activated during the 2020 season.

Additionally, three participants from the 2019 program will return to their AFC East teams for the 2020 season: New England Patriots Fullback **JAKOB JOHNSON** from Germany, Miami Dolphins defensive tackle **DURVAL QUEIROZ NETO** from Brazil, and Buffalo Bills running back and kick returner **CHRISTIAN WADE** from England.

"The OTA's and mini-camps and all the playbooks, the meetings, the conditioning and the training room was so crazy, but this is what I love," said Durval Queiroz Neto. "This is what I want to do for the rest of my life."

"It has been a success to come across, learn the game, participate in practice at full-speed and to play in preseason. I just want to keep improving. I'm going to give it the same energy as I did last year and see where that gets me," said Wade.

Johnson made his NFL debut during the 2019 season in a Week 3 win against the New York Jets. His first NFL start came the following week in Buffalo where he contributed as a lead blocker. And in Week 5 he made his first career reception for five yards against Washington. Originally assigned to the Patriots through the International Pathway Program, the Patriots elected to forgo that option and make him a regular member of their 10-man practice squad, which gave them the option of promoting him to their active roster. Prior to the NFL, Johnson played for the Stuttgart Scorpions of the German Football League before moving to Jacksonville where he played one season of high school football in the United States. He was then recruited by the University of Tennessee.

DURVAL QUEIROZ NETO

DT, Miami (Brazil) Played domestically in Brazil for the past four seasons on the two best teams in Brazil. A judo champion prior to playing football, he is known for his tremendous athletic ability and a willingness to learn. Spent the 2019 season on the Miami Dolphins' practice squad.

CHRISTIAN WADE (below)

RB, Buffalo Bills (UK)



Represented the English National Rugby Team at the U16, U18, U20 and senior levels. Was selected to the British and Irish Lions squad, the highest honor for a rugby player. His 82 Premiership Rugby tries (touchdowns) ranks third on the league's all-time list. A projected running back, he has outstanding athletic ability and a versatile skill set. Spent the 2019 season on the Buffalo Bills' practice squad. Wade raised eyebrows during the 2019 preseason with two long runs, showcasing his superior speed.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYER SPOTLIGHT: LAURENT DUVERNAY-TARDIF

Typically, in the months of January and February, NFL players who are still contending for the Lombardi Trophy would only be able to focus on just that – the Lombardi Trophy. Kansas City Chiefs offensive lineman and Canada native, **LAURENT DUVERNAY-TARDIF**, also spent this time reading up on COVID-19, the virus that would soon affect his offseason.

This offseason was anything but the norm, especially for the six-year Kansas City veteran. Duvernay-Tardif's main responsibilities revolve around protecting his quarterback, Super Bowl MVP Patrick Mahomes. This offseason, Duvernay-Tardif knew he would need to put a different skillset to use in order to protect a much larger group of people.



Before being drafted in 2014, the Canada native earned his medical degree from McGill University, making him the first active player in the NFL to hold that degree, by utilizing the NFL's Continuing Education Program. In conjunction with the NFLPA, the Continuing Education Program, which assists players with completing their undergraduate degree, pursuing graduate studies and utilizing other educational opportunities to prepare for life after football. Prior to COVID-19 making its way across the globe, Duvernay-Tardif planned to start his residency toward becoming a physician. However, once the virus started spreading at a more rapid pace, he knew he needed to do whatever he could to help out.

"Soon into the crisis I started to ask how I could help," Duvernay-Tardif said. "I reached out to the health ministry and public health authorities but found out that I fell into a gray area where they didn't know what to do with me, because I didn't have a license to practice – yet."



On April 24, he started what was originally supposed to be nine weeks of working in a long-term care facility outside of Montreal. However, following the agreement between the NFL and the NFLPA to allow players to opt out of the 2020 season, the Chiefs offensive lineman decided it was his duty to continue to serve his community in the battle against COVID-19.

In a statement letting the NFL community know of his decision, Duvernay-Tardif said, "I cannot allow myself to potentially transmit the virus in our communities simply to play the sport that I love. If I am to take risks, I will do it caring for patients."

Duvernay-Tardif has taken on more of a nursing role during this time - filling in for workers who had already been in place, handling the medication cart, and administering the correct dosages to patients.

"Playing in the Super Bowl versus heading back to the medical system during a pandemic is totally different. Back in February, I knew that 100 million-plus people were going to be watching, and I wanted to win," Duvernay Tardif described. "When you're going in to help, it's more about your duty as a doctor and a citizen. It's not the time to be the hero and be impulsive. You've got to do it the right way."

Currently serving on the NFLPA's task force, Duvernay-Tardif is able to put his medical knowledge to use by helping examine possible scenarios and the different types of safety measures that would need to be put in place once the NFL season kicks off in the fall. Joining the task force's conference calls has enabled him to share the perspective of a player and has given him the opportunity to gain valuable knowledge, which will benefit him during his career and after, from doctors across the country.

NFL AND SKY SPORTS UNVEIL 'SKY SPORTS NFL' CHANNEL IN THE UK AND REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

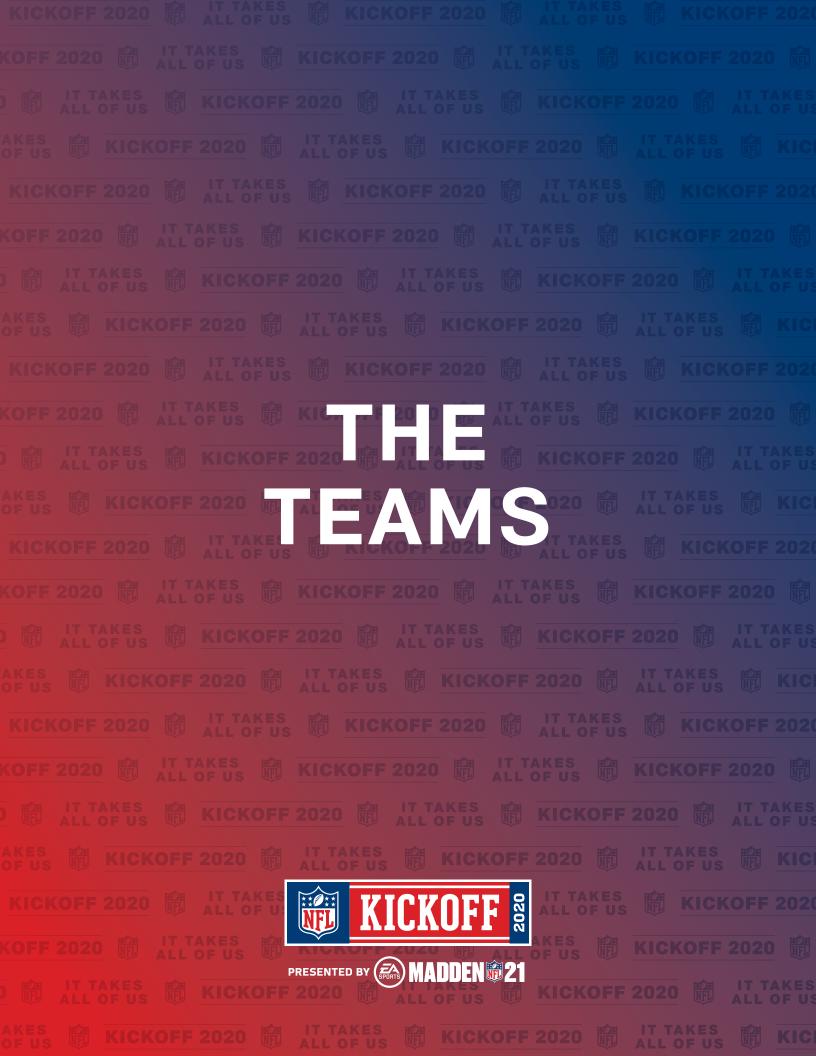

The remaining seven international teams will be selected through the IFAF qualifying process.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR: **TEAMS**



CAROLINA PANTHERS need five wins to reach 200 regular season wins in franchise history. The Panthers all-time regular season record is 195-204-1 entering the 2020 season.

GREEN BAY PACKERS enter 2020 with 791 wins as a franchise, including the postseason – the most in NFL history – and can become the first club to reach 800 wins. The **CHICAGO BEARS** enter 2020 with 786 wins, including the postseason, and can also reach the 800-win milestone this season.

KANSAS CITY CHIEFS have won at least 10 games in five consecutive seasons. With 10 wins in 2020, they can become the fifth franchise to win at least 10 games in six consecutive seasons. The Chiefs enter with 2020 with 494 wins, including the postseason, and can reach the 500-win mark this season.

LAS VEGAS RAIDERS need two wins to reach 500, including the postseason. The Raiders enter the season with a record of 498-451-11, including the postseason.

LOS ANGELES RAMS need two wins to become the seventh franchise to reach 600. The Rams have a record of 598-595-21, including the postseason.

MINNESOTA VIKINGS need 12 wins to reach 500 regular season wins in franchise history. The Vikings enter 2020 with an all-time regular season record of 488-403-11.

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS have won at least 10 games in 17 consecutive seasons, the longest streak in league history. The Patriots have won at least 10 games every year since going 9-7 in 2002.

PITTSBURGH STEELERS enter 2020 with 36 winning seasons (nine-or-more wins) since 1970, the most in the league over that span.

CHIEFS WIN SUPER BOWL LIV

TEAM'S FIRST SUPER BOWL IN 50 YEARS (SB IV) -2ND-LARGEST COMEBACK IN SB HISTORY **=**○

PATRICK MAHOMES YOUNGRST QB TO WIN SB MVP 🗖

The Kansas City Chiefs won their second Super Bowl title in franchise history and first since 1969 last season, when they defeated the San Francisco 49ers, 31-20, in Super Bowl LIV in Miami.

After trailing 20-10 entering the fourth quarter, Kansas City scored 21 unanswered points to complete the second-largest comeback in Super Bowl history.

Quarterback **PATRICK MAHOMES** (right, with trophy, top) was named Super Bowl MVP after passing for 286 yards and two touchdowns, while rushing for 29 yards and a touchdown. At 24 years, 138 days old, Mahomes became the youngest quarterback and third-youngest player to win Super Bowl MVP.

"I think it's a tremendous accomplishment. More than anything, it's just an accomplishment for such a young kid to come out and just perform as well as he's had and remain poised under pressure," said Kansas City Offensive Coordinator ERIC BIENIEMY about Mahomes after the game. "He's a come early, stay late guy. He strives for perfection in order to achieve excellence. That's just who he is."

Mahomes began the Chiefs' stretch of scoring three touchdowns in the final 6:13 of the game with a one-yard touchdown pass to tight end TRAVIS KELCE (right, with trophy, bottom).

It marked Kelce's fourth touchdown reception in the 2019 postseason, tied for the second-most by a tight end in a single postseason.

Mahomes then threw a five-yard score to running back **DAMIEN WILLIAMS** (right, 26) with just under three minutes left, and Williams sealed the game with a 38-yard touchdown run with 1:12 remaining.

Williams totaled 133 scrimmage yards (104 rushing, 29 receiving) in the contest and his six touchdowns during the 2019 postseason are tied for the thirdmost by any player in a single postseason.

In the Divisional Round, they defeated the Houston Texans, 51-31, after trailing 24-0, becoming the first team in NFL history to win a playoff game by at least 20 points after trailing in that game by at least 20 points. In the AFC Championship game, the Chiefs defeated the Tennessee Titans, 35-24, after trailing 10-0. With their Super Bowl comeback, the Chiefs became the first team in league annals to win three postseason games in which they trailed by at least 10 points. Head Coach ANDY REID (right, top) is one of eight head coaches in league history with at least 200 wins (207) and captured his long-awaited first Super Bowl victory in 2019. "I don't think he needed the Lombardi Trophy to prove he's one of the best coaches of all-time," said Mahomes. "But just to do that, it puts all doubt aside, and he's going to be listed as one of the all-time great coaches in history whenever he wants to be done, which I hope is not anytime soon." On the path to Super Bowl LIV, the Chiefs finished the regular season 12-4 and won the AFC West for the fourth consecutive year, the longest streak in franchise history. 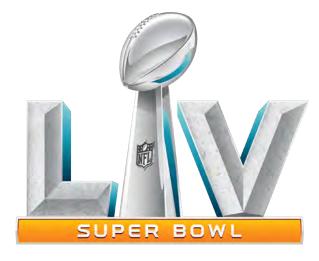

The **SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS** won the NFC West with a 13-3 record in 2019 and advanced to their first Super Bowl since the 2012 season. The 49ers, who were 4-12 in 2018, became the third team to advance to a Super Bowl after winning four-or-fewer games the prior season, joining the 1999 St. Louis Rams (4-12 in 1998) and the 1988 Cincinnati Bengals (4-11 in 1987).

San Francisco clinched their division title with a road victory on *Sunday Night Football* in Week 17, defeating Seattle, 26-21, behind a fourth down goal line stop by linebacker **DRE GREENLAW** with :12 seconds remaining.

The No. 1 seeded 49ers defeated the Vikings, 27-10, in the Divisional playoffs, as the San Francisco defense held Minnesota to 21 net rushing yards and seven total first downs. In the NFC Championship game, San Francisco earned a trip to Super Bowl LIV with a 37-20 win over Green Bay.

Running back **RAHEEM MOSTERT** rushed for 220 yards against the Packers, the secondmost ever in an NFL postseason game, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer **ERIC DICKERSON**'s 248 rushing yards for the Los Angeles Rams on January 4, 1986. Mostert also became the third player in postseason history to rush for at least four touchdowns in a single game, joining **RICKY WATTERS** (five) and **LEGARRETTE BLOUNT** (four).

During the 2019 regular season, the 49ers offense ranked second in points per game (29.9) and fourth in total offense (381.1 yards per game). Quarterback **JIMMY GAROPPOLO**, who finished with a 102 passer rating, joined Pro Football Hall of Famers **JOE MONTANA** and **STEVE YOUNG** as the only 49ers players to finish a season with a passer rating of 100 or higher since 1950. Garoppolo, who has a regular-season career .808 winning percentage as a starter (21-5), became the sixth quarterback to win at least 20 of his first 25 starts during the Super Bowl era.

Tight end **GEORGE KITTLE** led the team with 85 receptions for 1,053 receiving yards, the third-most among tight ends during the 2019 season. Kittle has 2,945 career receiving yards and surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer **MIKE DITKA** (2,774) for the most receiving yards by a tight end in their first three seasons in league annals.

Rookie wide receiver **DEEBO SAMUEL** emerged as one of Garopollo's primary targets, ranking fourth among all rookies in receptions (57) and receiving yards (802). He totaled three games with at least 100 receiving yards in 2019, the most by a rookie in franchise history.

Defensively, the 49ers allowed the second-fewest total yards of offense in the league (281.8 per game) and led the NFL with 21 forced fumbles. From

Weeks 5-7, they became the sixth team since 1990 and the first since

the 2005 **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS** (Weeks 13-15)

to allow seven or fewer points and 200 or fewer net yards of offense in three consecutive games.

Cornerback RICHARD
SHERMAN, as part of

Sherman is the league's active leader with 35 career interceptions.

The No. 2 overall selection in the 2019 NFL Draft, defensive lineman **NICK BOSA** made his presence felt immediately, recording seven sacks in his first seven games, tied for the second-most by a player in his first seven games since 1982. The 2019 Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year, he continued his excellent first year through the postseason, becoming the third rookie since 1982 to record at least four sacks in a single postseason.



In 2019, the **GREEN BAY PACKERS** (13-3) won the NFC North for the sixth time in the past nine seasons and advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the first time since 2016. With 13 regular season

wins, head coach MATT LAFLEUR became the fifth coach in NFL history to win at least 13 games during his first season and became the first head coach to reach the Conference Championship in his first season since JIM HARBAUGH led San Francisco to the NFC Championship in 2011.

Offensively last season, quarterback **AARON RODGERS** registered his eighth career season with at least 4,000 passing yards (4,002), while throwing 26 touchdowns to just four interceptions. In Week 7, he became the third player with at least 400 passing yards, five touchdown passes and a rushing touchdown in a single game in NFL history, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer **NORM VAN BROCKLIN** (Week 1, 1951) and **MARK RYPIEN** (Week 11, 1991).

Additionally, running back **AARON JONES** tied for the league lead in both scrimmage touchdowns (19) and rushing touchdowns (16), the second-most rushing touchdowns in a single season in franchise history. In Week 5, he became the fourth player since 1950 with at least 100 rushing yards, 75 receiving yards and four rushing touchdowns in a single game.

Defensively, linebackers **ZA'DARIUS SMITH** (13.5 sacks) and **PRESTON SMITH** (12) made instant impacts during their first seasons with the team, becoming the first pair of Green Bay teammates each with at least 12 sacks in a single season since the individual sack became an official statistic in 1982. Additionally, cornerbacks **JAIRE ALEXANDER** (17 passes defensed) and **KEVIN KING** (15) were one of two pairs of teammates to each register at least 15 passes defensed during the 2019 season.

Five Packers earned Pro Bowl accolades in 2019, including wide receiver **DAVANTE ADAMS** (third), tackle **DAVID BAKHTIARI** (second), defensive lineman **KENNY CLARK** (first), quarterback **AARON RODGERS** (eighth) and linebacker **ZA'DARIUS SMITH** (first).

In 2019, the Tennessee Titans advanced to their first AFC Championship Game since the 2002 season after going 9-7 in the regular season and pulling off a pair of postseason road upsets.

In addition to Henry, Tennessee's offense in 2019 featured an impressive season from quarterback **RYAN**TANNEHILL. He led the league with a 117.5 passer rating after taking over at the team's starter in Week 7, the fourth-highest single-season mark in league annals (minimum 100 attempts).

In the Wild Card round, the sixthseeded Titans traveled to New England to defeat the Patriots, 20-13, led by running back **DERRICK HENRY**'s 182 rushing yards.

becoming the first

Henry, who rushed for 195 yards in the Divisional playoffs, became the first player in league history with two games of at least 175 rushing yards in the same postseason and his 377 combined rushing yards in the Wild Card and Divisional round were the most by a player in the first two games of a single postseason in NFL history.

Led by quarterback LAMAR JACKSON (1,206 rushing yards) and running back MARK INGRAM (1,018), the Ravens offense totaled 3,296 rushing yards, the most by a team in a single season in league annals.

Quarterback Lamar Jackson's 1,206 rushing yards were the most by a quarterback in a single season in league annals, while running back Mark Ingram rushed for 1,018 yards in his first season with Baltimore and became the first Ravens running back to surpass 1,000 rushing yards since 2014.

With Jackson and Ingram, the 2019 Ravens became the seventh team in NFL history and first since the 2009 Carolina Panthers to have two players with at least 1,000 rushing yards in a single season.



Beginning the season 8-0, the Patriots had a +189-point differential through their first eight games, tied with the 1942 **CHICAGO BEARS** (+189) for the third-highest point different through a team's first eight games in NFL history.

Led by Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year **STEPHON GILMORE** (six interceptions), New England also led the NFL with 25 interceptions. Along with defensive backs **J.C. JACKSON** (five) and **DEVIN MCCOURTY** (five), the Patriots became the seventh team since 2000 and the first since the 2008 Green Bay Packers with three players with at least five interceptions each.

RUN THE BALL

2019 NFL RUSHING LEADER DERRICK HENRY ---

A tough, reliable running game allows an offense to command a game's pace. In the majority of contests, it can also control the game's result.

In 2019, NFL teams with a 100-yard rusher posted a 78-28 record for a .736 winning percentage. That rated higher than clubs with a 100-yard receiver (96-84-2, .533) or a 300-yard passer (69-61-2, .530).

Tennessee running back **DERRICK HENRY** led the NFL with 1,530 rushing yards and, including the postseason, had eight games in which he rushed for at least 100 yards, the most in the league.

The Titans were 8-0 in those games, accounting for all but three of their wins last season, as Henry helped the franchise reach their first AFC Championship Game since 2002.

Over the past five years, teams have compiled a 366-121-2 record (.751) when a player has eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark. By comparison, clubs with a 100-yard receiver have a .554 winning percentage (471-379-7), while offenses with a 300-yard passer have a .524 winning percentage (317-288-6).



Excelling on third down extends drives and keeps your opponent off the field, which can be an important factor in winning games.

Last season, four of the top five teams in third-down conversion percentage won their division – **KANSAS CITY** (47.6 percent), **BALTIMORE** (47.1), **PHILADELPHIA** (45.4) and **SAN FRANCISCO** (45.0).

GOING FOR **TVVO**

The two-point conversion has become an increasingly popular and important play in the NFL over the past few years.

Last season, the **TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS** and head coach **BRUCE ARIANS** (right) led the league in two-point conversions, converting on five of their six attempts (83.3 percent).

They became the eighth team since 1994, when the two-point conversion was instituted, to have at least five two-point conversions, while having a conversion rate of at least 80 percent. Only the 2014 Chicago Bears, who converted 100 percent (five of five) of their attempts, had a higher percentage.

In total, 54 two-point conversions were successful in 2019, the third-most in a single season since 1994. Three of the top four totals occurred in the last four seasons, including 66 conversions in 2018, the most since 1994.

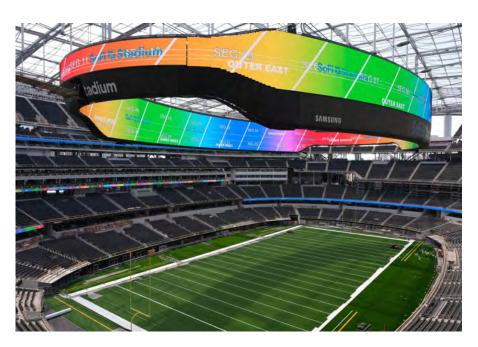

- Located in Inglewood, CA, Hollywood Park is a 298-acre, world-class sports and entertainment destination that
 was built by Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. STANLEY KROENKE. SoFi Stadium is the centerpiece
 of the development.
- Located on the site of the former Hollywood Park racetrack, SoFi Stadium will be the new home for the Los Angeles Rams and Los Angeles Chargers.
- SoFi Stadium will host a variety of sports and entertainment events throughout the year and has already secured SUPER BOWL LVI in February 2022, the 2023 COLLEGE FOOTBALL NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME, and the OPENING AND CLOSING CEREMONIES OF THE 2028 OLYMPIC GAMES.

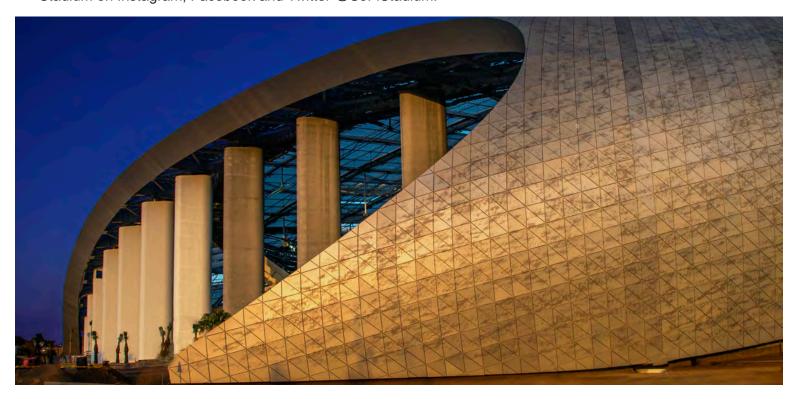

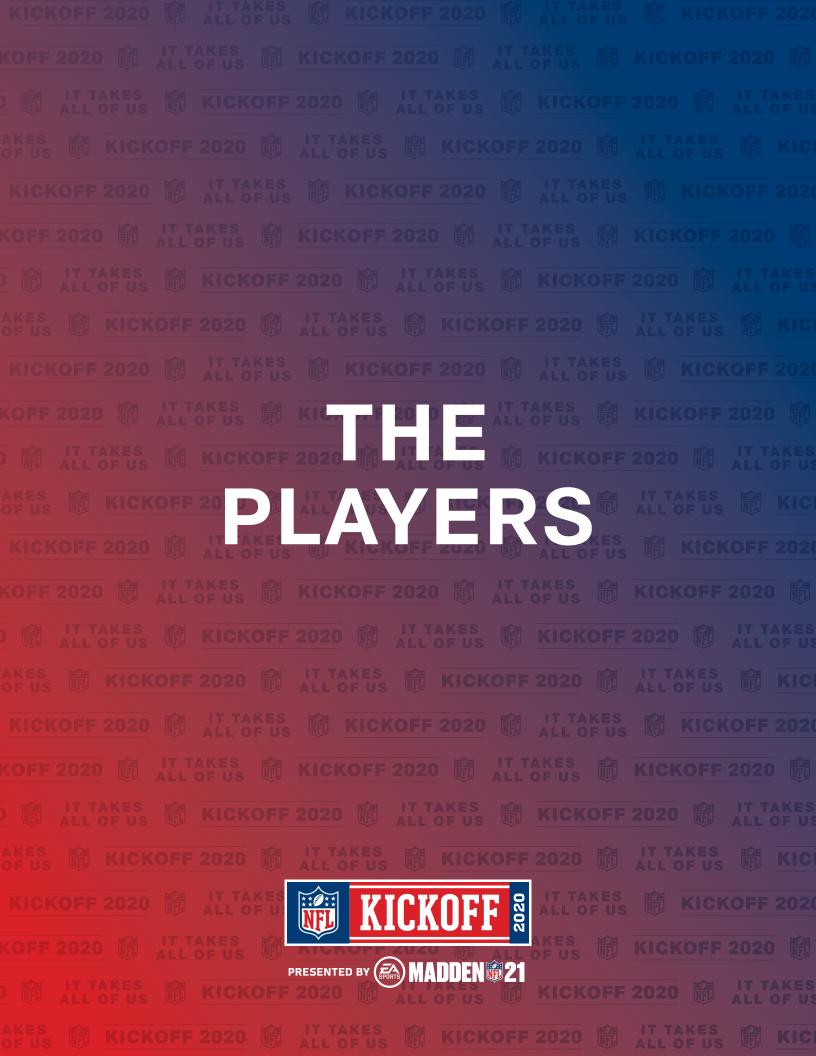


- Hollywood Park is a privately funded development that is 3.5 times the size of Disneyland park and twice as big as Vatican City.
- Adjacent to the stadium and under the same canopy are a 2.5-acre open-air plaza, American Airlines Plaza, and a 6,000-seat performance venue.
- Hollywood Park will initially feature more than 1.5 million square feet of retail and office space, and when it is complete up to 3,000 residences, a hotel, and more than 20 acres of parks. The first phase of the development for the district will open around Super Bowl LVI in February 2022.
- The stadium's event level sits 100 feet below grade level. To accomplish this, over seven million cubic yards
 of dirt were excavated from the stadium bowl alone and re-distributed around the site. When the stadium
 is complete, nearly 100,000 tons of steel and cable will have been installed. Already 80,000 cubic yards of
 structural concrete have been poured site-wide.
- SoFi Stadium and Hollywood Park can have up to 3,200 construction workers on-site daily, with Inglewood
 residents being given priority placement. More than 12 million worker hours have been completed to-date since
 construction began.

JOSH ALLEN, Buffalo, needs three rushing touchdowns to become the second quarterback with at least 20 rushing touchdowns in his first three seasons in NFL history joining Cam Newton (28). Allen also needs eight rushing touchdowns to become the first quarterback in NFL history to rush for at least eight touchdowns in three consecutive seasons.

SAQUON BARKLEY, N.Y. Giants, needs 57 receptions to become the seventh running back in NFL history with at least 200 receptions through his first three seasons. Barkley also needs 10 games with at least 100 scrimmage yards to become the third player in NFL history with 30 such games through their first three seasons, joining Eric Dickerson (34) and Edgerrin James (32).

ODELL BECKHAM JR., Cleveland, needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the 10th player with at least 1,000 receiving yards in six of his first seven seasons in NFL history.

LE'VEON BELL, N.Y. Jets, needs 60 receptions to become the sixth running back in NFL history with five seasons of at least 60 receptions. Bell also needs 72 receptions to become the fourth running back with at least 450 receptions in his first seven seasons in NFL history. Bell enters 2020 with 378 career receptions in 77 career games.

TOM BRADY, Tampa Bay, needs 16 starts to surpass Brett Favre (298 games) for the most games started by a quarterback in NFL history. Brady also needs two games with at least 300 passing yards to surpass Peyton Manning (93 games) for the second-most such games in NFL history, trailing only Drew Brees (120). With eight games with at least three touchdown passes, Brady would surpass Drew Brees and Peyton Manning (93 games) for the most such games in NFL history.

Brady needs one more Pro Bowl berth to surpass Tony Gonzalez (14), Peyton Manning (14), Bruce Matthews (14) and Merlin Olsen (14) for the most Pro Bowl berths in NFL history.

DREW BREES, New Orleans, needs 10 starts to become the third quarterback in NFL history to start 300 games, including the postseason, joining Tom Brady (324) and Brett Favre (322). Brees also needs 25 touchdown passes to join Peyton Manning (16 seasons) as the only players in NFL history to have at least 15 seasons with at least 25 touchdown passes.

Brees needs one game with at least two touchdown passes to surpass Peyton Manning (165 games) for the second-most such games in NFL history, trailing only Tom Brady (173). With one game with at least three touchdown passes, Brees would surpass Peyton Manning (93 games) for the most such games in NFL history.

Brees needs one game with a passer rating of 125 or higher to surpass Peyton Manning (50 games) for the most such games in NFL history.

A.J. BROWN, Tennessee, needs at least 1,000 receiving yards, 50 receptions and five receiving touchdowns to become the ninth player in NFL history to accomplish the feat in each of his first two seasons. Brown also needs five games with at least 100 receiving yards to become the ninth player in NFL history with 10 such games through his first two seasons.

KEVIN BYARD, Tennessee, needs three interceptions and two sacks to become the sixth player in NFL history with at least 20 interceptions and five sacks through his first five seasons in NFL history.



KIRK COUSINS, Minnesota, needs 893 passing yards in his first three games of the 2020 season to become the third-fastest player (96 career games) to reach 25,000 career passing yards in NFL history, behind Matthew Stafford (90 games) and Dan Marino (92 games).

AARON DONALD, L.A. Rams, needs eight sacks to become the fourth player since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic, to record at least eight sacks in each of his first seven seasons. Donald also needs 13 sacks to become the fourth player since 1982 to record at least 85 sacks in his first seven seasons, joining Reggie White (110), DeMarcus Ware (99.5) and Derrick Thomas (85). Donald has 72 sacks in 94 career games.

AUSTIN EKELER, L.A. Chargers, needs 953 scrimmage yards to become the third undrafted player in the common draft era (since 1967) with at least 4,000 scrimmage yards in his first four seasons, joining Arian Foster (6,052) and Willie Parker (4,818). Ekeler has 3,047 scrimmage yards in his first three seasons.

EZEKIEL ELLIOTT, Dallas, needs at least 1,300 rushing yards to the eighth player with at least 1,300 rushing yards in four of their first five seasons in NFL history. Elliott also needs 1,523 yards from scrimmage to surpass Chris Johnson (8,546) for the fifth-most yards from scrimmage through a player's first five seasons in league history.

ZACH ERTZ, Philadelphia, needs 93 receptions to surpass Jason Witten (617) for the most receptions by a tight end in his first eight seasons in NFL history.

MIKE EVANS, Tampa Bay, needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first player in NFL history to begin his career with seven consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

LARRY FITZGERALD, Arizona, needs 22 receptions for 1,400 career receptions, trailing only Jerry Rice (1,549) for most in NFL history. Fitzgerald has 1,378 receptions in 250 career games. Fitzgerald also needs nine touchdown receptions to surpass Marvin Harrison (128) for the fifth-most touchdown receptions in NFL history. Fitzgerald has 120 receiving touchdowns in 16 career seasons.

Fitzgerald needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the third player in NFL history with 10 career 1,000-yard seasons, joining Jerry Rice (14) and Randy Moss (10).

ROB GRONKOWSKI, Tampa Bay, needs 139 receiving yards to reach 8,000 career receiving yards, joining Jason Witten (8,948 receiving yards), Tony Gonzalez (8,710) and Antonio Gates (8,321) as the only tight ends with at least 8,000 receiving yards in their first 10 seasons. Gronkowski also needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first tight end in NFL history with five career 1,000-yard seasons.

Gronkowski needs 976 receiving yards to become the fifth tight end in NFL history with 10,000 career receiving yards, including postseason. With nine receiving touchdowns, he would become the third tight end in NFL history with 100 career receiving touchdowns, including the postseason.

Gronkowski needs four games with at least 100 receiving yards to surpass Tony Gonzalez (31 games) for the most such games by a tight end in NFL history.

TODD GURLEY, Atlanta, needs 12 total touchdowns to surpass Jim Brown (81) for the fifth-most total touchdowns through a player's first six seasons in NFL history. Gurley also needs 10 rushing touchdowns to become the seventh player with at least 10 rushing touchdowns in five of their first six seasons in NFL history.



DERRICK HENRY, Tennessee, needs 1,500 rushing yards and 15 rushing touchdowns to become the fourth player in NFL history to accomplish the feat in consecutive seasons. Henry also needs two games with at least 200 rushing yards to become the third player in NFL history with four such games in his first five seasons.

DEANDRE HOPKINS, Arizona, needs 68 receptions to become the fifth player in NFL history with 700 receptions in his first eight seasons. Hopkins has 632 receptions in 110 career games.

Hopkins also needs at least 1,300 receiving yards and 10 touchdown receptions to become the fifth player in NFL history with four such seasons. Hopkins reached those marks during the 2015, 2017 and 2018 seasons.

Hopkins needs 800 receiving yards to become the third player in NFL history with at least 800 receiving yards in each of his first eight seasons, joining Gary Clark and Jerry Rice.

DANIELLE HUNTER, Minnesota, could join Reggie White (1986-88, 1990-92) and Jared Allen (2007-09) as the only players with at least 14 sacks in three consecutive seasons since 1982, when the individual sack became an official NFL statistic. Hunter recorded 14.5 sacks in both the 2018 and 2019 seasons.

LAMAR JACKSON, Baltimore, needs 132 rushing yards to surpass Cam Newton (2,032 yards) for the most rushing yards by a quarterback in a player's first three seasons in NFL history. Jackson also needs four games with at least 100 rushing yards to tie Michael Vick (10 games) for the most such games by a quarterback in NFL history.

With 672 passing yards and 599 rushing yards, Jackson would become the first player with at least 5,000 passing yards and 2,500 rushing yards through his first three seasons in NFL history.

CHANDLER JONES, Arizona, needs 21.5 sacks to surpass Jared Allen (117) and DeMarcus Ware (117) for the second-most sacks by a player in his first nine seasons since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic. Reggie White had 137 sacks in his first nine NFL seasons.

Jones also needs 17 sacks to become the third player since 1982 with three career seasons of at least 17 sacks. Jones had 17 sacks in 2017 and 19 sacks in 2019.

JULIO JONES, Atlanta, needs 1,151 receiving yards to surpass Jerry Rice (13,275 yards) for the most receiving yards through a player's first 10 seasons in NFL history. Jones also could become the first player with at least 1,250 receiving yards in seven consecutive seasons in NFL history.

Jones needs at least 100 receptions and 1,500 receiving yards to become the first player to reach those marks in four different seasons in NFL history.

ALVIN KAMARA, New Orleans, needs at least 500 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards to become the first player in NFL history to have at least 500 rushing and receiving yards in each of his first four seasons. Kamara also needs 92 rushing yards and 432 receiving yards to join Roger Craig and Christian McCaffrey as the only players with at least 2,500 rushing and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons in NFL history.

If Kamara reaches 3,000 rushing yards, he would join Craig as the only players with at least 3,000 rushing yards and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons. Kamara enters 2020 with 2,408 rushing yards and 2,068 receiving yards.



TRAVIS KELCE, Kansas City, needs 93 receptions to become the second tight end with at least 600 receptions in his first eight seasons, joining Jason Witten (617). Kelce also needs 535 receiving yards to become the third tight end in NFL history with at least 7,000 receiving yards in his first eight seasons, joining Rob Gronkowski (7,179) and Antonio Gates (7,005). Kelce has 6,465 receiving yards in 96 career games.

Kelce needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first tight end in NFL history with five career seasons of at least 1,000 receiving yards. Kelce had at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of the past four seasons.

Kelce needs 90 receptions to become the first tight end in NFL history to record at least 90 receptions in three consecutive seasons. Kelce had 103 receptions in 2018 and 97 receptions in 2019.

RYAN KERRIGAN, Washington, needs five sacks to become the ninth player to record at least five sacks in each of his first 10 seasons since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic. Kerrigan also needs at least five sacks and one forced fumble to join Derrick Thomas as the only players since 1982 to do so in each of their first 10 seasons.

GEORGE KITTLE, San Francisco, needs 919 receiving yards to surpass Jimmy Graham (3,863) for the most receiving yards by a tight end in his first four seasons in NFL history. Kittle has 2,945 receiving yards in 45 career games.

Kittle also needs 84 receptions to join Jimmy Graham (301) as the only tight ends in NFL history with at least 300 receptions in their first four seasons. Kittle has 216 receptions in his first three seasons.

JARVIS LANDRY, Cleveland, needs at least 80 receptions to become the first player in NFL history to record at least 80 receptions in each of his first seven seasons. Landry also needs 102 receptions to surpass Marvin Harrison (665) for the most receptions through a player's first seven seasons in NFL history.

DARIUS LEONARD, Indianapolis, needs three interceptions to become the third linebacker in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions through his first three seasons.

PHILLIP LINDSAY, Denver, needs 1,000 rushing yards to become the first undrafted player since 1967 to record at least 1,000 rushing yards in each of his first three seasons. Lindsay had 1,037 rushing yards in 2018 and 1,011 rushing yards in 2019.

Lindsay also needs 1,200 scrimmage yards to become the fifth undrafted running back since 1967 to record at least three career seasons of 1,200 scrimmage yards. Lindsay had 1,278 scrimmage yards in 2018 and 1,207 scrimmage yards in 2019.

PATRICK MAHOMES, Kansas City, needs 34 touchdown passes to become the third quarterback with at least 110 touchdown passes in his first four seasons in NFL history, joining Dan Marino (142) and Kurt Warner (111).

Mahomes can become the first quarterback in NFL history to reach 10,000 career passing yards in 35-or-fewer games. Mahomes enters 2020 with 9,412 passing yards in 31 career games. He can also become the first quarterback in NFL history with at least 4,000 passing yards in three of his first four NFL seasons. Mahomes had at least 4,000 passing yards in both 2018 and 2019.

Mahomes can become the fourth quarterback (joining Peyton Manning, Dan Marino and Russell Wilson) in NFL history with at least 25 touchdown passes in three of his first four NFL seasons. Mahomes had 50 touchdown passes in 2018 and 26 touchdown passes in 2019.



BAKER MAYFIELD, Cleveland, needs at least 3,500 passing yards to join Andrew Luck (2012-14), Peyton Manning (1998-2000) and Jameis Winston (2015-17) as the only players with at least 3,500 passing yards in each of their first three seasons in NFL history. With at least 3,500 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes, Mayfield would join Luck and Manning as the only players to do so in each of their first three seasons in league history.

CHRISTIAN MCCAFFREY, Carolina, needs at least 1,000 receiving and 1,000 rushing yards to become the first player in NFL history to accomplish the feat in multiple seasons. McCaffrey also needs 97 receptions to become the third player in NFL history with 400 receptions through his first four seasons, joining Michael Thomas (470) and Jarvis Landry (400).

McCaffrey needs at least 2,000 scrimmage yards to become the 11th player in NFL history to record 2,000 scrimmage yards in consecutive seasons. With 1,557 scrimmage yards, he would become the seventh player in NFL history with at least 7,000 scrimmage yards through his first four seasons.

McCaffrey need 80 rushing yards and 477 receiving yards to become the first player in NFL history with 3,000 rushing and 3,000 receiving yards in his first four seasons. With six rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns, he would become the first player in NFL history with 30 rushing touchdowns and 20 receiving touchdowns in his first four seasons.

VON MILLER, Denver, needs 14 sacks to become the fourth player with 120 sacks in his first 10 seasons since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic. Miller has 106 sacks in his first nine career seasons. Miller also needs 10 sacks to become the seventh player since 1982 with at least 10 sacks in eight of his first 10 NFL seasons.

KYLER MURRAY, Arizona, can become the fifth quarterback in NFL history with at least 3,500 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes in each of his first two seasons. Murray also needs 500 rushing yards to become the fourth quarterback since 1970 to rush for at least 500 rushing yards in each of his first two seasons.

ADRIAN PETERSON, Washington, needs 1,054 rushing yards to surpass Barry Sanders (15,269) for fourth place on the all-time rushing list. Peterson also needs 13 rushing touchdowns to surpass Marcus Allen (123) for third place on the all-time rushing touchdown list.

Peterson needs 750 rushing yards to become the third player in NFL history to accomplish the feat in at least 11 different seasons, joining Emmitt Smith (14 seasons) and Frank Gore (12). With five rushing touchdowns, he would become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in at least 11 different seasons, joining Marcus Allen (13), Emmitt Smith (12) and Walter Payton (11).

DAK PRESCOTT, Dallas, could join Peyton Manning (1998-2002) and Russell Wilson (2012-16) as the only players with at least 3,000 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes in each of their first five seasons in NFL history. Prescott also needs four rushing touchdowns and three touchdown passes to join Cam Newton (2011-15) as the only players with at least 100 touchdown passes and 25 rushing touchdowns through their first five seasons in NFL history.

PHILIP RIVERS, Indianapolis, needs 2,091 passing yards to surpass Dan Marino (61,361) for fifth place on the all-time passing yards list. Rivers also needs 24 touchdown passes to surpass Dan Marino (420) for fifth place on the all-time passing touchdowns list.

With 60 completed passes, Rivers would surpass Dan Marino (4,967) for fifth place on the all-time completions list.

AARON RODGERS, Green Bay, needs 3,054 passing yards to become the 11th quarterback to reach 50,000 career passing yards in NFL history. Rodgers also needs three touchdown passes to surpass Eli Manning (366) for the seventh-most career touchdown passes in NFL history.

BEN ROETHLISBERGER, Pittsburgh, needs one game with at least 300 passing yards to tie Brett Favre (62 games) for the seventh-most such career games in NFL history. Ryan also needs 3,643 passing yards to surpass Peyton Manning (54,828 yards) for the most passing yards through a player's first 13 seasons in NFL history.

MATTHEW STAFFORD, Detroit, needs 4,149 passing yards to surpass Dan Marino (45,173) for the fourth-most passing yards through a player's first 12 seasons in NFL history.

MICHAEL THOMAS, New Orleans, needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the fourth player in NFL history to have at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first five seasons, joining Mike Evans, A.J. Green and Randy Moss. Thomas also needs 100 receptions to become the third player in NFL history to have at least 100 receptions in four consecutive seasons, joining Antonio Brown (six seasons) and Marvin Harrison (four).

Thomas needs 90 receptions to become the first player in NFL history with at least 90 receptions in each of his first five seasons. With 1,273 receiving yards he would surpass Torry Holt (6,784 receiving yards) for the most receiving yards in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. Thomas needs 12 receptions to surpass Jarvis Landry (481 receptions) for the most receptions in a player's first five seasons in NFL history.

DESHAUN WATSON, Houston, needs 29 touchdown passes to become the sixth player in NFL history with at least 100 touchdown passes in his first four seasons. Watson also needs 21 touchdown passes and six rushing touchdowns to become the first player in NFL history with at least 100 passing touchdowns and 20 rushing touchdowns in his first four seasons.

T.J. WATT, Pittsburgh, needs at least 13 sacks to join Reggie White (four seasons) and Derrick Thomas (three) as the only players to record at least 13 sacks in three of their first four seasons since 1982, when the individual sack became an official NFL statistic. Watt recorded 13 sacks in 2018 and 14.5 sacks in 2019.

RUSSELL WILSON, Seattle, needs seven wins to surpass Peyton Manning (92) for the most wins by a quarterback in his first nine seasons in NFL history. Wilson has won 86 games in his first eight seasons. Wilson also needs seven wins to surpass Tom Brady (101) for the most wins, including the postseason, by a quarterback in his first nine seasons in NFL history.

JASON WITTEN, Las Vegas, needs 60 receptions for his 16th career season with at least 60 receptions, the second-most in NFL history, trailing only Jerry Rice (17).

Witten needs 85 receptions to become the second tight end and fourth player in NFL history with at least 1,300 career receptions. With 23 receiving yards, he would become the second tight end in NFL history with 13,000 receiving yards, joining Tony Gonzalez (15,127).

Mahomes, who had at least 300 passing yards in 10 games during the 2018 season and in seven games during 2019, can become the fourth quarterback with at least seven such games in three consecutive seasons in NFL history. VETERAN **LEADERS**

2020 marks the 17th season for new Indianapolis Colts quarterback **PHILIP RIVERS** and Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback **BEN ROETHLISBERGER**, chosen fourth and 11th overall, respectively, in the 2004 NFL Draft.

Over the course of their careers, Rivers (Chargers) and Roethlisberger (Steelers) have both become their respective franchise leaders in passing yards and touchdown passes, and the duo represents two of the eight players in NFL history with at least 50,000 passing yards and 350 touchdown passes in their careers.

Led by Rivers, Roethlisberger and former New York Giant **ELI MANNING**, who retired this offseason, the 2004 quarterback draft class ranks as one of the most successful groups in the common draft era.

Indianapolis quarterback **PHILIP RIVERS** comes to the Colts after a 16-year career with the Chargers where he complied 59,271 passing yards and 397 passing touchdowns, both sixth-most in league history.

With at least 2,091 passing yards and 24 touchdown passes this season, he would surpass Pro Football Hall of Famer **DAN MARINO** for fifth place on the all-time list for each statistic.

In 2019, Rivers led the AFC with 4,615 passing yards, his 11th career season with at least 4,000 yards, tied with **TOM BRADY** for the third-most such seasons in league annals. Only **PEYTON MANNING** (14 seasons) and **DREW BREES** (12) have more.

With at least 4,000 passing yards in 2020, Rivers will have reached that mark in eight consecutive seasons, tied with Manning (eight) for the third-longest such streak in NFL history.

Pittsburgh quarterback BEN ROETHLISBERGER comes into this season ranking eighth in league history with 56,545 passing yards and ninth all-time in passing touchdowns (363).

Before an injury that forced him to miss all but two games last season, he led the NFL with 5,129 passing yards in 2018 and is one of eight different players to surpass 5,000 passing yards in a single season in league annals.

He also led all rookie quarterbacks with 544 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns. joining CAM NEWTON (2011) as the only rookie quarterbacks to record at least 3,500 passing yards and 500 rushing yards in NFL history.

If Murray rushes for at least 500 yards again in 2020, he will become the fourth quarterback to rush for at least 500 yards in each of his first two seasons since 1970.

Minshew, a sixth-round selection by the Jaguars in the 2019 NFL Draft, led all rookies with a 91.2 passer rating last season, while throwing for 3,271 yards and 21 touchdowns, both Jacksonville franchise rookie records.

Minshew also only threw six interceptions in 2019, becoming the fourth rookie in league history to throw for at least 20 touchdowns and fewer than 10 interceptions.

Jones the No. 6 overall selection in the 2019 NFL Draft, led all rookies with 24 touchdown passes, while passing for 3,027 yards and an 87.7 passer rating last season.

In his first career start, Jones became the first rookie with at least 300 passing yards, two passing touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns in a single game since 1970. He also passed for at least four touchdowns in three different games in 2019, becoming the third rookie quarterback with at least three such games in league annals.

The NFL is full of young starting quarterbacks aged 25 or younger who have quickly established themselves as standout performers and enter 2020 aiming to take that next step towards greatness.

Buffalo's **JOSH ALLEN** (24 years old) enters his third NFL season after having set career-highs in passing yards (3,089), touchdown passes (20), passer rating (85.3) and rushing touchdowns (nine) in 2019, while leading the Bills to 10 wins for the first time since 1999.

His nine rushing touchdowns led all quarterbacks, and his 17 career rushing touchdowns are the second-most by a quarterback through their first two seasons since 1970, trailing only CAM **NEWTON** (22). In 2020, he has the chance to become the first quarterback in league annals to rush for at least eight touchdowns in three consecutive seasons.

ROOKIE QBs IN 2020

Four quarterbacks – LSU's **JOE BURROW** (No. 1 overall, Cincinnati), Alabama's **TUA TAGOVAILOA** (No. 5, Miami), Oregon's **JUSTIN HERBERT** (No. 6, Los Angeles Chargers) and Utah State's **JORDAN LOVE** (No. 26, Green Bay) – were selected in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft. 2020 became the sixth NFL Draft since 1967 and second in the last three years (2018) to have three quarterbacks selected in the top-10.

The 2020 NFL Draft marked the seventh consecutive draft with at least two quarterbacks chosen in the first round, the second-longest such streak in the common draft era (2002-12: 11 consecutive drafts) and the fifth consecutive draft with at least three quarterbacks selected in the first round, tied for the longest such streak in the common draft era (2002-06: five consecutive drafts).

Last season, the Arizona Cardinals started **KYLER MURRAY**, the No. 1 overall selection in the 2019 Draft, on Kickoff Weekend. At least one rookie quarterback has started in Week 1 in 12 consecutive seasons, the longest streak in the NFL since at least 1950.

Eleven quarterbacks passed for at least 4,000 yards in 2019, including four with at least 4,500 passing yards: Tampa Bay's **JAMEIS WINSTON** (5,109), Dallas' **DAK PRESCOTT** (4,902), the Los Angeles Rams' **JARED GOFF** (4,638) and the Los Angeles Chargers' **PHILIP RIVERS** (4,615).

Twelve quarterbacks threw at least 25 touchdown passes last season, including four with at least 30 touchdown passes: Baltimore's **LAMAR JACKSON** (36), Winston (33), Seattle's **RUSSELL WILSON** (31) and Prescott (30).

Three rookie quarterbacks – New York Giants' **DANIEL JONES**, Jacksonville's **GARDNER MINSHEW** and Arizona's **KYLER MURRAY** – each passed for at least 20 touchdowns in 2019, marking the second season in league annals in which at least three rookie quarterbacks each passed for at least 20 touchdowns (2012 – **ROBERT GRIFFIN III, ANDREW LUCK** and **RUSSELL WILSON**).

Nine quarterbacks had a passer rating of 100 or higher last season, including three with a passer rating of at least 110: Tennessee's **RYAN TANNEHILL** (117.5), New Orleans' **DREW BREES** (116.3) and Jackson (113.3).

The nine quarterbacks with a passer rating of 100 or higher were tied with the 2018 season for the most in a single season in NFL history.

The 2019 season featured many exciting games that came down to the wire.

Tennessee quarterback **RYAN TANNEHILL** led the NFL with a 123.3 passer rating in the fourth quarter and overtime last season (min. 75 pass attempts), becoming the third quarterback since 1991 to record a passer rating of 120-or-higher in the fourth quarter and overtime since 1991.

In total, ten quarterbacks registered a passer rating of 100-or-higher in the fourth quarter and overtime in 2019 (min. 75 pass attempts).

The 2019 campaign marked Jones' sixth consecutive season with at least 1,250 receiving yards, joining TORRY HOLT (2000-05) and ANTONIO BROWN (2013-18) as the only players to accomplish that feat.

If Jones has at least 1,250 receiving yards in 2020, he would become the first player to reach 1,250 receiving yards in seven consecutive seasons in league history.

Jones had six games with at least 100 receiving yards last season, tied for the second-most in the NFL. He now has 55 career games with at least 100 receiving yards, the fourth-most in league history, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famers JERRY RICE (76 games), RANDY MOSS (64) and MARVIN HARRISON (59).

Entering the 2020 season, Jones needs 1,151 receiving yards to surpass Pro Football Hall of Famer **JERRY RICE** (13,275 yards) for the most receiving yards through a player's first 10 seasons in NFL history.

In 2019, five rookies recorded at least seven touchdown receptions in 2019: Tennessee's A.J. BROWN (eight), the New York Giants' DARIUS SLAYTON (eight), Baltimore's MARQUISE BROWN (seven), Washington's TERRY MCLAURIN (seven) and Seattle's DK METCALF (seven).

2019 also joined 2014 as the only seasons with at least three rookie wide receivers each with at least 900 receiving yards, as A.J. Brown (1,051 receiving yards), McLaurin (919) and Metcalf (900) all reached the mark.

Tennessee's **A.J. BROWN** led all rookies with 1,051 receiving yards in 2019. He also tied for the league among rookies with eight receiving touchdowns, four of which were of at least 50 yards. Brown joined **ISAAC CURTIS** (five in 1973), **WILLIE GAULT** (four in 1983) and Pro Football Hall of Famer **RANDY MOSS** (five in 1998) as the only rookies with at least four touchdown receptions of 50-or-more yards since 1970.

Baltimore's **MARQUISE BROWN** led the team's wide receivers with 46 catches for 584 yards and seven touchdowns and in Week 1,

became the first player in NFL history with two touchdown receptions of at least 40 yards in his NFL debut. One of those touchdowns was for 83 yards, the second-longest touchdown by a player in his NFL debut in the Super Bowl era.

As J.J. enters his 10th NFL season, his four seasons with at least 15 sacks (2013-15, 2018) are the second-most among all players since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer **REGGIE WHITE** (five seasons).

Last season, he became the sixth player with at least 25 career games with multiple sacks in his first nine seasons since 1982.

J.J.'s brother, Pittsburgh linebacker **T.J. WATT**, has also established himself as one of the premier pass rushers in the league. His career-high 14.5 sacks in 2019 led the AFC while his eight forced fumbles were tied for the most in the NFL.

In 2019, five players registered at least five forced fumbles: Arizona's **CHANDLER JONES** (eight), Pittsburgh's **T.J. WATT** (eight), Tampa Bay's **SHAQUIL BARRETT** (six), Washington's **RYAN ANDERSON** (five) and Chicago's **KHALIL MACK** (five).

It marked the first season since 2002 (**DWIGHT FREENEY** and **LEONARD LITTLE**, each with nine) that two players had at least eight forced fumbles in the same season.

In addition to pass rushers stripping the ball, defensive backs have become adept at knocking the ball loose.

Three defensive backs – Philadelphia's **MALCOLM JENKINS**, Tennessee's **LOGAN RYAN** and San Francisco's **K'WAUN WILLIAMS** – each recorded four forced fumbles last season, marking the first time since 2012 that at least three defensive backs recorded four forced fumbles in the same season.





For the third time in the last four years, two defensive players were taken in the top three picks of the 2020 NFL Draft - Ohio State's CHASE YOUNG (No. 2, Washington) and JEFF OKUDAH (No. 3, Detroit.).

Young and Okudah became the first pair of college teammates to be chosen with consecutive top-three selections since the 2000 NFL Draft, when Penn State saw COURTNEY BROWN (Cleveland, No. 1) and LAVAR ARRINGTON (Washington, No.

Additionally, along with the selections of **DENZEL WARD** (Cleveland, No. 4 overall in 2018) and NICK BOSA (San Francisco, No. 2 in 2019), Ohio State became the first school to have a defensive player selected in the topfive in three consecutive Drafts in the common draft era.

It marked the fifth time that a school has had two defensive backs selected in the top-20 in the common draft era and the first time since 2017 [Ohio State - MARSHON LATTIMORE (New Orleans, No. 11) and MALIK HOOKER (Indianapolis, No.

Defensive tackle **DERRICK BROWN** (No. 7, Carolina), linebacker ISAIAH SIMMONS (No. 8, Arizona) and cornerback C.J. **HENDERSON** (No. 9, Jacksonville) were the other defensive players selected in the top 10 and will look to make immediate impacts on

Brown became the first defensive tackle from Auburn to be selected in the top-ten in the common draft era, while Simmons became the fourth defensive player from Clemson selected in the top-ten since 2000.

PROTECTING THE

OUARTERBACK

Protecting the quarterback is vital to NFL success.

With such a premium placed on keeping the quarterback out of harm's way, it is no surprise that teams have made it a priority to draft offensive tackles. Four offensive linemen - ANDREW THOMAS (New York Giants, No. 4 overall), JEDRICK WILLS (Cleveland, No. 10), MEKHI BECTON (New York Jets, No. 11) and TRISTAN WIRFS (Tampa Bay, No. 13) - were chosen among the top-15 selections of the 2020 NFL Draft, marking the third Draft since 2000 in which at least four offensive linemen were selected in the top-15 picks (2013 Draft - six offensive linemen; 2008 Draft - four).

Last season, seven of the eight teams which allowed fewer than 30 sacks in 2019 finished with at least a .500 record and of those eight, five earned postseason berths.

The **LOS ANGELES RAMS**, led by four-time Pro Bowl selection **ANDREW WHITWORTH**, allowed the fewest sacks in the league (22) and held opponents to two-or-fewer sacks in nine of their final 10 games of the 2019 season.

The **NEW ORLEANS SAINTS**, who tied for third with 25 sacks allowed last season, are the only team to allow 25 or fewer sacks in each of the past three seasons (20 sacks allowed in 2017 and 2018).

MANY HAPPY **RETURNS**

The 2019 season featured many exciting plays in the return game, as players from around the league provided exhilarating action throughout the season.

Among qualified players, Pittsburgh rookie wide receiver **DIONTAE JOHNSON** led the NFL in punt-return average (12.4 yards) while Cincinnati safety **BRANDON WILSON** led the league in kick-return average (31.3).

New Orleans Saints return specialist **DEONTE HARRIS**, who earned Pro Bowl honors as a rookie last season, was the only player in the league to finish in the top-five in both punt-return and kickoff-return average.

2019 RETURN HIGLIGHTS:

JAMAL AGNEW, Detroit – Was the only player last season to record both a punt return and kick return touchdown. He registered a 100-yard kick return for a touchdown in Week 3 and added a 64-yard punt return for a touchdown in Week 16. His three punt-return touchdowns since he entered the league in 2017 are the most in the NFL.

JAKEEM GRANT, Miami – Recorded a 101-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Week 11 and became the fourth player in NFL history with at least two kick-return touchdowns of 100 yards and two punt-return touchdowns of 70 yards in his first four seasons.

MECOLE HARDMAN, Kansas City – Registered a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Week 17 and became the fourth player and first rookie in NFL history with a kick return touchdown of at least 100 yards and touchdown reception of at least 80 yards in the same season in NFL history.

NYHEIM HINES, Indianapolis - In Week 16, recorded punt-return touchdowns of 84 and 71 yards, becoming the fifth player with at least two punt-return touchdowns of 70-or-more yards in a single game in NFL history.

CORDARRELLE PATTERSON, Chicago - In Week 7 of the 2019 season, registered a 102-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, marking his seventh career kick return touchdown, tied for the third-most in NFL history. Only **JOSH CRIBBS** (eight) and **LEON WASHINGTON** (eight) have more.

Having a productive and reliable kicker is as important as ever in the NFL, as close games are a fixture on Sundays, when a missed or made field goal is the difference between a win or a loss.

Nobody proved that more in 2019 than Kansas City's **HARRISON BUTKER**, who led the league with 147 points scored during the Chiefs' Super Bowl season.

In Week 9, Butker made history, becoming the first kicker since **MARTIN GRAMATICA** (October 27, 2002) to make a game-tying field goal of at least 50 yards and a field goal of at least 40 yards to put his team ahead for good with both coming in the final three minutes of the fourth quarter.

Last season, Detroit's **MATT PRATER** converted seven field goals of at least 50 yards, trailing only Carolina's **JOEY SLYE** (eight).

Prater now has 53 career made field goals of at least 50 yards, trailing only

SEBASITAN JANIKOWSKI (58) for the second-most since 1991.

Not only can they all share the experience, but brothers also can share the field and sidelines.

Day 2 of the 2020 NFL Draft saw three players join their brothers in the NFL: Dallas cornerback TREVON DIGGS (No. 51 overall, brother of Buffalo wide

Day 2 of the 2020 NFL Draft saw three players join their brothers in the NFL: Dallas cornerback **TREVON DIGGS** (No. 51 overall, brother of Buffalo wide receiver **STEFON DIGGS**), Detroit defensive end **JULIAN OKWARA** (No. 67, brother of Detroit defensive end **ROMEO OKWARA**) and Atlanta center **MATT HENNESSY** (No. 78, brother of N.Y. Jets long snapper **THOMAS HENNESSY**).

During the 2019 NFL Draft, the San Francisco 49ers selected defensive end **NICK BOSA** with the second overall pick, joining his brother, Los Angeles Chargers defensive end **JOEY BOSA**, the No. 3 overall selection in 2016, in the NFL.

Along with their father, **JOHN BOSA**, who was a first-round pick of the Dolphins in 1987, the Bosa family became the second family in NFL history to have a father and two sons chosen in the first round of the NFL Draft, joining **ARCHIE MANNING** and sons **ELI** and **PEYTON**.

The 2018 NFL Draft featured the first pair of brothers to be drafted in the first round of the same draft, as Pittsburgh safety **TERRELL EDMUNDS** was selected 28th overall and Buffalo linebacker **TREMAINE EDMUNDS** was selected 16th overall. Terrell and Tremaine's brother, running back **TREY EDMUNDS**, spent the last two seasons (2018-19) as Terrell's teammate in Pittsburgh. Their father, **FERRELL EDMUNDS**, was a two-time Pro Bowl selection at tight end during his seven-year NFL career with Miami and Seattle.

The **WATT**s – Houston defensive end **J.J.**, and Pittsburgh's fullback **DEREK** and linebacker **T.J.** – are the only other set of three brothers currently in the league.

Detroit and Pittsburgh are two of the four teams to feature teammate brothers this season, joining the New England Patriots (safety **DEVIN** and cornerback **JASON McCOURTY**) and the Seattle Seahawks (linebacker **SHAQUEM** and cornerback **SHAQUILL GRIFFIN**).

SAME FACES, **NEW PLACES**

Whether through free agency or trades, this offseason contained big-name moves that may alter the landscape of the 2020 NFL season.


The Tampa Bay Buccaneers headlined the offseason by luring six-time Super Bowl champion quarterback **TOM BRADY** to Tampa Bay after a 20-year career with the New England Patriots. The Bucs also completed a trade with New England to acquire formerly retired five-time Pro Bowl tight end **ROB GRONKOWSKI**.

"Tom is, quite simply, the greatest quarterback to play the game of football," said Tampa Bay General Manager Jason Licht. "Any time you can add someone of his caliber, you instantly make your organization better. Going after Tom in free agency was our number one priority this offseason because we knew he would be a perfect fit for what we are trying to do here."

Brady wasn't the only decorated quarterback on the move this past offseason, as the Chargers' franchise passing leader in every major category, PHILIP RIVERS, made the move from Los Angeles to Indianapolis while former Super Bowl MVPs NICK FOLES, (traded from Jacksonville to Chicago) and JOE FLACCO (signed with the New York Jets) were on the move. The 2015 league MVP, CAM NEWTON, signed with New England, as TEDDY BRIDGEWATER (right, top)is expected to take over the starting job in Carolina. Meanwhile, the top two picks from the 2015 NFL Draft, JAMEIS WINSTON and MARCUS MARIOTA, head to New Orleans and Las Vegas, respectively.

Two of the top receivers in the league were also on the move via trade this offseason, while a pair of future Hall of Fame tight ends switched teams for 2020. Wide receiver **STEFON DIGGS**, who has recorded at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, was traded from Minnesota to Buffalo, while **DEANDRE HOPKINS**, who ranks third in the NFL in receiving yards since entering the league in 2013, was traded from Houston to Arizona. Tight ends **GREG OLSEN** (from Carolina to Seattle) and **JASON WITTEN** (from Dallas to Las Vegas) rank fifth and second, respectively, on the all-time tight end receiving yard list, and will don new uniforms in 2020.

A number of other former Pro Bowlers will wear new uniforms this season, including: running backs MELVIN GORDON (Denver, right, below), TODD GURLEY (Atlanta) and LESEAN MCCOY (Tampa Bay); wide receiver RANDALL COBB (Houston); tight ends ERIC EBRON (Pittsburgh) and AUSTIN HOOPER (Cleveland); offensive linemen RUSSELL OKUNG (Carolina) and TRAI TURNER (Los Angeles Chargers); defensive end CALAIS CAMPBELL (Baltimore); defensive tackles DEFOREST BUCKNER (Indianapolis), JURRELL CASEY (Denver) and LINVAL JOSEPH (Los Angeles Chargers); linebackers VIC BEASLEY (Tennessee), JAMIE COLLINS (Detroit), THOMAS DAVIS (Washington), LEONARD FLOYD (Los Angeles Rams) and ROBERT QUINN (Chicago); cornerbacks A.J. BOUYE (Denver), CHRIS HARRIS JR. (Los Angeles Chargers), BYRON JONES (Miami), JOSH NORMAN (Buffalo), XAVIER RHODES (Indianapolis) and DESMOND TRUFANT (Detroit); and safeties HA HA CLINTON DIX (Dallas) and MALCOLM JENKINS (New Orleans).

Undrafted out of Western Colorado in 2017, Los Angeles Chargers running back **AUSTIN EKELER** has emerged as one of the premier dual-threat running backs in the NFL. Last season, he registered 92 receptions for 993 yards and eight touchdowns, all the most by an undrafted running back in a single season in the common draft era.

NOT DRAFTED?

NOT A PROBLEM

In Week 1 of the 2019 season, Ekeler became the first undrafted player to record at least 150 scrimmage yards, two receiving touchdowns and a rushing touchdown in a single game since **DAN REEVES** (156 scrimmage yards, two rushing touchdowns and two receiving touchdowns) on November 5, 1967.

In Week 14, he joined **ARIAN FOSTER** (Week 7, 2011), **PRIEST HOLMES** (Week 13, 2001 and Week 12, 2002) and **PIERRE THOMAS** (Week 17, 2007) as the only undrafted running back to have at least 100 rushing yards and 100 receiving yards in a single game in the common draft era.

One of Ekeler's AFC West counterparts, Denver Broncos running back **PHILLIP LINDSAY** has shined in his first two seasons after going undrafted in 2018 out of Colorado.

Last season, he totaled 1,207 scrimmage yards and became the third undrafted player with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his first two seasons in the common draft era. With his 1,011 rushing yards in 2019, Lindsay became the first undrafted player to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons since 1967.

Defensively, Tampa Bay linebacker **SHAQUIL BARRETT**, undrafted out of Colorado State in 2014, put up a historic year during his first season with the Buccaneers in 2019. He led the league with a franchise record 19.5 sacks, the second-most sacks in a single season by an undrafted player since 1982. Additionally, Barrett's 19 tackles for loss were the most by an undrafted player since **CAMERON WAKE** (21 tackles for loss) in 2010.

There are 20 members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame who began their careers as undrafted free agents, with **CLIFF HARRIS**, **DONNIE SHELL** and **ED SPRINKLE** being the most recent inductees as part of the Centennial Slate for the Class of 2020.

They may not come from big-time schools in major NCAA conferences, but their NFL contributions cannot go unnoticed. Productive players from small schools are proofpositive of the old adage, "If you can play, the NFL will find you."

Possibly no player shows the potential worth of small-school players more than San Francisco quarterback **JIMMY GAROPPOLO**. A product of Eastern Illinois, a member of the Ohio Valley Conference, Garoppolo owns a 21-5 (.808) record as a starting quarterback, the second-highest winning percentage by a quarterback through his first 25 career starts in NFL history. Garoppolo led the 49ers to 13 wins and a Super Bowl LIV appearance in 2019.

NFL teams continue to scout at all levels looking to find talent. The first non-NCAA Division I player selected in the 2020 NFL Draft was defensive back **KYLE DUGGER** out of Lenoir-Rhyne, who was chosen 37th overall by the New England Patriots.

"We can't control where they play. The only thing we can control is our evaluation, how we look at the player," said New England Director of Player Personnel NICK CASERIO about players from small schools after the selection of Dugger. "You have to take the information you have accessible. That's really what we're doing with all of these players because none of them have played a snap of NFL football regardless of where they played or have come from. It's not really about where they come from or how they do it, it's what they do while they're here."

ART ROONEY **SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD**



Washington running back **ADRIAN PETERSON** was voted the winner of the 2019 **ART ROONEY SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD**, which recognizes the NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of outstanding sportsmanship on the playing field, including fair play, respect for opponents and integrity in competition.

"It means a lot," Peterson said. "When it came out, I was just smiling ear to ear because it goes to show the person that you are -- and it comes naturally -- is seen, is noticed and recognized by your peers. It is a blessing. There's been great winners before, and to be able to be added to that group, it's a dream come true."

The award was founded in 2014 in honor of the late founding owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Pro Football Hall of Famer **ART ROONEY SR**. Past recipients of the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award are **DREW BREES** of the New Orleans Saints (2018), **LUKE KUECHLY** of the Carolina Panthers (2017), **FRANK GORE** of the Indianapolis Colts (2016), **CHARLES WOODSON** of the Oakland Raiders (2015) and **LARRY FITZGERALD** of the Arizona Cardinals (2014).

A 13-year NFL veteran, Peterson ranks fourth all-time in rushing touchdowns (111) and fifth in rushing yards (14,216). A seven-time Pro Bowl selection, he has led the league in rushing yards three times (2008, 2012 and 2015) and twice either tied for the lead or led the NFL in rushing touchdowns (2009 and 2015). In 2012, Peterson rushed for a career-high 2,097 yards, the second-most in a single season in league annals, en route to Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year honors.

Each NFL team nominated one of its players for the award, which recognizes players who exemplify outstanding sportsmanship on the field. A panel of former players from the NFL Legends Community selected eight finalists (four in the AFC; four in the NFC) from the 32 nominees. The panel of Legends Coordinators was comprised of **WARRICK DUNN**, Pro Football Hall of Famer **CURTIS MARTIN**, **KARL MECKLENBURG** and **LEONARD WHEELER**.

The eight finalists were listed on the Pro Bowl ballot under the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. From the finalists, each team's players submitted a consensus vote of their choice for the winner. As in Pro Bowl voting, a team could not vote for its own player.

The Art Rooney Trophy represents the important role that sportsmanship plays in the game and how NFL players that demonstrate integrity and honor on the field serve as role models for other players at all levels. The award design was inspired by the upward arc of a football in motion and contains a gold line embedded in glass that represents the path of sportsmanship throughout a career. Etched into the award are the words "integrity," "honor," "respect," and "fairness," the values that define excellent sportsmanship.

The finalists, featuring four players from each conference, were defensive end CALAIS CAMPBELL (Jacksonville), linebacker THOMAS DAVIS (Los Angeles Chargers), wide receiver T.Y. HILTON (Indianapolis) and wide receiver MATTHEW SLATER (New England) in the AFC, and running back ADRIAN PETERSON (Washington), quarterback MATTHEW STAFFORD (Detroit), tackle JOE STALEY (San Francisco) and safety ERIC WEDDLE (L.A. Rams) in the NFC.

NFL Network analyst **DANIEL JEREMIAH** has taken a "first look" at some of college football's top players that are expected to be the future stars of the league in the coming years.

Jeremiah's top players that are elibile for the 2021 NFL Draft, listed by position, alphabetically:

QB JUSTIN FIELDS, Ohio State (6-3/228, junior): "Fields has a full skill set. In the passing game, he's at his best when he's on time and in rhythm. He shows the ability to deliver the ball with anticipation and accuracy on drive throws down the field. He's also very effective as a runner. When he sees a lane open up, he's quick to take those free yards. His overall competitiveness is excellent."



PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER GIL BRANDT ON THE QUARTERBACK CLASS OF THE 2021 DRAFT

Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2019, Brandt was a highly-regarded personnel administrator during his 29-year career with the Dallas Cowboys (1960-1988) and helped Dallas grow into one of the most powerful and popular sports franchises in America. His innovative management and personnel systems are standard operating procedure today.

Brandt: There are three guys that I think are first round picks.

JUSTIN FIELDS (Ohio State) completed 67.2% of his passes for 3,273 yards with 41 touchdowns and three interceptions. Very athletic. He's got a good plus arm and he can run. Last year, he rushed for 484 yards and 10 touchdowns.

TREY LANCE (North Dakota State) completed 66.9% of his passes last year for 28 touchdowns, 14 rushing touchdowns and no interceptions. He reminds me a great deal of Andrew Luck. From a small town of Marshall, Minnesota and was only lightly recruited.

TREVOR LAWRENCE (Clemson) completed 65.8% of his passes last year for 3,665 yards with 36 touchdowns and eight interceptions. Very athletic player with a good arm. He has started and won every year since his freshman year in high school.

Clemson (5-10/210, senior):
"Etienne can be best described with these three words: explosive, tough, instinctive. He has a dynamic burst whether he's running inside or outside. He has good vision and shows the power to step through tackles consistently. His contact balance is exceptional. Defenders bounce off his legs."

WR JA'MARR CHASE, LSU (6-0/208, junior): "Chase has an exceptional blend of quickness, strength and playmaking ability. He lines up outside and inside in the formation. He has strong/powerful hands to attack the ball and win in heavy traffic. He shows no fear working the middle of the field. Once the ball goes up in the air, you can see him accelerate and separate. He's a special, special talent."

WR DEVONTA

SMITH, Alabama (6-1/175, senior): "Smith is a smooth, fluid route runner with outstanding body control, hands and toughness. He can play inside or outside and uses his quickness to routinely defeat press coverage. He has outstanding concentration and hands to finish in traffic. After the catch, he is extremely elusive, consistently making the first defender miss. I love guys who play big in big moments. That's what Smith has always done."

TE KYLE PITTS, Florida (6-6/239, junior): "Pitts is tall, long and ultra athletic. I love his athleticism, but I was even more impressed with his instincts and savvy as a route runner. He understands how to work and settle in space versus zone coverage and he also has a good feel for attacking the leverage of his defender. That bodes well for his adjustment to the NFL game."

T PENEI SEWELL, Oregon (6-6/330, junior): "Sewell has ideal size, quickness and power for the position. In the passing game, he's quick out of his stance and does a nice job of staying square against his opponent. In the run game, Sewell consistently gets underneath defenders, uproots and moves them off the line of scrimmage. I love his

overall demeanor and toughness."

Miami (6-7/253, sophomore): "If I had to limit my evaluation to a two-word description, it would be consistently dominant. Rousseau was clearly the best player on the field in all of the games I studied. He can win with his speed/quickness and his hands are very polished. He's extremely long and does a nice job pressing out blocks before escaping to create pressure."

LB MICAH PARSONS, Penn State (6-3/244, junior): "There is plenty to like about Parsons' game. First of all, he has a big, athletic build for the position. His play speed is excellent, and he has the versatility to play off the ball or on the edge. Parsons also excels against the pass. He can cover backs and tight ends all over

the field. He has phenomenal timing and burst. His overall instincts are top-notch."

CB SHAUN WADE, Ohio State (6-1/195, junior): "Wade has ideal size/ length and he plays with tremendous awareness. He primarily aligns in the slot, but he will roll back to the deep middle in some of Ohio State's coverage schemes. In man coverage, Wade is patient and avoids false steps. He's a smooth, fluid mover and he can build speed to catch up down the field. He's also a very reliable tackler. I love his overall toughness and demeanor."

NFL CONTINUES WAY TO PLAY INITIATIVE FOR CURRENT PLAYERS AND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT-ATHLETES

Recognizing proper in-game technique, the weekly NFL Way to Play High School Award will be extended to Spring 2021

The NFL announced the continuation of the Way to Play initiative, helping highlight proper playing technique to protect players from unnecessary risk and to foster culture change across all levels of the sport.

For the third year, the **NFL WAY TO PLAY AWARD** will recognize the excellence demonstrated by NFL players who exemplify proper technique to make impactful plays. Each recipient of the Way to Play Award will receive a \$2,500 equipment grant through USA Football to be awarded to the local youth or high school football program of the player's choosing.

"The Way to Play Award is about excellence in football through using proper technique that protects players from unnecessary risk," said TROY VINCENT, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations. "This award incentivizes strong fundamental playing technique, demonstrates best practices, and at the same time, benefits youth and high school football."

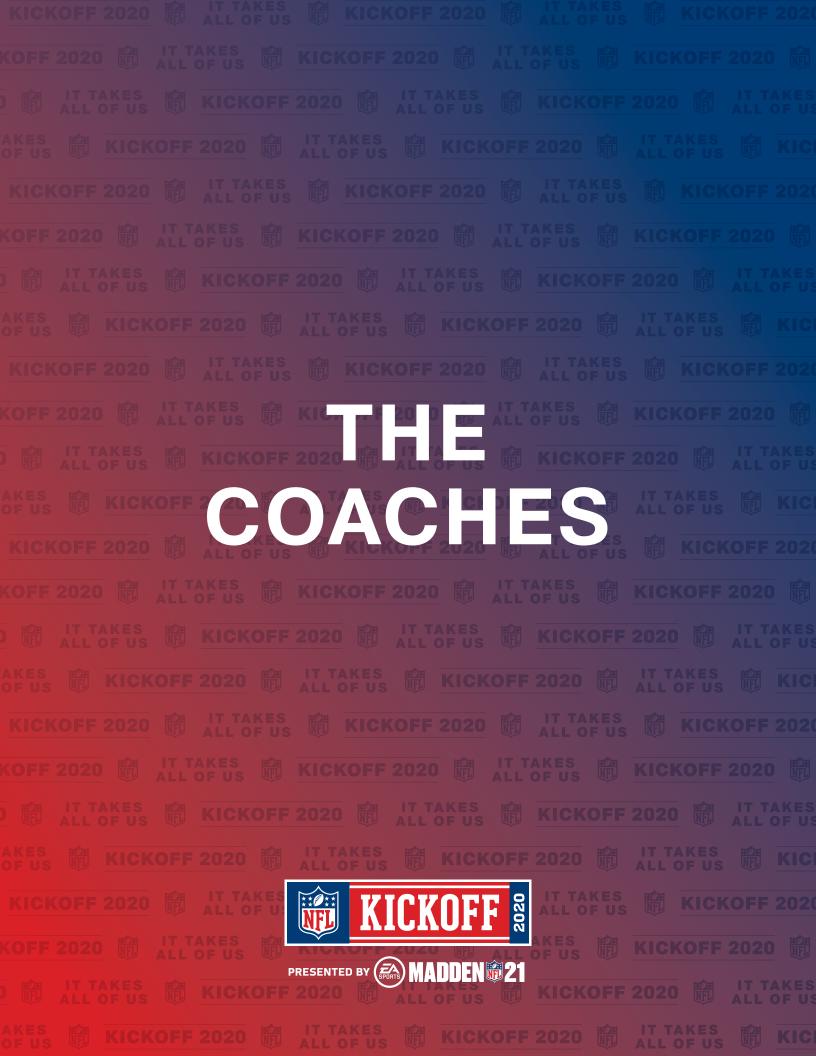
The NFL Football Operations and Officiating departments will select the top nominees for the award recognizing current NFL players. Video of those plays will be shared with an expert panel consisting of **MERRIL HOGE**, **RONNIE LOTT**, **WILLIE MCGINEST**, **ORLANDO PACE** and **MICHAEL ROBINSON**. The recipient will be announced on NFL Network's Good Morning Football every Thursday morning.

In partnership with Hudl and in its second year, the **NFL WAY TO PLAY HIGH SCHOOL AWARD** will honor one high school football player weekly for demonstrating exceptional in-game playing technique. The high school award recipient will be announced on NFL Network each Saturday morning, and the school of each honoree will receive a \$1,500 equipment grant through USA Football.

Understanding that some states have moved their youth and high school programs to the spring, the NFL Way to Play High School Award will be extended an additional 17 weeks, running from February 20 through June 12, 2021.

Several NFL head coaches, current players and NFL Legends have created <u>videos</u> to assist in educating coaches and players. The videos provide coaching points of emphasis to execute proper technique and are to be used as an educational tool.



The program, which was named after the man who conceived the idea – late Pro Football Hall of Fame head coach Bill Walsh— exposes talented coaches from other levels of football and NFL Legends to the methods and philosophies of NFL coaching staffs. Walsh introduced the concept to the league in 1987 when he brought a group of minority coaches into his San Francisco 49ers' training camp.



179 coaches participated in the 2019 Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship. Of the total, 53 Bill Walsh fellows were NFL Legends and four were women.

NUNN-WOOTEN SCOUTING FELLOWSHIP

The Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship is just one NFL program aimed at developing a diverse pipeline for club personnel. The Nunn-Wooten Scouting Fellowship has served to expose former NFL players, former football student-athletes, and college recruiting and personnel staff to careers in professional football scouting since 2015. The fellowship provides participants rare access to NFL club business, giving them an on-the-job, inside look at the skills needed for a career in NFL scouting. In 2019, 17 participants completed the program.



This year, to help continue to bolster educational and networking opportunities for aspiring minority coaches and professional scouts amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the NFL hosted a series of sessions for current and former Bill Walsh and Nunn-Wooten fellows from June through August.

Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin, who became the youngest head coach (36) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when he led Pittsburgh to a victory in Super Bowl XLIII, interned with the Cleveland Browns in the summer of 2000 when he was the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati.

Tomlin is one of two current NFL head coaches – joining Anthony Lynn (Los Angeles Chargers) – who are graduates of the program.

The program has tutored more than 2,000 minority coaches through the years and has grown to the point that now every NFL team participates during offseason workout programs, minicamps and training camp.

Washington Football Team head coach Ron Rivera understands the value of the program and serves on the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship Advisory Council. The council is comprised of club presidents, general managers, head coaches and assistant coaches, who focus on developing a pipeline of diverse coaches, including former NFL players pursuing opportunities in the coaching profession.



"The Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship is essential in creating opportunities," said Rivera. "You can see the benefits of the fellowship program on virtually every coaching staff in the league and the education provided through the program has been invaluable in the development of many young coaches who may not have received exposure to the NFL without it."





More than just a game

The NFL announced several initiatives in partnership with the **2020 EAST-WEST SHRINE BOWL**. The strengthened enhancements are designed to continue growing the game through the development of personnel and increasing engagement with players through all levels of their athletic life cycle.

"The objective for the East-West Shrine Bowl is to provide opportunity for development, evaluation, and community outreach for both the next generation of prospects and coaches," said **TROY VINCENT**, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations and 2019 East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame Inductee. "The venue affords prospects an early start on evaluation and assessment by pro personnel. It is also a tremendous opportunity to engage with the children and families at the Shriners Hospital."

The East-West Shrine Bowl, formerly known as East-West Shrine Game, is the nation's oldest all-star game for college seniors aspiring to play in the NFL. Seventy-seven Pro Football Hall of Famers have played in the East-West Shrine Bowl, and more than 300 past participants were on 2019 NFL Week 1 rosters.

HEAD COACHES: MIKE CALDWELL of the TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS and BEN STEELE of the ATLANTA FALCONS served as the head coaches for the 2020 East-West Shrine Bowl.

An 11-year NFL veteran, Caldwell spent the 2019 season as the Buccaneers inside linebackers coach after serving four seasons as the assistant head coach/inside linebackers coach for the New York Jets. In 2019, rookie linebacker Devin White was one of two players in the NFL with at least four fumble recoveries and three forced fumbles, while linebacker Lavonte David recorded his seventh-career 100-tackle season.

A seven-year NFL veteran, Steele joined the Falcons in 2019 as an offensive assistant after spending the previous five seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Atlanta tight end Austin Hooper set career highs in receptions (75), receiving yards (787) and receiving touchdowns (six) this season.

At the conclusion of the NFL regular season, clubs nominated active assistant coaches who were reviewed by a panel of NFL Football Operations staff, East-West Shrine Bowl leadership and two members of the NFL's General Managers Advisory Committee. The final two were chosen as head coaches. Once the head coaches were selected, each head coach then fills his 12-person staff from other NFL assistant coaches nominated by the clubs, a key job requirement for head coaches at every level of the sport.

To further aid in the development of future coordinators and head coaches, these representatives had the opportunity to participate in a panel session and learn from former NFL head coaches and general managers while in St. Petersburg, Florida.

LEGENDS MENTORS: In a continuous effort to connect the game's greats with the next generation of stars, Pro Football Hall of Famer **WILL SHIELDS** and NFL Legends **WILLIE MCGINEST**, **BOBBY TAYLOR** and **AMANI TOOMER** served as mentors to the 2020 East-West Shrine Bowl players throughout the week.

ADDITIONAL LEAGUE INITIATIVES: The league continued to assist in identifying the best players for the East-West Shrine Bowl, provide game officials, and football operations internship opportunities during the week leading up to the East-West Shrine Bowl game. Additionally, the NFL and East-West Shrine Bowl partnered on highlighting innovative concepts to further evolve the game.

Since 1925, the East-West Shrine Bowl has benefited Shriners Hospitals for Children and its mission to provide advanced care for children with specialized medical needs. Locations in the United States, Canada and Mexico provide advanced care for children with orthopedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate, regardless of the family's ability to pay.

NEW IN 2020 JOE JUDGE

HEAD COACH | NEW YORK GIANTS

The Giants announced on January 8, 2020 that **JOE** JUDGE will become the 19th head coach in franchise history. Judge takes over his first-career head coaching job after spending the previous eight seasons with the New England Patriots as assistant special teams coach (2012-14), special teams coordinator (2015-19) and wide receivers coach (2019).

During Judge's time in New England, the Patriots won three Super Bowls and played in the AFC Championship Game in each of his first seven seasons with the team. In Judge's lone season as the team's wide receivers coach in 2019, Julian Edelman recorded a career-high 1,117 receiving yards and a team-high six receiving touchdowns. Meanwhile, New England's special teams unit finished in the top-ten in punt return average and punt and kickoff coverage last season.

Before New England, Judge spent three seasons on Nick Saban's staff at Alabama (2009-11), serving as a special teams assistant/football analyst. The Crimson Tide won two BCS titles during his time there, while their special teams was consistently impressive, producing several All-Americans.

Judge began his coaching career at his alma mater, Mississippi State, where he was a graduate assistant from 2005-07. He then served as the special teams/linebackers coach at Birmingham-Southern in 2008.

Judge played for Mississippi State from 2000-04, earning three letters.

"Joe Judge knows what winning looks like and should look like. His exposure and experience in New England and Alabama have helped shape his philosophy of building a winning program and culture. We are thankful that he has accepted the responsibility

to lead our team."

NEW IN 2020 MIKE MCCARTHY

HEAD COACH | DALLAS COWBOYS

MIKE MCCARTHY was named the ninth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history on January 7, 2020.

McCarthy comes to the Cowboys after serving as the head coach of the Green Bay Packers for 13 seasons (2006-18), where he complied a 125-77-2 record with nine playoff appearances, four NFC Championship Game appearances and a Super Bowl XLV victory.

McCarthy led the Packers to eight straight playoff appearances from 2009-16, becoming only the fourth head coach in NFL history to do so. His tenure in Green Bay also coincided with Aaron Rodgers' rise as one of the top passers in league history.

Before becoming a head coach, McCarthy served a variety of roles on the offensive side of the ball for several teams across the league, including the 49ers offensive coordinator (2005), Saints offensive coordinator (2000-04), Packers quarterbacks coach (1999) and Chiefs quarterbacks coach (1995-98) and offensive quality control coach (1993-94).

Before entering the NFL coaching ranks, McCarthy served as an assistant on the coaching staff of the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) after serving as a graduate assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88). During his playing career, he was a tight end at Scottsdale Community College before transferring to Baker University.

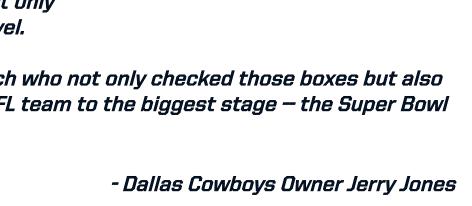

NEW IN 2020 MATT RHULE

HEAD COACH | CAROLINA PANTHERS

The Panthers named Matt Rhule the fifth head coach in team history on January 7, 2020.

Rhule makes the move to the NFL after serving the last seven years as a head coach in the college ranks, most notably at Baylor, where he spent three seasons. Rhule took the program from a one-win team in his first season, to an 11-3 record in 2019 with a berth in the Big 12 Championship Game and Sugar Bowl.

He enjoyed a similar program transformation at Temple, where he served as the head coach for four seasons (2013-16). He took the team from two wins in his first season to consecutive 10-win seasons and an American Athletic Conference championship in 2016.

Before becoming head coach, Rhule served several positions at Temple since joining the program in 2006, including offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and defensive line coach.

He does have NFL experience too, serving as the offensive line coach for the Giants in 2012.

Rhule also has experience as an assistant coach at Western Carolina (2002-05), UCLA (2001), Buffalo (1999-2000) and Albright College (1998).

During his playing days, he was a walkon linebacker at Penn State from 1994-97, taking part in three bowl victories, including the Rose Bowl in 1995. 5TH HEAD COACH IN PANTHERS HISTORY 🗝

HEAD COACH | WASHINGTON FOOTBALL TEAM

Washington announced on January 1, 2020 that Ron Rivera will become the 30th head coach in franchise history.

Rivera comes to the team with over 20 years of NFL coaching experience, most notably serving nine seasons as the head coach of the Carolina Panthers (2011-19). Under Rivera's leadership, Carolina had three seasons with at least 11 regular season wins, made four postseason appearances and earned a berth in Super Bowl 50 after finishing the season with a league-best 15-1 record in 2015.

Overall, Rivera has a 76-63-1 regular season record as head coach, while earning Associated Press Coach of the Year honors twice.

Before Carolina, Rivera served a variety of roles on the defensive side of the ball for several teams across the league, including the Chargers defensive coordinator (2008-10) and linebackers coach (2007), Bears defensive coordinator (2004-06), Eagles linebackers coach (1993-03) and Bears defensive quality control coach (1997-98).

As a player, Rivera was a second-round selection by the Chicago Bears as a linebacker in the 1984 NFL Draft and would go on to play nine seasons for the franchise, winning Super Bowl XX and being named the team's 1988 Man of the Year.

NEW IN 2020 **KEVIN STEFANSKI**

HEAD COACH | CLEVELAND BROWNS

The Browns named **KEVIN STEFANSKI** the 18th full-time head coach in team history on January 13, 2020.

Stefanski comes to Cleveland after his first full season as the Minnesota Vikings offensive coordinator in 2019. Under Stefanski, Minnesota ranked eighth in the league in scoring offense (25.4 points per game) and sixth in rushing offense (133.3 yards per game), as they finished with a 10-6 record and earned a playoff berth.

Quarterback Kirk Cousins set a single season career-high in passer rating (107.4), while finishing with a career-low six interceptions, and running back Dalvin Cook became the first Viking to rush for at least 1,000 yards since Adrian Peterson, while being invited to his first career Pro Bowl.

Overall, Stefanski spent 14 seasons in Minnesota, serving a variety of roles on the offensive side of the ball, including assistant to the head coach (2006-08), assistant quarterbacks coach (2009-13), tight ends coach (2014-15), running backs coach (2016), quarterbacks coach (2017-18) and offensive coordinator (2019).

Before entering the professional coaching ranks, Stefanski served as an assistant director of football operations at his alma mater, Penn, in 2005.

The former defensive back won the Penn Freshman of the Year Award in 2000 and was twice named an All-Ivy League selection.

"We were looking for a strong leader of this football team, a very bright coach with a high football IQ, who could establish a strong understanding of what he expected of his players, hold them accountable and confidently navigate the challenges and opportunities that present themselves throughout a season.
