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2022 KICKOFF GUIDE

The NFL returns for the 2022 season as Kickoff Weekend signals the start of a 272-game journey, one that promises hope for each of the league's 32 teams as they set their sights on Super Bowl LVII, which will be played on Sunday, February 12, 2023, at State Farm Stadium in Arizona.

2021 was one of the most competitive seasons in league annals and was the first year of an enhanced season structure which featured each team playing 17 regular-season games. The 2022 season will be filled with memorable moments, as young players emerge, familiar faces continue their climb up the record books and teams vie to make their mark in the postseason. Every team enters the season with hope and a trip to Arizona for Super Bowl LVII in mind. Below are a few reasons why:

- o Eighteen teams remained in Super Bowl contention on the final day of the 2021 regular season, tied for the most such teams since 2006 (20).
- o Four teams clinched a division title after not winning their division last year (Cincinnati, Dallas, the Los Angeles Rams and Tampa Bay) and at least two teams have won their divisions the season after missing the playoffs in 18 of the past 19 years.
- o Cincinnati clinched the AFC North after finishing in last place in the division in 2020 and in <u>17 of the past 19 seasons, at least one team finished in first place in their division the season after finishing in last or tied for last.</u>
- Seven teams clinched playoff berths after missing the postseason in 2020 (Arizona, Cincinnati, Dallas, Las Vegas, New England, Philadelphia and San Francisco) and <u>since 1990 - a streak of 32 consecutive seasons - at least four teams have qualified for the playoffs in every season that were not in the postseason the year before.</u>
- There were 21 overtime games last season, including three in Week 18 which featured teams winning in overtime to qualify for the postseason (Las Vegas, Pittsburgh and San Francisco), marking the first time since 1993 that multiple playoff teams won in overtime in the final week of the season.

The competitiveness of the 2021 regular season fed into one of the most exciting and dramatic postseasons to date.

- The Los Angeles Rams won Super Bowl LVI and for a 17th consecutive season, the NFL has a new Super Bowl champion, extending the longest streak without a repeat winner in league history. Only eight teams have repeated as champions since the first Super Bowl in 1967, with the 2004 Patriots (Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX) being the last team to accomplish the feat. It also marked the second-consecutive season in which a team won the Super Bowl in their home stadium, after Tampa Bay also did so in Super Bowl LV.
- o <u>From the Divisional Playoffs through Super Bowl LVI, six of the seven games were decided by exactly three points</u>. The only game that wasn't was Kansas City and Buffalo in the AFC Divisional Playoffs, which was decided by an overtime touchdown.
- The total margin of victory across the final seven playoff games (Super Bowl LVI, Conference Championship and Divisional Playoffs) was 24 points (3.4 points per game).

Among the many notable accomplishments players and coaches can achieve during the 2022 season ...

- Tampa Bay quarterback TOM BRADY (84,520 passing yards and 624 touchdown passes) enters the 2022 season as the league's all-time regular-season leader in both categories and can become the first player in NFL history with 100,000 career passing yards, including the postseason.
- o Green Bay quarterback **AARON RODGERS**, who ranks fifth all-time in touchdown passes (449) and 10th in passing yards (55,360), can become the first player ever to win three consecutive Most Valuable Player awards.
- o Indianapolis quarterback **MATT RYAN** (59,735 passing yards and 367 touchdown passes) can become the eighth quarterback ever with 60.000 passing yards and ninth quarterback all-time with 400 touchdown passes.

- o Tennessee running back **DERRICK HENRY** needs 10 rushing touchdowns to become the fifth running back all-time with at least 10 rushing touchdowns in five consecutive seasons.
- o Tampa Bay wide receiver **MIKE EVANS** needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first player with at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first nine seasons in NFL history.
- Kansas City tight end TRAVIS KELCE (704 receptions and 9,006 receiving yards) can become the fifth tight end all-time with 800 receptions and fifth tight end ever with 10,000 receiving yards.
- Los Angeles Rams defensive lineman AARON DONALD (98 sacks) needs 12 sacks to become the fourth player since 1982 with at least 110 sacks in his first nine seasons.
- New Orleans defensive end CAMERON JORDAN needs seven sacks to become the sixth player since 1982 to record at least seven sacks in 11 consecutive seasons.
- o Pittsburgh linebacker **T.J. WATT** can become the first player to lead the league in sacks in three different seasons since 1982.
- New England head coach BILL BELICHICK ranks third all-time with 321 total victories (regular-season and playoffs combined)
 and needs four wins to surpass George Halas (324 combined wins) for the second-most total victories by a head coach in NFL
 history.
- o Green Bay head coach **MATT LAFLEUR** can become the first coach since 1970 to win at least 13 games in each of his first four seasons as an NFL head coach.
- o Kansas City head coach **ANDY REID** needs 10 wins to become the third coach in NFL history to record at least 10 wins in eight consecutive seasons.

Beginning with the 2021 season, NFL clubs approved an enhanced season structure that will feature each team playing 17 regular-season games and three preseason games.

The NFL-NFLPA Collective Bargaining Agreement signed in March of 2020 enabled the league, with the approval of the union and its players, to enhance the regular season with a move to 17 games, marking the first change to the season structure since the 1978 campaign ushered in an era of 16 regular-season and four preseason games.

The 17th game features teams from opposing conferences that finished in the same place within their division the previous season. The NFC was determined to be the home conference for the 17th game in 2022.

Under the scheduling formula below, every team plays 17 regular-season games with one bye week. Clubs will host 10 games overall - either nine regular-season games and one preseason game or eight regular-season games and two preseason games.

- o Home and away against its three division opponents (six games).
- o The four teams from another division within its conference on a rotating three-year cycle (four games).
- o The four teams from a division in the other conference on a rotating four-year cycle (four games).
- Two intraconference games based on the prior year's standings (two games). These games match a first-place team against the first-place teams in the two same-conference divisions the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second-place, third-place and fourth-place teams in a conference are matched in the same way each year.
- One interconference game based on the prior year's standings on a rotating four-year cycle (one game). These games match a first-place team from one division against a first-place team in an opposite conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second-place, third-place and fourth-place teams in each division are matched in the same way each year. The home conference for this game will rotate each season.

NFL Kickoff Weekend will begin Thursday night, September 8, and the regular season will end Sunday, January 8, 2023. The season will conclude with Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium in Arizona on Sunday, February 12, 2023.

The enhanced season will ensure that beginning in 2022, all 32 clubs will play internationally at least once every eight years. The scheduling of up to four neutral-site games per year in a country outside the United States will focus initially on Canada, Europe, Mexico, South America and the United Kingdom. In addition, interested clubs can continue to volunteer to play home games internationally, as is currently the case.

It's time to get "Back to Football!"

The 2022 season begins with the NFL's annual primetime kickoff game. The opener on Thursday, September 8 on NBC (8:20 PM ET) will feature the Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Rams hosting the Buffalo Bills at SoFi Stadium.

Kickoff Weekend begins on Thursday, September 8 in primetime on NBC as the defending Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Rams welcome the Buffalo Bills to SoFi Stadium. Below is a sampling of notable active NFL Kickoff streaks:

- The KANSAS CITY CHIEFS visit the ARIZONA CARDINALS on Kickoff Weekend. The Chiefs have won their past seven Kickoff Weekend games, the longest active streak in the NFL.
- o The LOS ANGELES RAMS, who welcome the BUFFALO BILLS on Thursday of Week 1 to kick off the 2022 season, have won their last five Kickoff Weekend games, the longest active streak in the NFC. Since head coach SEAN MCVAY was hired by the club in 2017, the Rams have outscored their opponents 163-80 on Kickoff Weekend.



- o Four other teams the **LAS VEGAS RAIDERS**, **LOS ANGELES CHARGERS**, **NEW ORLEANS SAINTS** and **SEATTLE SEAHAWKS** have won each of their past three season-opening games. The Raiders visit the Chargers to open the 2022 season.
- The reigning NFC North division champion GREEN BAY PACKERS open their season on the road against the MINNESOTA VIKINGS. The Packers have won 58 games on Kickoff Weekend, the most in the NFL. The CHICAGO BEARS, who rank second with 55 wins in season-opening games, host the SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS in Week 1.

HEAD COACHES: New England's BILL BELICHICK is 18-9 (.667) on Kickoff Weekend and his 18 wins are the most among active head coaches ... Belichick, Seattle's PETE CARROLL (10-6; .625), Baltimore's JOHN HARBAUGH (10-4; .714) and Kansas City's ANDY REID (15-8; .652) are the only active head coaches who have won at least 10 Kickoff Weekend games ... Reid has won seven consecutive games on Kickoff Weekend, the longest current streak among active head coaches ... Los Angeles Rams' SEAN MCVAY (5-0), Philadelphia's NICK SIRIANNI (1-0) and Los Angeles Chargers' BRANDON STALEY (1-0) are the only active head coaches with perfect records on Kickoff Weekend ... Five head coaches - the New York Giants' BRIAN DABOLL, Chicago's MATT EBERFLUS, Denver's NATHANIEL HACKETT, Miami's MIKE MCDANIEL and Minnesota's KEVIN O'CONNELL - make their Kickoff Weekend debuts ... Five head coaches - Houston's LOVIE SMITH (5-6), Jacksonville's DOUG PEDERSON (4-1), Las Vegas' JOSH MCDANIELS (1-1), New Orleans' DENNIS ALLEN (0-3) and Tampa Bay's TODD BOWLES (2-2) - will be coaching the first game with their new club in Week 1.



Introduced in 2020 and continuing for a third-consecutive season, a total of 14 teams - seven each in the American and National Football Conferences - will make the postseason.

Three Wild Card teams from each conference will qualify for the postseason, with the No. 1 seed in each conference receiving a bye in the Wild Card round.

The remaining division champions in each conference with the best records will be seeded 2, 3, and 4, followed by the next three teams per conference with the best records seeded 5. 6. and 7.

AFC and NFC Wild Card games will feature the 2 seed hosting the 7 seed, the 3 seed hosting the 6 seed and the 4 seed hosting the 5 seed.

Super Wild Card Weekend for the 2022 season will feature six games, starting on Saturday, January 14.

Super Wild Card Weekend winners join the top seeds in each conference in the Divisional Playoffs on Saturday and Sunday, January 21-22. The AFC and NFC Championship Games will be played on Sunday, January 29. The winners meet two weeks later on Sunday, February 12, in Super Bowl LVII at Arizona's State Farm Stadium (FOX), marking the first time the league's final game is played in Arizona since Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.

Since 1990 - a streak of 32 consecutive seasons - at least four new teams have qualified for the playoffs that missed the postseason the year before, including seven of the 14 playoff teams in 2021.





THE 2021 POSTSEASON WAS ONE OF THE MOST EXCITING AND DRAMATIC IN NFL HISTORY.

- The Los Angeles Rams won Super Bowl LVI and for a 17th consecutive season, the NFL has a new Super Bowl champion, extending the longest streak without a repeat winner in league history.
- o From the Divisional Playoffs through Super Bowl LVI, six of the seven games were decided by exactly three points. The only game that wasn't was Kansas City and Buffalo in the AFC Divisional Playoffs, which was decided by an overtime touchdown.
 - All seven games were decided by a game-winning score in the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime.
 - Five games were decided by a game-winning score on the final play.
- o The total margin of victory across the final seven playoff games (Super Bowl LVI, Conference Championship and Divisional Playoffs) was 24 points (3.4 points per game).
- o Both Conference Championship games were decided by three or fewer points for the second time ever (2011).
- o For the first time ever, all four Divisional Round games were decided by a game-winning score on the final play, the most such games in a single postseason all-time.
- Three road teams won in the Divisional Round for third time in NFL history (2008 and 1971).

With only 17 games per team, every game is important. Below is a sampling of some notable matchups this year:

New teams making the playoffs and winning divisions, consistent teams excelling once again, records falling and young players making their mark all combined to help shape the story of the 2021 season.

The final week of the season once again came right down to the wire as three playoff spots and two division titles - the AFC East and NFC West - were decided on the last day of the season. There were 18 teams still in Super Bowl contention with one week to play last season, tied for the fourth-most teams still in Super Bowl contention with one week to play, trailing only 1982 (22 teams), 2006 (20 teams) and 2002 (19 teams). The season-ending excitement was due in part to having 16 divisional games played on the season's final weekend, a tradition instituted in 2010.

Every team enters the 2022 season with a trip to Arizona and Super Bowl LVII in mind, and below are a few reasons why.

 The CINCINNATI BENGALS (AFC North) and DALLAS COWBOYS (NFC East) won their division after missing the postseason in 2020 and at least two teams have won their divisions the season after missing the playoffs in 18 of the past 19 years.

Cincinnati clinched the AFC North after finishing in last place in the division in 2020. In 17 of the past 19 seasons, at least one team finished in first place the season after finishing in last or tied for last.

Competitive balance, one of the hallmarks of the NFL, gives fans hope entering each season.

In 17 of the past 19 seasons, at least one team finished in first place in its division the season after finishing in last or tied for last place. In fact, of the 50 teams in league history to go from "worst-to-first," 27 of them have done so in the past 19 years (2003-21), including an NFL-record three such teams in 2005 and 2006.

Two teams during that span, the 2009 New Orleans Saints and the 2017 Philadelphia Eagles, won the Super Bowl after finishing in last place in their division the season before.

Last year, the **CINCINNATI BENGALS** advanced to Super Bowl LVI after finishing in last place in the AFC North in 2020. They became the fifth team since 2000 to advance to the Super Bowl the season after finishing in last place in its division.



In the 20 seasons since realignment in 2002, 30 different teams have won division titles. In 2021, four divisions - AFC North (Cincinnati), NFC East (Dallas), NFC South (Tampa Bay) and NFC West (L.A. Rams) - saw a new team finish in first place.

Both the Cincinnati Bengals (AFC North) and Dallas Cowboys (NFC East) won their division after missing the postseason in 2020 and at least two teams have won their divisions the season after missing the playoffs in 18 of the past 19 years.

Cincinnati completed the "worst-to-first" turnaround, winning the AFC North the season after finishing in last place in the division. At least one team has won its division the season after finishing in or tied for last place in 17 of the past 19 seasons.

Getting off to a strong start is important.

Over the past 10 years, eight teams - **NEW ENGLAND**, **KANSAS CITY**, **GREEN BAY**, **DENVER**, **BALTIMORE**, **DALLAS**, the **LOS ANGELES RAMS** and **SEATTLE** - have a winning percentage of at least .600 through the season's first month. Those eight clubs have combined for 50 playoff berths and 13 Super Bowl appearances - including eight Super Bowl championships - during that span.

In 2021, the four teams to appear on Championship Weekend - **CINCINNATI**, **KANSAS CITY**, the **LOS ANGELES RAMS** and **SAN FRANCISCO** - began with a combined 9-4 record during the first month of the season.

Over the past 10 years, six NFL teams have a winning percentage of .600-or-higher - **NEW ENGLAND** (115-46, .714), **SEATTLE** (105-55-1, .655), **KANSAS CITY** (105-56, .652), **GREEN BAY** (103-56-2, .646), **PITTSBURGH** (99-60-2, .621) and **NEW ORLEANS** (97-64, .602). Those six clubs have combined for 44 playoff berths, eight Super Bowl appearances and five Super Bowl championships in that span.

The New England Patriots, under the guidance of head coach **BILL BELICHICK**, have the best regular season record over the past 10 years, qualifying for the postseason nine times and winning Super Bowls XLIX, LI and LIII.

"When you look at these guys and what they've done in terms of consistency, that really is the truest measure of performance," Los Angeles Rams head coach **SEAN MCVAY** said about the Patriots. "Nobody has done it better than they have over the last handful of years and that's why you have so much respect and appreciation for them."

During the 2021 season, 21 games went to overtime, tied with 2015 (21) and 1995 (21) for the fourth-most all-time. Only 2002 (25), 2003 (23) and 2012 (22) had more.

At least one game went to overtime last season in nine of the first 10 weeks for just the third time (2003 and 2010) since overtime was instituted in 1974. Week 18 featured three teams - Las Vegas, Pittsburgh and San Francisco - winning in overtime to qualify for the postseason, marking the first time since Week 18, 1993 that multiple playoff teams won in overtime in the final week of the season. Additionally, for the third time in the past four years, multiple postseason games went into overtime.

The **LAS VEGAS RAIDERS** became the second team ever to win four overtime games in a single season, joining the 2011 Arizona Cardinals, while kicker **DANIEL CARLSON** converted all five of his overtime field goal attempts, the most made overtime field goals in a single season all-time.

BALTIMORE also appeared in four overtime contests last year while **CINCINNATI**, **MINNESOTA**, **PITTSBURGH** and **TENNESSEE** each went into overtime three times.



Great players. Great coaches. Great plays. Arctic weather. They all combined for one of the most memorable games in NFL history.

Fifty-five years ago, the Green Bay Packers defeated the Dallas Cowboys 21-17 in the coldest NFL game on record: the 1967 NFL Championship dubbed forevermore as the "Ice Bowl."

The Cowboys came to Green Bay as upstarts seeking their first NFL title and had the momentum of a 52-14 win over the Cleveland Browns in the Eastern Conference Championship Game the week before. In addition, the Cowboys had gained experience from their narrow 34-27 loss to Green Bay in the 1966 NFL Championship when quarterback **DON MEREDITH**'s possible game-tying pass was intercepted in the end zone with 28 seconds remaining.

Green Bay entered the contest as two-time defending NFL champions, vying to become the first team in league history to win three consecutive championships since the playoff system was instituted in 1933. But the Packers were not the same club that had dominated the league in the early and mid-1960s. They were older, had struggled to a 9-4-1 record, and were without future Pro Football Hall of Fame running backs **PAUL HORNUNG** (retired) and **JIM TAYLOR** (with New Orleans) for the first time. Packers quarterback **BART STARR** knew his team was in for a stiff challenge.



"Coach (**VINCE**) **LOMBARDI** was quick to point out all week long how good the Cowboys were and what respect he had for them," said Starr. "We had seen the year before when they were a younger team how well they had played against us in the championship game down in Dallas. We knew this was going to be a special game and it was."

What was already a great matchup was made more intriguing by the sub-zero temperature. The official game-time temperature was 13 degrees below zero with the wind chill at minus 48 degrees. It was - and remains - the coldest game in NFL history.

"It was 20 degrees the day before," said Cowboys head coach **TOM LANDRY**. "It was great. Vince (Lombardi) and I were together that night and we talked about how good the conditions were and what a great game it would be."

But a cold front was moving in, and by the next morning, it had arrived.

"The operator said, 'It's 7:30 AM and 19 below," said Cowboys linebacker **LEE ROY JORDAN**. "I got up out of bed, looked out the window and saw 40 other guys staring out in disbelief. It was cold."

"We weren't prepared for that kind of cold," said **JIM TUNNEY**, who served as the alternate referee for the game and patrolled the Packers' sidelines. "We went out that morning and rousted the store owners out of bed. We got more thermals and gloves."

When the teams arrived at the stadium, they found the field nearly frozen. A layer of condensation had built up between the field and the covering tarpaulin the night before. When the tarpaulin was removed and the field was exposed to the bitter cold, it froze.

"Astroturf was like a pillow compared to this," said Packers running back CHUCK MERCEIN.

The Packers began the game like two-time defending champions. Starr hit wide receiver **BOYD DOWLER** with an eight-yard touchdown pass to give Green Bay a 7-0 first-quarter lead. In the second quarter on third-and-one, Starr connected with Dowler again, this time for a 46-yard touchdown and a 14-0 advantage.

But the Cowboys began adjusting to the cold and came to life in the second quarter.

"After you forget about how cold it is and all the other things that are going through your mind, you just figure you've got to go play football," said Cowboys cornerback **CORNELL GREEN**. "They weren't going to cancel the game or call it off so you better get it in, try to play and try to win. That's when we started playing better."

The Dallas defense stepped up. Defensive end **GEORGE ANDRIE** recovered a Starr fumble and returned it seven yards for a touchdown, cutting the Packers' lead to 14-7. Another Green Bay fumble led to a second Dallas score - a 21-yard field goal by kicker **DANNY VILLANUEVA**. The Cowboys had stormed back and trailed by only 14-10 at halftime.

Despite the freezing temperatures, 50,861 fans braved the cold. The game was a sellout.

"The fans were tough to stay out there and watch that game," said Green. "I have to give them a lot of credit. There's some tough people in Green Bay."

When the second half began, the Cowboys continued their defensive dominance and stifled the Packers. The Dallas offense started to move the ball and was poised for a score at the beginning of the fourth quarter. Running back **DAN REEVES** took a handoff, ran to his left, stopped to throw and hit a wide-open **LANCE RENTZEL** for a 50-yard touchdown and the Cowboys' first lead of the game, 17-14.

"It was a difficult play," said Landry. "I don't think the Packers expected it. They didn't expect that we would throw a pass like that. It was a big play and it put us into position to win the game."


It was the biggest play of the game to that point. But Green Bay wasn't finished.

After playing 37:15 without scoring, the Packers found themselves down to their last chance. With 5:04 remaining in the game and trailing 17-14, Green Bay received a punt at its own 32-yard line and began one of the greatest touchdown drives in NFL history. A third NFL championship awaited 68 yards away.

"We were ready on that last drive," said Starr. "We were totally focused on what we needed to do in order to go down and win the ballgame. As I looked into the eyes of my teammates, I knew all I had to do was call the play."

And to add that last bit of incentive, linebacker **RAY NITSCHKE** roared from the sidelines, "Don't let me down!"

On first down, Starr passed to running back **DONNY ANDERSON** for six yards. Mercein ran around right end for seven. Starr completed his second pass of the drive to Dowler for 13 yards. The Packers had crossed midfield, but on the next play, Anderson lost nine yards on a handoff. Starr regained those yards with a 12-yard pass to Anderson, but now faced third-and-seven at the Dallas 39.



"One thing most people don't know about that game," said Starr, "was the excellent awareness of our two running backs, Anderson and Mercein. Twice during the final drive, they made me aware that they were open as secondary receivers."

Starr completed his fourth pass of the drive to Anderson for nine yards and a first down. On the next play, he connected with a wide-open Mercein in the left flat who then ran to the Dallas 11 for a 19-yard gain. It was Starr's final pass of the game. He finished a perfect five-for-five on the drive.

On the next play, with 1:11 remaining, Starr called "30 Give." Tackle **BOB SKORONSKI** opened a hole with a powerful block and Mercein charged through the middle to the three-yard line for a gain of eight.

"It is the best play I ever called in my career," said Starr. "It's hard to explain why we had not run it before that. I just didn't feel that the time was correct, but at that moment I knew it was the play to call."

Anderson took a handoff and gained two yards to give the Packers a first-and-goal at the one-yard line with 30 seconds remaining. Starr handed off to Anderson again, but he slipped and fell short of the goal line. They tried the same play again and got the same result.

Starr called the Packers' final timeout and asked his linemen if they had enough footing to run "31 Wedge." They said they did. "31 Wedge" was put into the Packers' playbook by Lombardi during the week after guard **JERRY KRAMER** had noticed a weakness in the Cowboys' short-yardage defense and suggested the play.

On the sidelines, Starr suggested to Lombardi that he run it instead of the backs because of the poor traction. Lombardi replied, "Then run it and let's get the hell out of here."

When the ball was snapped, Kramer and Bowman plowed into Cowboys defensive tackle **JETHRO PUGH**, opened a hole and Starr lunged through for the game-winning touchdown and a third consecutive NFL championship.

"I understood my responsibility," said Kramer. "If I don't get a great block, we don't do it. I understood perfectly."

"I don't know if the execution on that drive, under those conditions, will ever be surpassed," said Packers tackle FORREST GREGG.

The Cowboys had time to try some desperation passes, but they all fell incomplete. The "Ice Bowl" was over. Packers 21, Cowboys 17. The Green Bay Packers were NFL champions again. They went on to win Super Bowl II two weeks later in somewhat warmer conditions in Miami, Florida.

"What that game meant was unbelievable," said Starr. "We had fought through a very tough year. We won two consecutive championships prior to that and to have it come down to such brutal conditions and to win it in that fashion, from our perspective, we think it was the greatest game of all time."

It is fitting that the only team to achieve perfection in NFL history has a keepsake from that season that is special. The 1972 **MIAMI DOLPHINS**' championship ring features one large diamond to represent their Super Bowl VII victory surrounded by 16 smaller diamonds - symbolizing the 16 victories it took to get there. In addition, one side of the ring is inscribed "Perfect Season" in honor of the club's unprecedented 17-0 championship season.

"That season is special because nobody has ever done it," said the team's Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback **BOB GRIESE**, of the Dolphins' "Perfect Season," whose 50th anniversary will be celebrated this year.

"It was the ultimate victory," said **DON SHULA**, the Dolphins' head coach from 1970-95, the winningest coach in NFL history (347 victories) and a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. "It was so special because it was my first Super Bowl win and to have it come with a team that accomplished what that team accomplished made it all the more memorable."

But the road to the Super Bowl was not always smooth. In the fifth game of the season, the club lost Griese to an injury in the first quarter. Backup **EARL MORRALL** came in and threw two scoring passes in Miami's 24-10 win over San Diego. The 38-year-old Morrall started the next 11 games for the Dolphins.



"When I was coaching the Colts in 1968, Earl came on when **JOHNNY UNITAS** got hurt and did a great job to get us to the Super Bowl," Shula recalled. "When he became available, I didn't hesitate to bring him down to Miami as insurance for Griese. Earl just stepped in and gave us great confidence in the games that he started."

While Morrall's leadership was essential, it was the Dolphins' ground game which carried the offensive load.

LARRY CSONKA (1,117) and **MERCURY MORRIS** (1,000) comprised the first teammate duo in NFL history to each reach the 1,000-yard rushing mark in the same season. The success of the running game epitomized the team's selflessness.

"We were a very unselfish team," said former Dolphins defensive tackle MANNY FERNANDEZ. "A lot of players sacrificed their personal ambitions for the good of the team. PAUL WARFIELD, for example, was playing for a team that threw him the ball three times per game. In today's game he would be the 'go-to guy' with 10 passes a week going to him. He was more than willing to take that backseat to become a blocker in the running game."



Warfield, the Hall of Fame receiver who led the '72 Dolphins with 606 receiving yards - a total lower than in any of his previous six seasons - agreed with Fernandez' assessment. "The success of the team was paramount," he said. "Everyone's focus was to win and win at the highest level."

That desire to reach the highest level was fueled by failure one year earlier. "The drive for the whole season was the Super Bowl VI loss to Dallas," said Griese. "There was nothing that was going to stop us from going to the Super Bowl and winning it."

"Our 17-0 happened because the Miami Dolphins football team had something to prove," Warfield added. "We were humiliated in Super Bowl VI and when we came to training camp in 1972, our objective was to get back to the Super Bowl and to reinforce in our own minds - as well as those of the fans across the country - that we were a better football team."

"It was a very well-balanced team," said Fernandez, who posted 10 tackles and one sack in the Super Bowl while playing for the team's unsung defense, aptly called the "No-Name" defense.

"The 'No-Name' defense took pride in the 11-man concept," said Shula of a unit which allowed an NFL season-low 171 points.

It was a concept embraced by the entire team. "The group was the essence of the word team," said Warfield. "That is why we accomplished something that no one else has ever accomplished, and perhaps, something that no other team will ever accomplish in the history of this game."



"To me," said Shula, "every team is separate and distinct. I have always felt that the reason you keep scores and the reason you keep records is to make determinations. Nobody has done what this team has done."

1972 DOLPHINS "DID YOU KNOW?"

- The 1972 Miami Dolphins played the AFC Championship Game on the road at Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh due to a rotating playoff site system. "We were a team that had more wins than anyone else and we had to take our show on the road," said Warfield.
- o "The game I remember most," recalled Shula, "is the (October 1) Minnesota game." The Dolphins trailed the Vikings 14-6 in the fourth quarter. "We needed 10 points to win it," Shula said. "I chose to go for the field goal first and **GARO YEPREMIAN** kicked a 51-yarder. Then we had to get the ball back, which we did, and we drove down for the touchdown. We needed those points and we got them."


The man who pulled it off wasn't where he was supposed to be. Two others involved didn't even see it. The fourth participant didn't believe it happened - legally, that is. And the man who would have been thrilled to see it was staring at elevator doors.

Pittsburgh Steelers running back **FRANCO HARRIS**, fullback **FRENCHY FUQUA**, and quarterback **TERRY BRADSHAW**, former Oakland Raiders safety **JACK TATUM** and Steelers owner **ART ROONEY** were the main players in a moment that may be the most memorable in the history of the National Football League - the "Immaculate Reception" touchdown scored in the AFC Divisional Playoff game by the rookie Harris that magically occurred 50 years ago on December 23, 1972.

The Participants - The Oakland Raiders, 1972 champions of the AFC Western Division with a 10-3-1 record, traveled to Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh to face the 11-3 AFC Central champion Steelers in the Divisional Playoff game. It was the Steelers' second playoff contest in their 40-year history. In 1947, they lost their first postseason game to Philadelphia 21-0.

"The Immaculate Reception," said Harris, "was really the start of a great decade for the Pittsburgh Steelers." Pittsburgh would collect four Super Bowl titles in six years during the 1970s.

<u>The Prologue</u> - With 50,350 fans - many of whom had attended a raucous pep rally the night before directly across the street from the Raiders' Hilton Hotel - looking on, the teams maneuvered to a relatively quiet first half.



Eleven minutes into the fourth quarter, the Steelers were up 6-0 thanks to two **ROY GERELA** field goals. That is where things got interesting. With three-and-a-half minutes left in the game, Oakland rookie quarterback **KENNY STABLER**, taking over for a fluweakened **DARYLE LAMONICA**, took the Raiders 80 yards in a 12-play sequence that culminated with a 30-yard touchdown run.

After the kickoff, the Steelers were at their own 20 with 1:13 left.

<u>The Play</u> - After completing his first two passes, Bradshaw threw three consecutive incomplete passes before he was faced with a fourth-and-10 play from his own 40-yard line with 22 seconds left. After desperately scrambling in the pocket, Bradshaw rifled a pass to fullback Fuqua.

All three - Fuqua, Tatum and the ball - collided. "I hit him and I thought the game was ours," said Tatum. "I looked down at him on the ground and he didn't have the ball."

The ball had rebounded like a rubber ball off a house, and headed straight for Harris. He was supposed to be in the backfield protecting Bradshaw, but he leaked out and tried to get open when he noticed the quarterback looking for a receiver.

"I saw Frenchy and Tatum go up," said Harris. "I saw the ball go up in the air and I said 'Oh no!" But then I saw the ball coming toward me and I figured we're not out of this yet."

The ball caromed nearly eight yards backwards and was caught in full stride by Harris, a mere hair's length away from the artificial turf at Three Rivers Stadium. Harris rumbled 60 yards for a touchdown and was surrounded by fans as he entered the end zone.


<u>The Postscript</u> - There was no signal by referee **FRED SWEARINGEN** on whether the touchdown counted. Both teams - and fans - ran onto the field, trying to find out what had happened, and what was going to be ruled. There were still 15 seconds to go in the game.

The lingering question surrounding the play was whom did the ball carom off of: Fuqua or Tatum? The 1972 NFL rulebook stated "If a defensive player touches a pass first, or simultaneously with or subsequent to its having been touched by only one eligible offensive player, then all offensive players become and remain eligible."

The Raiders said the ball bounced from Fuqua to Harris. "I came up and hit him from behind, and there wasn't any way I could have made contact with that ball," Tatum said.

After a conference with the officiating crew, Swearingen disappeared into a dugout, and got on the phone to the press box to speak to **ART MCNALLY**, the NFL supervisor of officials. Swearingen said to McNally: "Two of my men ruled that the ball was touched by opposing players (Tatum and Fuqua), and caught by Harris," and that therefore the reception was legal, as was the touchdown. He then put the receiver down, ran back to the field, and signaled ... touchdown! And 50,350 fans erupted.

Prior to the miraculous play and expecting a Steelers loss, Rooney, who purchased the team for \$2,500 in 1933, snuffed out his cigar and entered an elevator for the long journey down to the field. By the time he reached the field, his club had completed the most improbable play in team history.



After the game, Fuqua approached Rooney and told him exactly what transpired during the play. Fuqua then asked Rooney if he could say what really happened during the play. Fuqua said, "Chief, I want to tell what happened so bad. What do you think?"

Rooney replied, "Frenchy, let it stay immaculate."

Los Angeles Rams quarterback **NORM "THE DUTCHMAN" VAN BROCKLIN** entered the 1951 season entrenched in a duel for the starting position with veteran **BOB WATERFIELD**. A Waterfield injury sidelined the incumbent quarterback prior to the season opener against the New York Yanks on September 28 and opened the door for Van Brocklin to show his worth. He took advantage of the opportunity by producing the most prolific passing performance in NFL history. Van Brocklin threw for an NFL-record 554 yards in a 54-14 rout of the Yanks at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback tossed five touchdowns and completed 27 of 41 passes.

"It's the finest exhibition of passing I've ever seen," said Rams coach **JIMMY PHELAN** after the game. "Van Brocklin was hitting them in the eye practically every time he threw the ball."

Van Brocklin, who passed away in 1983, remained subdued about the performance. "Everything I threw seemed to be caught and run for a long gain," he said.

The Rams' **TOM FEARS** averaged 23.1 yards on his seven catches and **ELROY "CRAZYLEGS" HIRSCH** averaged 19.2 yards on nine receptions. Los Angeles amassed an NFL-record 735 total yards and 34 first downs.

"They don't need me out here anymore," said Waterfield after the game. The two quarterbacks would split time for the rest of the season as the Rams captured the 1951 NFL Championship.

Van Brocklin's record has stood for the past 71 years. Quarterbacks **MATT SCHAUB** and **WARREN MOON** have come the closest to breaking Van Brocklin's mark. In 2012, Schaub, then with the Houston Texans, passed for 527 yards against Jacksonville on November 18, while Moon had a 527-yard day for the Houston Oilers against Kansas City on December 16, 1990.

State Farm Stadium, home of the Arizona Cardinals, will host Super Bowl LVII on February 12, 2023. "We look forward to making this the most fan-friendly Super Bowl in the history of Super Bowls, and bigger and better than any Super Bowl," said Cardinals team owner Michael Bidwill.

This marks the third Super Bowl to be played at the site and the fourth time overall that Arizona hosts the Super Bowl.

"Arizona is an unmatched destination, from the top of Camelback Mountain to the glory of the Grand Canyon, from the beauty of the desert to the pristine rivers that run through the state - the ecological richness and diversity in Arizona is unrivaled," said former Cardinals wide receiver and Executive Chair of the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee Larry Fitzgerald. "I can't wait for everyone to experience what we have to offer."

State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Arizona, is one of the most unique stadiums in the NFL, as it is equipped with the first retractable natural grass playing surface and the first fully retractable roof which operates at an incline. These features allow for sporting events to be held on a natural grass field while still being indoors and enables the stadium to host different events at any given time, including in air-conditioned comfort. The fans also get to experience different desert horizon views from inside the stadium with the help of the 21 vertical glass-walled slots on the exterior of the building.

Since its completion in 2006, the stadium has received multiple recognitions including Event Site of the Year by Event Solutions Magazine in 2007, Best NFL Facility by Sports Business Journal and Sports Business Daily in 2006 and 2007, NFL's best playing surface in 2008 and Best New Venue of the 2000s by Sports Illustrated.com. It has also established itself as a multi-purpose NFL facility, hosting events like the annual Fiesta Bowl, two National College Football Championship Games, the 2017 NCAA Final Four Basketball Championship, international soccer matches, Cardinal's home games and even motorsports.

Two years ago, the Cardinals began upgrading the stadium and by the time Arizona hosts Super Bowl LVII, over \$100 million in recent renovations will have occurred in and around State Farm Stadium. "We want to make sure the building constantly feels fresh," said Bidwill. "This is what the game is about. It's about the fans."

The NFL announced its 18-week, 272-game regular-season schedule for 2022, which kicks off on Thursday night, September 8, in Los Angeles and concludes with 16 division games in Week 18 - two on Saturday, January 7, and 14 on Sunday, January 8.

The 2022 NFL schedule, powered by AWS, will feature each team playing 17 regularseason games and three preseason games for the second consecutive year.

The 17th game will feature teams from opposing conferences that finished in the same standing within their respective divisions the previous season. The NFC will be the home conference for the 17th game in 2022.

The NFL's 103rd season begins with the league's annual primetime kickoff game, as the defending Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Rams host the Buffalo Bills at SoFi Stadium on Thursday, September 8 (8:20 PM ET, NBC).

Week 1 continues Sunday, September 11, with a double-doubleheader featuring four Sunday afternoon games in every market, highlighted by reigning division winners and a rematch of last year's regular-season finale. On CBS at 4:25 PM ET, two 2021 playoff teams meet as Kansas City visits Arizona while Las Vegas travels to Los Angeles to face the Chargers in a rematch of last year's Week 18 overtime thriller. On FOX at 4:25 PM ET, the two No. 1 seeds from last year's postseason will be in action, as Green Bay visits Minnesota and Tennessee hosts the New York Giants.

Later that day, NBC's Sunday Night Football begins with the Dallas Cowboys hosting the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (8:20 PM ET) at AT&T Stadium, in a rematch of last year's exciting kickoff game.

Kickoff Weekend concludes on Monday, September 12, with ESPN/ABC's Monday Night Football, featuring Russell Wilson and the Denver Broncos traveling to Seattle to face the Seahawks (8:15 PM ET), where Wilson spent the first 10 years of his career and helped the Seahawks win Super Bowl XLVIII. He can become the fifth quarterback in NFL history to win at least 100 games with one franchise and face that team later in his career.

ESPN will televise one game each Monday night in Weeks 1-17 and will be simulcast on

ABC in Weeks 1, 3, 15 and 17. In Week 2, there will be two games on Monday night as Buffalo hosts Tennessee on ESPN (7:15 PM ET)

while Minnesota visits Philadelphia on ABC (8:30 PM ET). There will be no Monday night game on the final regular-season weekend

(Week 18) to provide more flexibility for the scheduling of the opening weekend of the NFL playoffs.

Additionally, ESPN/ABC will air two games with playoff implications on the Saturday of Week 18, January 7. These games will be selected following the conclusion of Week 17.

Thursday Night Football will air exclusively on Prime Video, kicking off its slate in Week 2 as the Kansas City Chiefs host the Los Angeles Chargers (8:15 PM ET). Prime Video will broadcast 15 Thursday Night Football games between Weeks 2-17 (excluding Thanksgiving night).

Thursday, Saturday and Monday night games will kick off at 8:15 PM ET. Sunday night games will kick at 8:20 PM ET. Once again this season, all 32 clubs will have at least one nationally televised game.









A select number of games will be "cross-flexed," moving between CBS and FOX to bring potentially under-distributed games to wider audiences. Some of those contests were announced today and other "cross-flexed" games will be decided during the season.

NFL Network will exclusively televise seven games (three international games, three games in Week 15 on Saturday, December 17 and the Las Vegas Raiders visiting the Pittsburgh Steelers on Saturday, December 24 [8:15 PM ET]).

The NFL schedule features five international regular-season games - three in the UK, the first-ever NFL regular-season game in Germany and one in Mexico. Last year, as part of the League's expansion of the regular season to 17 games, it was determined that, beginning with the 2022 season, up to four of the teams from the conference whose teams were eligible for a ninth regular-season home game would instead be designated to play a neutral-site international game each year.

The international series kicks off with games on back-to-back weekends at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in London, as New Orleans and Minnesota meet in Week 4 (9:30 AM ET, NFL Network) followed by Green Bay and the New York Giants in Week 5 (9:30 AM ET, NFL Network). The first international game on the 2022 schedule will mark the 100th game in league history (preseason and regular-season combined) played outside the United States.

In Week 8 (9:30 AM ET, ESPN+), the London action shifts to Wembley Stadium, where the Jacksonville Jaguars will face the Denver Broncos. In Week 10 (9:30 AM ET, NFL Network), the first-ever regular-season NFL game in Germany will take place at Allianz Arena - Home of FC Bayern Munich between Tampa Bay and Seattle. The 2022 international slate wraps up with a return to Mexico City in Week 11 on Monday Night Football (8:15 PM ET, ESPN) with a matchup between NFC West rivals San Francisco and Arizona at Estadio Azteca.

Thanksgiving will feature a tripleheader on Thursday, November 24. The first game will feature the Buffalo Bills traveling to Detroit to face the Lions (12:30 PM ET, CBS). The late afternoon game will match two NFC East rivals, as the New York Giants visit the Dallas Cowboys (4:30 PM ET, FOX). The Thanksgiving Day festivities conclude with an interconference matchup as the Patriots travel to Minnesota to face the Vikings on NBC (8:20 PM ET).

Week 16 begins with Thursday Night Football on December 22, followed by 11 games on Saturday, December 24, the first-ever Christmas tripleheader on Sunday, December 25, and finishes with Monday Night Football on December 26. The Christmas Day tripleheader features Green Bay at Miami at 1:00 PM ET (FOX), Denver at the Los Angeles Rams at 4:30 PM ET (CBS/Nickelodeon) and Tampa Bay at Arizona at 8:20 PM ET (NBC).

The regular season will conclude with Week 18 on Saturday, January 7, and Sunday, January 8. For the 13th consecutive year, all 16 games scheduled for the final week of the season are division contests, enhancing the potential for more games with playoff ramifications.

For the second time ever, the NFL's 32 teams will each play 17 games over 18 weeks. Byes will begin in Week 6 and end in Week 14.

The NFL will honor two historic anniversaries during the 2022 season:

- o In Week 7 on Sunday Night Football (8:20 PM ET, NBC), the Dolphins welcome the Steelers and will honor the 50th anniversary of their undefeated 1972 season, when they went a perfect 17-0, including a victory over Pittsburgh in the AFC Championship game en route to the Super Bowl VII title.
- o In Week 16 on Saturday, December 24 (8:15 PM ET, NFL Network), the Steelers host the Raiders, 50 years after the "Immaculate Reception" occurred during the AFC Divisional playoffs on December 23, 1972.
- o Additional 2022 schedule notes:
- o Twelve games will be Super Bowl rematches, including two of the past three Super Bowls: Kansas City at Tampa Bay (Week 4, Super Bowl LV) and Kansas City at San Francisco (Week 7, Super Bowl LIV).

- o Ten 2022 games are rematches of the 2021 playoffs, including the Kansas City Chiefs visiting the Cincinnati Bengals in Week 13 (4:25 PM ET, CBS), a rematch of the AFC Championship Game.
- o In Week 17 on Sunday Night Football (8:20 PM ET, NBC), the Chargers will play host to the Rams in the first regular-season meeting between the two clubs at SoFi Stadium in Los Angeles.
- o The top two picks in the 2022 NFL Draft, Travon Walker and Aidan Hutchinson, are scheduled to meet in Week 13 when the Jacksonville Jaguars travel to play the Detroit Lions (1:00 PM ET, FOX).

This season, "Flexible scheduling" for Sunday night may be used twice between Weeks 5-10, and during Weeks 11-15 and Week 17. In weeks of the season eligible for "flexible scheduling," the games listed for the Sunday night window are tentative and subject to change. Only Sunday afternoon games are eligible to be moved to Sunday night, in which case the tentatively scheduled Sunday night game would be moved to a Sunday afternoon.

In Week 15, three of five designated matchups will be played on Saturday with the remainder to be played on Sunday. Specific dates and start times for the designated Week 15 matchups will be determined and announced at a later date during the season.

In Week 18, two games will be played on Saturday (4:30 PM ET and 8:15 PM ET) with the remainder to be played on Sunday afternoon (1:00 PM ET and 4:25 PM ET) and one matchup to be played on Sunday night (8:20 PM ET). Specific dates, start times, and networks for Week 18 matchups will be determined and announced following the conclusion of Week 17.

Introduced in 2020 and continuing for a third-consecutive year, a total of 14 teams - seven each in the American and National Football Conferences - will make the postseason. The No. 1 seed in each conference will receive a bye in the Wild Card round. The remaining division champions in each conference with the best records will be seeded 2, 3, and 4, followed by the next three teams per conference with the best records seeded 5, 6, and 7.

Since 1990 - a streak of 32 consecutive seasons - at least four new teams have qualified for the playoffs that missed the postseason the year before, including seven of the 14 playoff teams in 2021.

AFC and NFC Wild Card games will feature the 2 seed hosting the 7 seed, the 3 seed hosting the 6 seed and the 4 seed hosting the 5 seed.

Super Wild Card Weekend for the 2022 season will feature six games, starting on Saturday, January 14.

Wild Card winners join the top seeds in each conference in the Divisional Playoffs on Saturday and Sunday, January 21-22. The AFC and NFC Championship Games will be played on Sunday, January 29. The winners meet two weeks later on Sunday, February 12, in Super Bowl LVII at Arizona's State Farm Stadium (FOX), marking the first time the league's final game is played in Arizona since Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.

The NFL is the only sports league that presents all regular-season and postseason games on free, over-the-air television in local markets. All postseason games are televised nationally.

WESTWOOD ONE is the official network radio partner of the NFL for the 36th consecutive season.

The Westwood One NFL schedule features 80 national games, including the Opening night Kickoff game, Monday Night Football, Sunday Night Football, Thursday Night Football, the Thanksgiving Day tripleheader, the International Series, lateseason Saturday games, and the entire postseason, culminating with Super Bowl

The award was created in 2014 in honor of the late founding owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Pro Football Hall of Famer **ART ROONEY SR**. Past recipients of the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award are **TEDDY BRIDGEWATER** of the Carolina Panthers (2020), **ADRIAN PETERSON** of the Washington Football Team (2019), **DREW BREES** of the New Orleans Saints (2018), **LUKE KUECHLY** of the Carolina Panthers (2017), **FRANK GORE** of the Indianapolis Colts (2016), **CHARLES WOODSON** of the Oakland Raiders (2015) and **LARRY FITZGERALD** of the Arizona Cardinals (2014).

Each NFL team nominated one of its players for the award, which recognizes players who exemplify outstanding sportsmanship on the field. A panel of former players from the NFL Legends Community selected eight finalists (four in the AFC; four in the NFC) from the 32 nominees. The panel was comprised of Pro Football Hall of Famer **CURTIS MARTIN**, and NFL Legends **WARRICK DUNN**, **KARL MECKLENBURG** and **LEONARD WHEELER**.

The eight finalists were listed on the Pro Bowl ballot under the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. From the finalists, each team's players submitted a consensus vote of their choice for the winner. As in Pro Bowl voting, a team could not vote for its own player.

The Art Rooney Trophy represents the important role that sportsmanship plays in the game and how NFL players that demonstrate integrity and honor on the field serve as role models for other players at all levels. The award design was inspired by the upward arc of a football in motion and contains a gold line embedded in glass that represents the path of sportsmanship throughout a career. Etched into the award are the words "integrity," "honor," "respect," and "fairness," the values that define excellent sportsmanship.

The finalists, featuring four players from each conference, were quarterback **JOSH ALLEN** (Buffalo), wide receiver **BRANDIN COOKS** (Houston), defensive back **JASON MCCOURTY** (Miami) and wide receiver **MATTHEW SLATER** (New England) in the AFC, and linebacker **LAVONTE DAVID** (Tampa Bay), defensive end **CAMERON JORDAN** (New Orleans), fullback **KYLE JUSZCZYK** (San Francisco) and wide receiver **ADAM THIELEN** (Minnesota) in the NFC.



NFL EXPANDS WAY TO PLAY INITIATIVE FUELED BY GATORADE

The NFL has partnered with Gatorade to expand the Way to Play Initiative. The NFL Way to Play Awards fueled by Gatorade highlights proper playing technique to protect players from unnecessary risk and fosters culture change across all levels of the sport.

For the fifth year, the **NFL WAY TO PLAY AWARD** will recognize the excellence demonstrated by NFL players who exemplify proper technique to make impactful plays. Each recipient of the Way to Play Award will receive a \$5,000 equipment grant through USA Football to be awarded to the local youth or high school football program of the player's choosing.



"The Way to Play Award recognizes players for using proper techniques on the field which protect players from unnecessary risk," said **TROY VINCENT**, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations. "This award also benefits youth and high school football; incentivizes strong fundamental playing techniques; and demonstrates best practices."

The NFL Football Operations department will select the top nominees for the award, recognizing current NFL players. The expert panel consists of **MERRIL HOGE**, **RONNIE LOTT**, **WILLIE MCGINEST**, **ORLANDO PACE**, **MICHAEL ROBINSON** and **BOBBY TAYLOR**. The recipient will be announced on NFL Network's Good Morning Football every Thursday morning.

In partnership with Hudl and in its fourth year, the **NFL WAY TO PLAY HIGH SCHOOL AWARD** will honor one high school football player weekly for demonstrating exceptional in-game playing technique. The high school award recipient will be announced on NFL Network each Thursday morning, and the school of each honoree will receive either a \$3,000 equipment grant through USA Football or MVP Robotics' Mobile Virtual Player.

The NFL has created several videos NFL head coaches, current players and NFL Legends to assist in educating coaches and players. The videos provide coaching points of emphasis to execute proper technique and are to be used as educational tools.

Here is a look at each of the NFL Way to Play Awards fueled by Gatorade:

- o **NFL Way to Play High School Award** for domestic high school football players, in partnership with Hudl. Weekly recipients each will receive either a \$3,000 equipment grant through USA Football for their school or MVP Robotics' Mobile Virtual Player.
- NFL Canada Way to Play Award for Canadian high school football players, in partnership with Hudl. Weekly recipients each earn a \$3,000 grant for their school.
- o **NFL Way to Play FLAG Player of the Week** for flag football players, in partnership with RCX Sports. Weekly recipients each earn a \$3,000 grant for their program.
- o **NFL Way to Play Award** for current NFL players. Recipients are each given a \$5,000 grant to dedicate to a youth or high school program of their choice.

The NFL Way to Play educational curriculum, which focuses on teaching coaches and players proper techniques, drill selection, and tips to excel at each position, was developed by a select group of NFL Legends coaching across all levels of the game. 

Quarterback Russell Wilson will make his Broncos debut in a familiar setting, when Denver travels to face the Seattle Seahawks on Monday Night Football in Week 1. In his 10 years with Seattle, Wilson became the franchise's all-time leader in every major passing category and led the team to their first-ever Super Bowl championship, a victory over Denver in Super Bowl XLVIII following the 2013 season.

The Seahawks are one of two teams that Wilson has not beaten as a starter, along with the Chargers, who Denver plays both in Week 6 and Week 18 this season.

NOTE TO KNOW

 Adams is one of five defensive backs since 2000 to record at least 75 tackles in each of his first five career seasons, joining Vonn Bell, Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, Landon Collins and Richard Marshall.

AT A GLANCE

 Fant enters his fourth season (first with Seattle) with 170 receptions for 1,905 yards and 10 touchdowns in 47 career games. He leads all tight ends that entered the league in 2019 in both receptions and receiving yards.

NOTE TO KNOW

In 2021, Fant set career-highs in receptions (68) and touchdown receptions (four) and is one of three tight ends, along with Travis Kelce and Dalton Schultz, to record at least 60 receptions and 600 receiving yards in each of the last two seasons.

AT A GLANCE

- Brooks started all 17 games last season and ranked second in the league with a career-high 183 tackles. He is the only player with at least 180 tackles and 10 tackles for loss (10) in a season since 2000.
- Was one of five players to record at least 10 games with 10-or-more tackles during the 2021 season and was one of three players to record at least 20 tackles in a single game (20 tackles in Week 18), along with Kamu Grugier-Hill and Bobby Wagner.

MONDAY NIGHT OPENER

The Seahawks open the 2021 season on Monday Night Football as they host the Denver Broncos in Week 1. This marks the second time in franchise history that the team will play their first game of the season on Monday. Seattle opened the 1984 season with a 33-0 shutout victory over Cleveland.

MUNICH BOUND

Seattle is set to meet the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Week 10 at Allianz Arena - Home of FC Bayern Munich, the first-ever NFL regular-season game in Germany. The Seahawks won each of their first two regular-season games outside of the United States, defeating Buffalo at Rogers Centre in Toronto, Ontario, Canada during the 2012 season and the Oakland Raiders at Wembley Stadium in London, England during the 2018 season.

 DAVANTE ADAMS, Las Vegas, needs 115 receptions to become the first player ever to reach the mark in three consecutive seasons. Adams also:

Needs 10 touchdown receptions to become the fourth player ever with at least 10 touchdown receptions in at least six of his first nine seasons, joining Jerry Rice (seven seasons), Marvin Harrison (six) and Randy Moss (six).

 JAMAL ADAMS, Seattle, needs 3.5 sacks to become the sixth defensive back since 1982 with at least 25 career sacks, joining Rodney Harrison (30.5 sacks), Ronde Barber (28), Brian Dawkins (26), Adrian Wilson (25.5) and Carnell Lake (25). Adams also:

> Needs five sacks to become the first defensive back since 1982 with three career seasons with at least five sacks. Adams had 9.5 sacks in 2020 and 6.5 sacks in 2019.

JOSH ALLEN, Buffalo, needs 4,000 passing yards and 35 touchdown passes to join Patrick Mahomes as the only quarterbacks all-time with at least 4,000 passing yards and 35 touchdown passes in three of their first five seasons. Allen also:

Needs five rushing touchdowns to join Cam Newton (seven consecutive seasons from 2011-17) as the only quarterbacks all-time with at least five rushing touchdowns in five consecutive seasons.

o KEENAN ALLEN, Los Angeles Chargers, needs 100 receptions to join Antonio Brown (six seasons from 2013-18) and Marvin Harrison (four seasons from 1999-2002) as the only players ever to record at least 100 receptions in four consecutive seasons. Allen also:

Needs 95 receptions to join Antonio Brown (2013-18) as the only players ever to reach the mark in six consecutive seasons.

o MARK ANDREWS, Baltimore, needs 1,034 receiving yards to become the third tight end ever with at least 4,500 receiving yards in his first five seasons, joining Jimmy Graham (4,752 receiving yards) and Kellen Winslow Sr. (4,513). Andrews has 3,466 career receiving yards. Andrews also:

Needs seven receiving touchdowns to become the third tight end all-time with at least seven touchdown receptions in four consecutive seasons, joining Antonio Gates (nine consecutive seasons from 2004-12) and Jimmy Graham (four from 2011-14). BILL BELICHICK, New England, ranks third alltime with 321 total victories (regular-season and playoffs combined) and needs four wins to surpass George Halas (324 combined wins) for the second-most total victories by a head coach in NFL history. Belichick also:

Needs 10 regular-season wins to become the third head coach ever with 300 career regular-season victories, joining Don Shula (328 regular-season wins) and George Halas (318).

Can surpass Don Shula (19) for the most postseason berths as a head coach. Belichick-led teams have earned playoff berths in 19 different seasons.

- o NICK BOSA, San Francisco, needs 15 sacks to become the fifth player since 1982 to record at least 15 sacks in two of his first four career seasons, joining Reggie White (three seasons), Richard Dent (two), Andre Tippett (two) and J.J. Watt (two). Bosa had 15.5 sacks in 2021.
- TOM BRADY, Tampa Bay, needs at least 5,000 passing yards to join Drew Brees (2011-13) as the only players in NFL history to record 5,000 passing yards in consecutive seasons and can join Brees (five seasons) as the only players with at least 5,000 passing yards in three different seasons. Brady also:

Needs at least 4,000 passing yards to tie Peyton Manning (14 seasons) for the most such seasons in NFL history.

Needs 2,431 passing yards to become the first player in NFL history with 100,000 career passing yards, including the postseason. Brady enters the season with 97,569 career passing yards, including the postseason, the most in NFL history.

Needs at least 40 touchdown passes to become the first player in NFL history to record 40 touchdown passes in three consecutive seasons and can become the first player with at least 40 touchdown passes in four different seasons.

Needs at least 30 touchdown passes to tie Drew Brees (10 seasons) for the most such seasons in NFL history.

Needs 25 touchdown passes to surpass Peyton Manning (16 seasons) for the most such seasons in NFL history.



JOE BURROW, Cincinnati, needs 4,338
passing yards to surpass Jameis Winston
(11,636) for the third-most passing yards
by a player in his first three seasons in
NFL history. Only Andrew Luck (12,957) and
Peyton Manning (12,287) have more. Burrow
also:

Needs 4,500 passing yards to become the first player in NFL history to record at least 4,500 passing yards in two of his first three seasons.

Needs nine games with at least 300 passing yards to surpass Andrew Luck (19 games) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history.

Needs one game with at least 400 passing yards to surpass Dan Marino (four games) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history.

DEREK CARR, Las Vegas, needs 3,300 passing yards to become the fourth player in NFL history with at least 35,000 passing yards in his first nine seasons, joining Matt Ryan (37,701), Peyton Manning (37,586) and Dan Marino (35,386). Carr enters the season with 31,700 career passing yards. Carr also:

Needs 3,000 passing yards to become the third player in NFL history to record at least 3,000 passing yards in each of his first nine seasons, joining Peyton Manning and Russell Wilson.

JA'MARR CHASE, Cincinnati, needs 1,562 receiving yards to surpass Justin Jefferson. (3,016) for the most receiving yards by a player through his first two seasons in NFL history. Jefferson also:

Needs 1,250 receiving yards to join Odell Beckham Jr., Justin Jefferson and Randy Moss as the only players to accomplish the feat in each of their first two seasons in NFL history.

- NICK CHUBB, Cleveland, needs eight rushing touchdowns to become the fifth player in NFL history to accomplish the feat in each of his first five seasons, joining Jim Brown, Adrian Peterson, Emmitt Smith and LaDainian Tomlinson.
- AMARI COOPER, Cleveland, needs five touchdown receptions to become the sixth player in the Super Bowl era to accomplish the feat in each of his first eight seasons, joining Gary Clark, Marques Colston, Larry Fitzgerald, Marvin Harrison and Randy Moss.
- o KIRK COUSINS, Minnesota, needs at least 25 touchdown passes to become the fifth player to accomplish the feat in at least eight consecutive seasons in NFL history, joining Peyton Manning (13 seasons), Drew Brees (11), Philip Rivers (11) and Tom Brady (10). Cousins also:

Needs a season passer rating of 100-or-higher (min. 300 attempts) to become the fourth player ever to accomplish the feat in at least four consecutive seasons, joining Drew Brees (six seasons from 2015-20), Aaron Rodgers (four seasons from 2009-12) and Russell Wilson (four season from 2018-21).

- o STEFON DIGGS, Buffalo, needs 105 receptions to become the sixth player ever with 700 receptions in his first eight career seasons, joining Marvin Harrison (759 receptions), DeAndre Hopkins (747), Antonio Brown (733), Torry Holt (712) and Brandon Marshall (712). Diggs has 595 receptions in his first seven seasons.
- o TREVON DIGGS, Dallas, needs six interceptions to become the fifth player in the Super Bowl era with at least 20 interceptions in his first three seasons, joining Lem Barney (25 interceptions), Everson Walls (22), Ed Reed (21) and Richard Sherman (20). Diggs enters the season with 14 career interceptions. Diggs also:

Needs 10 interceptions to join Don Doll (1949-50) and Tom Keane (1952-53) as the only players in NFL history to record at least 10 interceptions in consecutive seasons. AARON DONALD, Los Angeles Rams, needs 12 sacks to become the fourth player since 1982 with at least 110 sacks in his first nine seasons, joining Reggie White (137 sacks), Jared Allen (117) and DeMarcus Ware (117). Donald has 98 sacks in his first eight seasons. Donald also:

Needs 12 sacks to become the second player since 1982 with at least 12 sacks in five consecutive seasons, joining Lawrence Taylor (five consecutive seasons from 1985-89).

Needs eight sacks to become the third player since 1982 with at least eight sacks in each of his first nine seasons, joining Derrick Thomas (first 10 seasons) and Reggie White (14 seasons).



AUSTIN EKELER, Los Angeles Chargers, needs one touchdown reception to surpass James White (24 touchdown receptions) for the most touchdown receptions by a running back in his first six seasons since 1970. Ekeler also:

Needs four games with both a rushing touchdown and receiving touchdown to become the first player ever with 10 such games within his first six seasons.

Needs 237 receiving yards to surpass Priest Holmes (2,962 receiving yards) for the most receiving yards by an undrafted running back in the common-draft era. Ekeler enters the season with 2,726 career receiving yards.

EZEKIEL ELLIOTT, Dallas, needs at least 1,250 scrimmage yards and eight touchdowns to join LaDainian Tomlinson as the only players to accomplish the feat in each of their first seven seasons in NFL history. Elliott also:

Needs at least 950 rushing yards and six rushing touchdowns to join Eric Dickerson, Adrian Peterson and LaDainian Tomlinson as the only players ever to accomplish the feat in each of their first seven seasons. MIKE EVANS, Tampa Bay, needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first player with at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first nine seasons in NFL history and can join Jerry Rice (11 seasons; 1986-96) and Tim Brown (nine; 1993-2001) as the only players with at least 1,000 receiving yards in nine consecutive seasons. Evans also:

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Needs 13 touchdown receptions to become the fourth player in NFL history with at least 13 touchdown receptions in three consecutive seasons, joining Lance Alworth (1964-66), Terrell Owens (2000-02) and Jerry Rice (1989-91; 1993-95).

- o JARED GOFF, Detroit, needs seven games with at least 300 passing yards to tie Andrew Luck (33 games) for the secondmost such games by a player in his first seven seasons in NFL history. Only Dan Marino (37) has more. Goff enters the season with 26 career games of at least 300 passing yards.
- o MELVIN GORDON, Denver, needs eight rushing touchdowns to become the fifth running back in NFL history with at least eight rushing touchdowns in six consecutive seasons, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (nine seasons), Jim Brown (seven), Adrian Peterson (seven) and Emmitt Smith (seven).
- NAJEE HARRIS, Pittsburgh, needs 89
 receptions to surpass Alvin Kamara (162
 receptions) for the second-most by a
 running back in his first two seasons in NFL
 history. Only Christian McCaffrey (187) has
 more. Harris totaled 74 receptions in his
 rookie season.



DERRICK HENRY, Tennessee, needs 10 rushing touchdowns to become the fifth running back all-time with at least 10 rushing touchdowns in five consecutive seasons, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (nine consecutive seasons), Adrian Peterson (seven), Shaun Alexander (five) and Michael Turner (five). Henry also:

Needs two games with at least 200 rushing yards to surpass Adrian Peterson (six games) and O.J. Simpson (six) for the most such games in NFL history.

Needs three games with at least 150 rushing yards to surpass Jim Brown (13 games) and LaDainian Tomlinson (12) for the second-most such games in NFL history. Only Barry Sanders (25 games) has more.

JUSTIN HERBERT, L.A. Chargers, needs 30 touchdown passes to surpass Dan Marino (98 touchdown passes) for the most by a player through his first three seasons in NFL history. Herbert enters the season with 69 touchdown passes. Herbert also:

Needs 30 touchdown passes to become the first player ever to record at least 30 touchdown passes in each of his first three seasons.

Needs 3,608 passing yards to surpass Andrew Luck (12,957 passing yards) for the most by a player through his first three seasons in NFL history. Herbert enters the season with 9,350 passing yards.

Needs 4,000 passing yards to become the first player ever to record at least 4,000 passing yards in each of his first three seasons.

Needs 10 rushing touchdowns to join Cam Newton (three seasons) as the only quarterbacks in league annals with at least 10 rushing touchdowns in multiple seasons.

 J.C. JACKSON, Los Angeles Chargers, needs eight interceptions to become the first player ever to record at least eight interceptions in three consecutive seasons. Jackson also:

Needs five interceptions to become the fourth player in the Super Bowl era with at least 30 interceptions through his first five seasons, joining Lem Barney (35 interceptions), Everson Walls (34) and Gary Barbaro (31). Jackson has 25 career interceptions.

LAMAR JACKSON, Baltimore, needs 827 rushing yards to become the fifth quarterback all-time with at least 4,500 career rushing yards, joining Michael Vick (6,109 rushing yards), Cam Newton (5,628), Randall Cunningham (4,928) and Russell Wilson (4,689). Jackson has 3,673 career rushing yards. Jackson also:

Needs one game with at least 100 rushing yards to surpass Michael Vick (10 games) for the most such games by a quarterback all-time. Jackson has 10 career 100-yard rushing games.

JUSTIN JEFFERSON, Minnesota, needs 1,148 receiving yards to surpass Randy Moss [4,163] for the most receiving yards by a player through his first three seasons in NFL history. Jefferson has 3,016 career receiving yards. Jefferson also:

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Needs 1,400 receiving yards to become the first player ever to accomplish the feat in each of his first three seasons.

Needs 104 receptions to join Michael Thomas (321 receptions) and Christian McCaffrey (303) as the only players ever with at least 300 receptions through their first three seasons. Jefferson has 196 career receptions.

Needs six games with at least 100 receiving yards to surpass Odell Beckham Jr. (19 games) and Randy Moss (19) for the most such games by a player through his first three seasons in NFL history. Jefferson has 14 career games with at least 100 receiving yards.

o MAC JONES, New England, needs eight games with a passer rating of 100-or-higher to become the fifth quarterback all-time to have 15 such games in his first two seasons, joining Russell Wilson (17), Dak Prescott (16), Justin Herbert (15) and Dan Marino (15). Jones had seven games with a passer rating of 100-or-higher as a rookie in 2021. Jones also:

Needs 348 completions to become the third quarterback with at least 700 completions in his first two career seasons all-time, joining Justin Herbert (839 completions) and Kyler Murray (724). Jones has 352 career completions.

o CAMERON JORDAN, New Orleans, needs seven sacks to become the sixth player since 1982 to record at least seven sacks in 11 consecutive seasons, joining Reggie White (14 consecutive seasons), Chris Doleman (13), John Randle (12), Robert Mathis (11) and Derrick Thomas (11). Jordan also:

Needs 12 sacks to become the sixth player since 1982 to record at least six career seasons with at least 12 sacks, joining Reggie White (10 seasons), Kevin Greene (eight), Bruce Smith (eight), Leslie O'Neal (seven) and Simeon Rice (six). ALVIN KAMARA, New Orleans, needs 62 receptions to surpass Roger Craig (434 receptions) for the most receptions by a running back in his first six seasons in NFL history. Kamara has 373 career receptions. Kamara also:

Needs five touchdown receptions to become the first running back with at least five touchdown receptions in four career seasons since 1970. Kamara had five touchdown receptions in 2017, 2020 and 2021.

o **TRAVIS KELCE**, Kansas City, needs 96 receptions to become the fifth tight end in NFL history with at least 800 career receptions, joining Tony Gonzalez (1,325), Jason Witten (1,228), Antonio Gates (955) and Shannon Sharpe (815). Kelce has 704 receptions in nine career seasons. Kelce also:

Needs 994 receiving yards to become the fifth tight end in NFL history with at least 10,000 career receiving yards, joining Tony Gonzalez (15,127), Jason Witten (13,046), Antonio Gates (11,841) and Shannon Sharpe (10,060).

Needs 1,000 receiving yards to become the first tight end in NFL history with seven career seasons of at least 1,000 receiving yards. Kelce has at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of the past six seasons.

Needs 103 receptions to surpass Jason Witten (806 receptions) for the most receptions by a tight end in his first 10 seasons in NFL history.

Needs four games with at least 100 receiving yards to surpass Rob Gronkowski (32 games) and Tony Gonzalez (31 games) for the most such games by a tight end in NFL history. Kelce has 29 career games with at least 100 receiving yards.



o GEORGE KITTLE, San Francisco, needs 65 receptions to become the sixth tight end ever with at least 400 receptions in his first six seasons, joining Zach Ertz (437 receptions), Jimmy Graham (434), Jason Witten (429), Travis Kelce (410) and Antonio Gates (400). Kittle has 335 career receptions. Kittle also:

Needs 511 receiving yards to become the sixth tight end in NFL history with at least 5,000 receiving yards in his first six seasons, joining Rob Gronkowski (5,555), Jimmy Graham (5,357), Travis Kelce (5,236), Kellen Winslow Sr. (5,176) and Antonio Gates (5,066). Kittle has 4,489 career receiving yards.

Needs 500 receiving yards to become the fifth tight end all-time with at least 500 receiving yards in each of his first six seasons, joining Rob Gronkowski, Keith Jackson, Ozzie Newsome and Jeremy Shockey.

cooper Kupp, Los Angeles Rams, can become the fourth player since 1970 to lead the league or tie for the lead in touchdown receptions in consecutive seasons, joining Jerry Rice (1986-87; 1989-91), Terrell Owens (2001-02) and Larry Fitzgerald (2008-09). Kupp led the NFL with 16 touchdown receptions in 2021. Kupp also:

Needs at least five receptions in each of his first three games to surpass DeAndre Hopkins (23 consecutive games from 2018-20) for the second-longest such streak in NFL history. Since Week 13 of the 2020 season, Kupp has recorded at least five receptions in 21 consecutive games.

MATT LAFLEUR, Green Bay, can become the first coach since 1970 to win at least 13 games in each of his first four seasons as an NFL head coach. LaFleur also:

Needs 14 wins to surpass George Seifert (52 wins) for the most-ever by a head coach in his first four seasons. LaFleur has 39 career regular-season wins through three seasons.

Needs 11 wins within the team's first 12 games of the season to surpass Paul Brown (62 games) and George Seifert (62) as the fastest head coach in NFL history to reach 50 career wins. LaFleur has 39 wins in 49 career games.

- o TREVOR LAWRENCE, Jacksonville, needs 341 completions to become the third player in NFL history with at least 700 completions through his first two seasons, joining Justin Herbert (839 completions) and Kyler Murray (724). Lawrence totaled 359 completions in his rookie season.
- o SHAQUILLE LEONARD, Indianapolis, needs four interceptions to become the third linebacker in the Super Bowl era with at least 15 interceptions in his first five seasons, joining Jack Ham (17 interceptions) and Stan White (16). Leonard has 11 career interceptions.
- PATRICK MAHOMES, Kansas City, needs at least 4,500 passing yards and 35 touchdown passes to become the fourth quarterback all-time with four such career seasons, joining Tom Brady (five), Drew Brees (four) and Peyton Manning (four). Mahomes also:

Needs 35 touchdown passes to become the fifth quarterback all-time with four career seasons with at least 35 touchdown passes, joining Tom Brady (six), Aaron Rodgers (six), Drew Brees (four) and Peyton Manning (four).

Needs 4,000 passing yards to join Peyton Manning as the only players in NFL history to throw for at least 4,000 passing yards in five of their first six seasons.

Needs 2,264 passing yards in his first 12 starts to surpass Matthew Stafford [21,254] for the most ever by a player in his first 75 career starts. Mahomes has 18,991 career passing yards.

Needs 23 touchdown passes in his first 12 starts to surpass Dan Marino (173) for the most ever by a player in his first 75 career starts.

CHRISTIAN MCCAFFREY, Carolina, needs 78 receptions to surpass Roger Craig (434 receptions) for the most receptions by a running back in his first six seasons in NFL history. McCaffrey enters the season with 357 career receptions. McCaffrey also:

Needs 838 receiving yards to surpass Marshall Faulk (3,852 receiving yards) for the most receiving yards by a running back in his first six seasons since 1970. McCaffrey enters the season with 3,015 career receiving yards.

Needs one game with both a rushing touchdown and receiving touchdown to become the first player ever with 10 such games within his first six seasons.

o **DK METCALF**, Seattle, needs 900 receiving yards and five touchdown receptions to become the fifth player since 1970 to reach those marks in each of his first four seasons, joining Joey Galloway, A.J. Green, Randy Moss and Michael Thomas. Metcalf also:

Needs seven touchdown receptions to become the fourth player all-time with at least seven touchdown receptions in each of his first four seasons, joining Joey Galloway, Bob Hayes and Randy Moss.

 VON MILLER, Buffalo, needs 14.5 sacks to become the fifth player since 1982 with at least 130 sacks in his first 12 seasons, joining Reggie White (165.5 sacks), Bruce Smith (140), DeMarcus Ware (138.5) and Jared Allen (136). Miller has 115.5 career sacks.



KYLER MURRAY, Arizona, needs 3,520 passing yards to become the fifth quarterback all-time with at least 15,000 passing yards in his first four seasons, joining Peyton Manning (16,418), Dan Marino (16,177), Dak Prescott (15,778) and Ryan Tannehill (15,460). Murray has 11,480 career passing yards. Murray also:

Needs 3,500 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes to join Peyton Manning as the only players ever to reach those marks in each of their first four seasons.

Needs 214 rushing yards to become the fourth quarterback all-time with at least 2,000 rushing yards and 20 rushing touchdowns in his first four seasons, joining Josh Allen, Lamar Jackson and Cam Newton. Murray has 1,786 career rushing yards and 20 career rushing touchdowns.

Needs five rushing touchdowns to join Cam Newton (33) and Josh Allen (31) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to rush for at least 25 rushing touchdowns in their first four seasons.

- yANNICK NGAKOUE, Indianapolis, needs eight sacks to become the fifth player to record at least eight sacks in each of his first seven seasons since 1982, joining Aaron Donald, Derrick Thomas, DeMarcus Ware and Reggie White.
- MICAH PARSONS, Dallas, needs 13 sacks to become the third player since 1982 to record at least 13 sacks in each of his first two seasons, joining Aldon Smith (2011-12) and Reggie White (1985-86).
- CORDARELLE PATTERSON, Atlanta, needs one kickoff return touchdown to surpass Josh Cribbs (eight) and Leon Washington (eight) for the most in NFL history.
- KYLE PITTS, Atlanta, needs 955 receiving yards to surpass Mike Ditka (1,980) for the most receiving yards by a tight end in his first two seasons all-time. Pitts had 1,026 receiving yards as a rookie. Pitts also:

Needs 77 receptions to surpass Keith Jackson (144) for the most receptions by a tight end in his first two seasons in NFL history. Pitts had 68 receptions as a rookie.

DAK PRESCOTT, Dallas, needs five rushing touchdowns to become the fourth quarterback in NFL history with at least 30 rushing touchdowns in his first seven seasons, joining Cam Newton (54 rushing touchdowns), Jack Kemp (33), and Josh Allen (31). Prescott has 25 career rushing touchdowns. Prescott also:

Needs three games with both a passing and rushing touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history with 20 such games within his first seven seasons, joining Cam Newton (37 games), Josh Allen (20) and Daunte Culpepper (20).

a ANDY REID, Kansas City, needs 10 wins to surpass Tom Landry (16 seasons) for the third-most 10-win seasons by a head coach in NFL history. Only Bill Belichick (20 seasons) and Don Shula (20) have more. Reid also:

Needs 10 wins to become the third coach in NFL history to record at least 10 wins in eight consecutive seasons, joining Bill Belichick (17 consecutive seasons from 2003-19) and George Seifert (eight consecutive seasons from 1989-96).

JAMES ROBINSON, Jacksonville, needs eight touchdowns to become the first undrafted player in the common-draft era to record at least eight touchdowns in each of his first three seasons. Robinson also:

Needs seven touchdowns to become the third undrafted player in the commondraft era to record at least 25 touchdowns through his first three seasons, joining Arian Foster (33 touchdowns) and Antonio Gates (25). Robinson has 18 career touchdowns.

Needs 1,097 scrimmage yards to become the third undrafted player in the common-draft era to record at least 3,500 scrimmage yards through his first three seasons, joining Arian Foster (4,411 scrimmage yards) and Ryan Grant (3,870). Robinson has 2,403 career scrimmage yards.

AARON RODGERS, Green Bay, can become the first player all-time to win three consecutive Most Valuable Player awards and can tie Peyton Manning (five) for the most Most Valuable Player awards all-time. Rodgers was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2011, 2014, 2020 and 2021 seasons. Rodgers also:

Needs 4,000 passing yards to become the fifth quarterback to reach the mark in 11 different seasons, joining Peyton Manning (14), Tom Brady (13), Drew Brees (12) and Philip Rivers (12).

Can become the first player ever with at least 40 touchdown passes in four different seasons and at least 35 touchdown passes in seven different seasons.

Needs 30 passing touchdowns to become the fifth quarterback in NFL history with nine such seasons, joining Drew Brees (10), Tom Brady (nine), Brett Favre (nine) and Peyton Manning (nine).

Needs two games with at least four touchdown passes to become the fourth quarterback all-time with 35 such career games, joining Tom Brady (39), Drew Brees (37) and Peyton Manning (35). Rodgers has 33 career games with at least four touchdown passes.



MATT RYAN, Indianapolis, needs at least 3,500 passing yards to become the fifth player in NFL history to reach the mark in 13 consecutive seasons, joining Drew Brees (14), Tom Brady (13), Peyton Manning (13) and Philip Rivers (13), Rvan also:

Needs 265 passing yards in his first game to become the second-fastest player ever (223 games) to reach 60,000 career passing yards. Only Drew Brees (215) reached the mark in fewer games.

Needs one game with at least 300 passing yards to surpass Philip Rivers (73 games) for the fourth-most such games in NFL history, trailing only Drew Brees (123), Tom Brady (108) and Peyton Manning (93).

Needs 20 touchdown passes to become the third player in NFL history to reach the mark in 14 consecutive seasons, joining Drew Brees (17 seasons) and Philip Rivers (15).

- o AMON-RA ST. BROWN, Detroit, needs eight receptions in his first game to become the fifth player ever to record at least eight receptions in seven consecutive games, joining Antonio Brown (eight consecutive games in 2014), Michael Thomas (eight in 2019), Anquan Boldin (seven in 2005) and Travis Kelce (seven in 2020). St. Brown recorded at least eight receptions in each of his final six games of the 2021 season.
- MATTHEW STAFFORD, Los Angeles Rams, needs 4,000 passing yards to become the seventh player ever to have 10 such career seasons, joining Peyton Manning (14), Tom Brady (13), Drew Brees (12), Philip Rivers (12), Aaron Rodgers (10) and Matt Ryan (10). Stafford also:

Needs 381 completions to surpass Peyton Manning (4,682) for the third-most all-time completions by a quarterback in his first 14 seasons. Stafford has 4,302 career completions.



JONATHAN TAYLOR, Indianapolis, needs 2,062 scrimmage yards to surpass Jamal Lewis (5,700 scrimmage yards) for the third-most scrimmage yards by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history. Only LaDainian Tomlinson (6,145) and Eric Dickerson (5,816) have more. Taylor has 3,639 scrimmage yards. Taylor also:

Needs 16 touchdowns to surpass Barry Sanders (47 touchdowns) for the most-ever by a player in his first three seasons. Taylor has 32 career touchdowns.

Needs eight games with at least 100 rushing yards and a rushing touchdown to surpass Earl Campbell (19 games) and Eric Dickerson (19) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history. Taylor has 12 career games with at least 100 rushing yards and a rushing touchdown.

Needs six games with at least two touchdowns to surpass Marcus Allen (13 games), Jim Brown (13), Eric Dickerson (13), Larry Johnson (13) and Alvin Kamara (13) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history. Taylor has eight career games with at least two touchdowns.



ADAM THIELEN, Minnesota, needs 10 touchdown receptions to join Antonio Gates (four seasons) as the only undrafted players in the common-draft era to record at least 10 touchdown receptions in three different seasons. Thielen also:

Needs five touchdown receptions to join Antonio Gates (12 seasons) and Rod Smith (seven seasons) as the only undrafted players in the common-draft era to record at least five touchdown receptions in six different seasons.

Needs two touchdown receptions to surpass Wes Welker (50 touchdown receptions) for the third-most by an undrafted player in the common-draft era. Only Antonino Gates (116) and Rod Smith (68) have more. JAYLEN WADDLE, Miami, needs 93 receptions to surpass Justin Jefferson (196 receptions) and Michael Thomas (196) for the most-ever by a player in his first two seasons. Waddle had an NFL rookie-record 104 receptions in 2021. Waddle also:

Needs 100 receptions to become the first player ever to record at least 100 receptions in each of his first two seasons.

Needs two games with at least 10 receptions to surpass Odell Beckham Jr. (four games) and Christian McCaffrey (four) for the most such games by a player in his first two seasons in NFL history. Waddle had three such games as a rookie in 2021.

T.J. WATT, Pittsburgh, can become the first player to lead the league in sacks in three different seasons since 1982. Watt also:

Needs nine sacks to surpass DeMarcus Ware (80 sacks) for the second-most sacks by a player in his first six seasons since 1982. Only Reggie White (95) has more. Watt has 72 career sacks.

Needs 13 sacks to become the first player since 1982 to record at least 13 sacks in five consecutive seasons.

Needs 15 sacks to join Reggie White (1986-88) as the only players since 1982 to record at least 15 sacks in three consecutive seasons.

Needs 20 sacks to become the first player since 1982 to record at least 20 sacks in consecutive seasons.

RUSSELL WILSON, Denver, needs 13 wins to surpass Tom Brady (125) for the most wins, including the postseason, by a quarterback in his first 11 seasons. Wilson has won 113 games, including the postseason, since entering the NFL in 2012. Wilson also:

Needs 3,000 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes to join Peyton Manning as the only players to reach those marks in each of their first 11 seasons.

Needs 42 touchdown passes to surpass Peyton Manning (333) for the most by a player in his first 11 seasons in NFL history. Wilson has 292 career touchdown passes.

Needs 10 games with at least two touchdown passes to surpass Peyton Manning (101) for the most such games by a player in his first 11 seasons all-time. Wilson has 92 career games with at least two touchdown passes.

Immediately following a Super Bowl victory, the winner is presented with the **VINCE LOMBARDI TROPHY**.

LOMBARDI TROPHY FACTS & FIGURES
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A tough, reliable running game allows an offense to command a game's pace. In the majority of contests, it can also control the game's result.

In 2021, NFL teams with a 100-yard rusher posted a 73-28-2 record for a .718 winning percentage. That rated higher than clubs with a 100-yard receiver (105-61, .633) or a 300-yard passer (68-44, .607).

Indianapolis running back **JONATHAN TAYLOR** led the NFL with 1,811 rushing yards and had 10 games in which he rushed for at least 100 yards, the most in the league. The Colts were 9-1 in those games, accounting for all their wins last season.

Since 2017, including the postseason:

- Tennessee running back **DERRICK HENRY** leads the NFL with 28 games of at least 100 rushing yards. In those games, the Titans have a .893 winning percentage (25-3).
- o Dallas running back **EZEKIEL ELLIOTT** ranks second with 24 games of 100-or-more rushing yards and the Cowboys have a 21-3 record (.875) in those games.
- Cleveland running back NICK CHUBB, who entered the NFL in 2018, is the only other player with at least 20 games (22) with 100-or-more rushing yards over the past five seasons. In those games, the Browns have a 16-6 record (.727).

Over the past five years, teams have compiled a 363-122-3 record (.747) when a player has eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark. By comparison, clubs with a 100-yard receiver have a .568 winning percentage (476-362-6), while offenses with a 300-yard passer have a .551 winning percentage (331-269-5).

What is one of the most important keys to success in the NFL? Winning the turnover battle certainly ranks high on the list.

Last season, four of the top seven teams in net turnover differential won their division: the **DALLAS COWBOYS** (+14, NFC East), **GREEN BAY PACKERS** (+13, NFC North), **TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS** (+10, NFC South) and **BUFFALO BILLS** (+8, AFC East). Nine of the 15 teams with a positive turnover differential qualified for the postseason, including six division winners.

Dallas paced the NFL with 34 takeaways last season, including a league-leading 11 interceptions from cornerback **TREVON DIGGS**. Green Bay, **MINNESOTA** and **SEATTLE** totaled the fewest giveaways (13 each) in 2021. The Packers ranked in the top-two in fewest giveaways for the fourth-consecutive season after recording a league-low 11 giveaways in 2020 and the second fewest giveaways in both 2019 (13) and 2018 (15).

Excelling on third down extends drives and keeps your opponent off the field, which can be an important factor in winning games.

Last season, each of the top three teams in third-down conversion percentage won their division - **KANSAS CITY** (52.2 percent), **TAMPA BAY** (47.1 percent) and **BUFFALO** (46.4 percent) - while 11 of the 14 teams to convert at least 40 percent of their third-down chances qualified for the postseason.

The Chiefs became the fifth team since 2000 to convert at least 52 percent of their third down chances, joining the 2011 New Orleans Saints (56.7 percent), 2006 Indianapolis Colts (56.1 percent), 2004 Minnesota Vikings (52.3 percent) and 2002 San Francisco 49ers (52.3 percent).



The two-point conversion is as popular as ever and has proven to be an increasingly important play in the NFL in recent years.

Last year, the **LOS ANGELES CHARGERS** led the league and became the fourth team since 1994, when the two-point conversion was instituted, to convert seven two-point tries in a single season, joining the 2020 Minnesota Vikings (eight), 2015 Pittsburgh Steelers (eight) and 2020 Philadelphia Eagles (seven).

In total, 75 two-point conversions were successful in 2021, surpassing the 2018 season (66) for the most in a single season since 1994. Five of the top six highest single-season totals for successful two-point conversions have occurred in the past six years.

Teams attempted a total of 154 two-point conversions in 2021, the most in a single season since 1994. Almost half of the league (15 teams) attempted at least five two-point conversions, led by the Chargers (11), **DALLAS** (10) and **NEW YORK JETS** (nine).

In 2021, almost two-thirds of the league (22 teams) converted multiple two-point conversions throughout the regular season and 11 teams were successful on at least three conversions. Four teams - the Los Angeles Chargers (seven), Dallas (six), **DETROIT** (five) and **PHILADELPHIA** (five) - each registered at least five successful two-point conversions, marking the first time since 1994 that four teams each recorded five-ormore successful two-point tries.

The 2021 rookie class made an immediate impact during their first season in the NFL, chasing down some of the league's longest standing rookie records. Among the notable accomplishments (listed alphabetically):

- Cincinnati wide receiver JA'MARR CHASE ranked fourth in the NFL with 1,455 receiving yards, the most by a rookie in the Super Bowl era. In Week 17, he recorded 266 receiving yards, the most-ever by a rookie in a single game. In Week 7, at 21 years and 237 days old, Chase became the second-youngest player in NFL history to record at least 200 receiving yards in a single game, trailing only MIKE EVANS (21 years, 87 days old) and was also the first rookie ever and the fifth player in the Super Bowl era to record multiple games with at least 200 receiving yards in a single season. In the postseason, Chase totaled 368 receiving yards, the most-ever by a rookie in the playoffs.
- Pittsburgh saw an impressive pair of rookie performances, as tight end PAT FREIERMUTH ranked second among all rookies with seven touchdown receptions, tied for the most-ever by a rookie tight end in franchise history, while running back NAJEE HARRIS led rookies with 1,667 scrimmage yards (1,200 rushing, 467 receiving), the most-ever by a Pittsburgh rookie.
- New England quarterback MAC JONES led all rookie quarterbacks with a 67.6 completion percentage, 3,801 passing yards, 22 touchdown passes and a 92.5 passer rating (minimum 100 attempts). He had a completion percentage of 70-or-higher in nine games, tied with DAK PRESCOTT (2016) for the most-ever by a rookie quarterback. Jones won six road games, tied with DAK PRESCOTT (2016) and BEN ROETHLISBERGER (2004) for the most-ever by a rookie quarterback.
- Jacksonville quarterback **TREVOR LAWRENCE** led all rookies with 359 completions, the third-most completions by a rookie all-time, trailing **JUSTIN HERBERT** (396 in 2020) and **CARSON WENTZ** (379 in 2016). At London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in London in Week 6, Lawrence and Dolphins second-year quarterback **TUA TAGOVAILOA** (23 years old) each recorded at least 300 passing yards, marking the second game in NFL history in which two quarterbacks under the age of 24 each passed for at least 300 yards in the same game. He also became the first rookie quarterback to ever win a game played in London.
- San Francisco running back ELIJAH MITCHELL ranked second among rookies with a franchise rookie-record 963 rushing yards and became the fourth rookie since 1990 with at least 100 rushing yards in five of his first 10 career games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer EDGERRIN JAMES (seven games in 1999), ADRIAN PETERSON (six in 2007) and EZEKIEL ELLIOTT (five in 2016).
- Dallas linebacker MICAH PARSONS led all rookies with 13 sacks, tied for the fourth-most by a rookie since 1982, when the
 individual sack became an official statistic. He ranked third in NFL with 20 tackles for loss, most by rookie since LAVONTE DAVID
 (20 in 2012) and tied for the lead among rookies with three forced fumbles.
- Atlanta tight end KYLE PITTS recorded 68 receptions and 1,026 receiving yards, the second-most receiving yards and third-most receptions ever by a rookie tight end. He became the third rookie tight end in league history with 100 receiving yards in at least three games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer MIKE DITKA (five games in 1961) and CHARLE YOUNG (four games in 1973). In Weeks 5 and 7, Pitts became the second rookie tight end in NFL history with at least 100 receiving yards in consecutive games, joining RAYMOND CHESTER (Weeks 5-6, 1970).
- Detroit wide receiver AMON-RA ST. BROWN ranked second among rookies with 90 receptions and had a franchise rookie-record 912 receiving yards, fifth-most among all-first year players. In Week 13, he became the third rookie to record his first career touchdown reception with no time remaining in the fourth quarter since 2000, joining K.J. HAMLER (Week 8, 2020) and ERNEST WILFORD (Week 1, 2004). From Week 13-18, St. Brown became the first rookie all-time with at least eight receptions in six consecutive games and from Week 15-18, joined ODELL BECKHAM JR. (2014) and Pro Football Hall of Famer RANDY MOSS (1998) as the only rookies all-time with at least 90 receiving yards and a touchdown catch in four consecutive games.
- Miami wide receiver JAYLEN WADDLE recorded 104 receptions, surpassing ANQUAN BOLDIN (101 receptions in 2003) for the most receptions by a rookie all-time. He had seven games with at least eight receptions, the most such by a rookie all-time. Waddle recorded at least eight receptions in four consecutive games from Weeks 11-16 and is one of three rookies all-time (ODELL BECKHAM JR. and AMON-RA ST. BROWN) with at least eight receptions in four consecutive games.



Quarterback **TOM BRADY**, who has started 93 consecutive games over the past six seasons (60 with New England from 2016-19 and 33 with Tampa Bay from 2020-21), has the longest active streak of consecutive games started among quarterbacks.

He is the only quarterback all-time with multiple streaks of 100-or-more consecutive starts, having accomplished the feat from 2001-08 (111 consecutive starts) and 2009-15 (112). With seven consecutive starts to open the 2022 season, he can record his third-career streak of 100+ consecutive starts.

If Brady is the starter for every one of Tampa Bay's 17 games this season, he will join Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning as the only quarterbacks all-time to register 50-or-more consecutive starts with multiple franchises.



- Indianapolis' JONATHAN TAYLOR set a franchise record with 1,811 rushing yards and became the first player under the age of 23 in NFL history with at least 1,800 rushing yards in a single season.
- Cleveland's NICK CHUBB became the fifth player in team history and first since Mike Pruitt (1979-81) to rush for at least 1,000 yards in three consecutive seasons. Chubb also became the first player in franchise history with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his first four seasons.
- Cincinnati's JOE MIXON had a career-high 1,205 rushing yards and joined Corey
 Dillon (six seasons) and Rudi Johnson (three) as the only players in franchise
 history with at least three career seasons with at least 1,100 rushing yards.
- o With Pittsburgh's NAJEE HARRIS setting a franchise-record for rookie rushing yards, 2021 marked the 10th consecutive season (2012-21) with at least one rookie rushing for at least 1,000 yards, the second-longest streak (17 consecutive seasons from 1992-2008) in the common-draft era.
- Minnesota's DALVIN COOK became the second player in franchise history to rush for at least 1,100 yards in three consecutive seasons, joining Adrian Peterson (four consecutive seasons from 2007-10).
- Washington's ANTONIO GIBSON became the sixth running back under the age of 24 in franchise history and first since Alfred Morris in 2012 to rush for at least 1,000 yards in a single season.

As quick passing attacks continue to become more prevalent in today's game, additional yards after the catch have become an increasingly important part of an offense's success.

Los Angeles Rams wide receiver **COOPER KUPP** led the league with 846 yards after the catch last season, while San Francisco wide receiver **DEEBO SAMUEL** finished second with 722, representing the two highest single-season marks in the category by a wide receiver since 2006. Kupp became the first wide receiver to lead the league in yards after the catch since 2013 (**DEMARYIUS THOMAS**, 697).

Cincinnati's **JA'MARR CHASE** totaled 651 yards after the catch as a rookie in 2021, the most by a first-year wide receiver in the past 16 seasons and the fourth-highest total by a rookie since 2006, trailing running backs **SAQUON BARKLEY** in 2018 (768 yards after the catch), **ALVIN KAMARA** in 2017 (683) and **REGGIE BUSH** in 2006 (680).







Elite wide receivers capture the attention of opposing defensive backs, but still earn plenty of it from their quarterbacks, too.

In 2021, six players received at least 160 targets in the same season for the first time since 2015, led by Los Angeles Rams wide receiver **COOPER KUPP** with 191 targets, the most by a Rams wide receiver since Pro Football Hall of Famer **ISAAC BRUCE** in 1995 (199 targets). Buffalo wide receiver **STEFON DIGGS** totaled 166 targets last season and is the only player in the NFL with at least 150 targets in each of the past two seasons.

With **JOSH JACOBS** (84.4 percent) and **HUNTER RENFROW** (80.5 percent), Las Vegas became the third team since 2009 to have multiple players register at least 50 receptions and catch at least 80 percent of their targets in the same season, joining New Orleans in 2017 (**MARK INGRAM** and **ALVIN KAMARA**) and 2019 (**ALVIN KAMARA** and **MICHAEL THOMAS**).



A precise route can be the difference between a game-changing play and an appearance by the punt team. It's a skill for a receiver to know exactly where he needs to go in order to move the chains and keep a drive going.

As part of his record-breaking season in 2021, Los Angeles Rams wide receiver **COOPER KUPP** led the NFL with 89 first-down receptions, the sixth-most in a single season since 1994. Former Green Bay and current Las Vegas wide receiver **DAVANTE ADAMS** ranked second with 84 first-down receptions, followed by Baltimore tight end **MARK ANDREWS** (75), former Kansas City and current Miami wide receiver **TYREEK HILL** (75) and Minnesota wide receiver **JUSTIN JEFFERSON** (75).

Andrews' 75 first-down receptions were the second-most by a tight end in a single season since 1994, trailing only Kansas City tight end **TRAVIS KELCE** in 2020 (79 first-down receptions). Kelce and Tampa Bay wide receiver **MIKE EVANS** are the only players to record at least 50 first-down receptions in each of the past six seasons.





In 2021, the top offenses successfully balanced their up-tempo schemes with the ability to gain chunk yardage at any time.

Watt, who led the NFL with 23 tackles for loss in 2020, joined J.J. WATT (four seasons), **AARON DONALD** (three) and David (two) as the only active players with at least 20 tackles for loss in multiple career seasons. He is also one of four players with at least 10 tackles for loss in each of the past five seasons, joining Donald (eight consecutive seasons), **CAMERON JORDAN** (seven) and **DEMARIO DAVIS** (five).

Donald leads all players with 150 tackles for loss since he entered the NFL in 2014 and is one of four active players with at least 150 career tackles for loss, joining J.J. Watt [177 tackles for loss], CALAIS CAMPBELL [161] and VON MILLER [154].







Throughout the NFL, pass rushers reached the quarterback at a record-setting pace in 2021. Seventeen players recorded at least 10 sacks last season, including four with at least 15 sacks: **T.J. WATT** (22.5), **ROBERT QUINN** (18.5), **MYLES GARRETT** (16) and **NICK BOSA** (15.5).

Watt tied Pro Football Hall of Famer **MICHAEL STRAHAN** (22.5 sacks in 2001) for the most sacks in a single season since 1982, when the individual sack became an official statistic, and became the third player since 1982 to lead the NFL in sacks in consecutive seasons, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer **REGGIE WHITE** (1987-88) and **MARK GASTINEAU** (1983-84).

Quinn, who set a Chicago franchise record with 18.5 sacks in 2021 and had a careerhigh 19 sacks in 2013, became the sixth player since 1982 to record at least 18 sacks in multiple seasons, joining White (three seasons), Gastineau (two), Strahan (two), **DEMARCUS WARE** (two) and **J.J. WATT** (two).

AARON DONALD (five consecutive seasons), Garrett (four) and T.J. Watt (four) are the only players to record at least 10 sacks in each of the past four seasons. Among active players, **CHANDLER JONES** and **VON MILLER** have the most career seasons with double-digit sacks with seven, followed by Donald and **CAMERON JORDAN**, each with six such seasons.

On Kickoff Weekend, Jones became the sixth player to record at least five sacks and two forced fumbles in a single game since 2002 and became the fourth player since 1982 with three NFL games of at least four sacks, joining **LESLIE O'NEAL** (four), Pro Football Hall of Famer **DERRICK THOMAS** (four games) and White (three).

TREY HENDRICKSON, one of two players (T.J. Watt) with at least 13 sacks in each of the past two seasons, became the second player since 1982 to register at least half of a sack in 11 consecutive games (Weeks 5-16) within a single season, joining **CHRIS JONES** (2018).

MICAH PARSONS led all rookies last season with 13 sacks, tied with **DWIGHT FREENEY** (2002) for the third-most by a rookie since 1982. Only **JEVON KEARSE** (14.5 sacks in 1999) and **ALDON SMITH** (14 sacks in 2011) had more.

Creating takeaways at key moments can swing the momentum of a game.

In 2021, three players recorded at least six interceptions - Dallas' **TREVON DIGGS** [11], former New England Patriot and current Los Angeles Charger **J.C. JACKSON** (eight) and Detroit's **AMANI ORUWARIYE** (six) - while eight other players registered at least five interceptions.

Diggs' 11 interceptions were the most by a player in a single season since 1981 and he became the second player in the Super Bowl era to record at least one interception in each of his team's first six games of a season, joining **BRIAN RUSSELL** (first six games in 2003). Jackson, who had a career-high nine interceptions in 2020, became the first player since **RICHARD SHERMAN** (2012-13) to record at least eight interceptions in consecutive seasons.

Last season, six players registered at least five forced fumbles - Indianapolis' SHAQUILLE LEONARD (eight), Los Angeles Chargers' JOEY BOSA (seven), San Francisco's JOSH NORMAN (seven), Arizona's CHANDLER JONES (six), Chicago's TREVIS GIPSON (five) and Pittsburgh's T.J. WATT (five) - while six other players recorded four forced fumbles.

Six players registered multiple defensive touchdowns, led by Philadelphia's **DARIUS SLAY** with three (two fumble-return touchdowns, one interception-return touchdown).
Diggs, Green Bay's **RASUL DOUGLAS** and Tampa Bay's **MIKE EDWARDS** each returned two interceptions for touchdowns while Tennessee's **KEVIN BYARD** and Miami's **XAVIEN HOWARD** each recorded one fumble return for a touchdown and one interception return for a touchdown.

In Weeks 10-11, Slay became the third player since 2000 with a defensive touchdown of at least 50 yards in consecutive games, joining **SHELDON BROWN** (Weeks 13-14, 2009) and **VINCENT FULLER** (Week 3 and Week 5, 2007).





Protecting the quarterback is vital to NFL success.

With such a premium placed on keeping the quarterback out of harm's way, it is no surprise that teams have made it a priority to draft offensive linemen. Nine offensive linemen were selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, marking the third time since 1967 that at least nine offensive linemen were chosen in the first round, joining 1968 (10) and 2013 (nine). Four offensive linemen were selected within the top-15 picks - **IKEM EKWONU** (Carolina, No. 6), **EVAN NEAL** (New York Giants, No. 7), **CHARLES CROSS** (Seattle, No. 9) and **KENYON GREEN** (Houston, No. 15) - the fourth NFL Draft since 2000 to feature at least four offensive linemen chosen among the top-15, joining 2013 (six), 2020 (four) and 2008 (four).

Last season, 11 of the 13 teams that allowed fewer than 35 sacks in 2021 finished with better than a .500 record and of those 13, nine earned postseason berths, including six division winners.

The 2021 season featured many exciting plays in the return game, as players from around the league provided exhilarating action throughout the season.

Among qualified players, Baltimore's **DEVIN DUVERNAY** led the NFL in punt-return average (13.8 yards), followed by **JAKEEM GRANT** (11.9) and **GUNNER OLSZEWSKI** (11.9 - signed with Pittsburgh this offseason). Among players with at least 60 career punt returns, Olszewski's career 12.6 punt-return average (66 punt returns for 834 yards) is the highest among all players in the Super Bowl era.

Grant and **BRANDON POWELL** were the only two players to record a punt return for a touchdown in 2021. Eight players registered a kickoff return for a touchdown, including rookie **KENE NWANGWU**, who recorded a 99-yard kickoff-return for a touchdown in Week 12 and a 98-yard kickoff-return touchdown in Week 9. He became the first rookie with two kickoff-return touchdowns in a season since **CORDARRELLE PATTERSON** in 2013.

Since 2016, Grant and **JAMAL AGNEW** are the only two players with four punt-return touchdowns and two kick-return touchdowns. Last season, Agnew also returned a missed field goal 109 yards for a touchdown in Week 3, tied for the longest return of any kind in league annals. In Week 2, he returned a kickoff 102 yards for a touchdown and became the first player in NFL history to register a touchdown of at least 100 yards in consecutive games.



BRAXTON BERRIOS led all qualified players in kick-return average (30.4 yards) last season, followed by **ANDRE ROBERTS** (27.3), who is the only player to finish among the top-five in the category in each of the past four seasons.

Patterson (29.4 yards) has the highest kickoff-return average among active players with at least 50 career kickoff returns, followed by **BRANDON WILSON** (26.6) and Roberts (26.0). Patterson has eight career kick-return touchdowns, tied with **JOSH CRIBBS** (eight) and **LEON WASHINGTON** (eight) for the most in NFL history.

Having a productive, reliable kicker is as important as ever in the NFL, as close games are a fixture. This was evident during the postseason last year, as each of the final seven playoff games saw game-winning scores in the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime, five of which were field goals.

Cincinnati rookie kicker **EVAN MCPHERSON** converted all 14 of his field goal attempts during the postseason, tying Adam Vinatieri (14 made field goals during the 2006 postseason) for the most-ever in a single playoff run. He sent the Bengals to the AFC Championship game with a 52-yard field goal as time expired at Tennessee and sent Cincinnati to the Super Bowl with 31-yard field goal in overtime at Kansas City.

Across the league, kickers made 874 of 1,027 (85.1 percent) of their field goal attempts last season, the most made field goals in a season and second-highest single-season percentage in league history.

Among kickers who appeared in at least 10 games during the 2021 season, Baltimore's **JUSTIN TUCKER** converted the highest percentage of his field goal attempts [94.6 percent (35 of 37)], including a game-winning 66-yard field goal as time expired in Week 3, the longest made field goal in NFL history. Los Angeles Rams kicker **MATT GAY**, who kicked game-winning field goals in the final two minutes of both the Divisional Playoffs and NFC Championship, ranked second at 94.1 percent (32 of 34).

Las Vegas' **DANIEL CARLSON** made an NFL-best 40 field goals and became the third kicker ever to make at least 40 field goals in a single season, joining David Akers (44 made field goals in 2011) and Neil Rackers (40 in 2005). Carlson also converted all five of his field goal attempts in overtime during the 2021 season, the most overtime field goals by a kicker since 1991.

In addition to kickers being historically efficient last season, they were also productive from long range. A total of 120 field goals were converted from at least 50 yards, the most in a single season in NFL history.

McPherson led the NFL with nine made field goals of at least 50 yards, the second-most all-time by a rookie kicker, trailing only Blair Walsh in 2012 (10 50-yard field goals).

Arizona's **MATT PRATER** has 66 career made field goals of at least 50 yards, including seven last season, the most in NFL history, while Tucker ranks fourth all-time with 48. Tucker has eight career games with multiple 50-yard field goals, the most in league annals.

Nine undrafted players were selected to the 2022 Pro Bowl last season, including defensive back **J.C. JACKSON** and linebacker **SHAOUIL BARRETT**.

Among undrafted players since 1967, Jackson, who signed with the Los Angeles Chargers this offseason, became the first defensive back to record at least eight interceptions in consecutive seasons and tied **EVERSON WALLS** (25 interceptions) for the most interceptions by an undrafted player in his first four seasons in the commondraft era.

Barrett registered 10 sacks last season and is one of five undrafted players since 2000 to register at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons, joining **JAMES HARRISON** (five from 2007-11), **CAMERON WAKE** (five consecutive seasons from 2010-14), **MARIO ADDISON** (four from 2016-19) and **CHRIS CLEMONS** (three from 2010-12).

They may not come from big-time schools in major NCAA conferences, but their NFL contributions cannot go unnoticed. Productive players from small schools are proof-positive of the old adage, "If you can play, the NFL will find you."

"I tell all these guys when I talk to them, whether they are playing for some big school or some small school, I don't care where you came from," says Tennessee general manager **JON ROBINSON**. "If you can play football, if you can buy into our philosophy, our style of football, then you can play for the Tennessee Titans."

Possibly no player demonstrates the potential worth of small-school players more than Indianapolis linebacker **SHAQUILLE LEONARD**. A product of South Carolina State, a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, Leonard has recorded 538 tackles since entering the NFL in 2018, the second-most by any player during that span. A three-time Pro Bowl selection, Leonard is also the only player with at least 15 sacks (15) and 10 interceptions (11) since 2018.

Los Angeles Rams wide receiver **COOPER KUPP**, a third-round pick (69th overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft of out Eastern Washington, became the fourth player since 1970 to win the receiving triple crown, leading the league in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and touchdown receptions (16). His 1,947 receiving yards were the second-most in a single season all-time behind Pro Football Hall of Famer **CALVIN JOHNSON** (1,964 receiving yards in 2012).

The NFL is a family game for players, coaches and fans. Not only can they all share the experience, but brothers also can share the field and sidelines.

The 2022 NFL Draft featured many players that continued NFL family legacies, including running back **JAMES COOK** (brother of Vikings running back Dalvin Cook), running back **BREECE HALL** (cousin of 11-year NFL veteran Roger Craig), tight end/full back **CONNOR HEYWARD** (brother of Steelers defensive tackle Cameron Heyward and son of 11-year NFL veteran Craig Heyward), cornerback **DEREK STINGLEY JR**. (grandson of five-year NFL veteran Darryl Stingley) and wide receiver **CHRISTIAN WATSON** (son of five-year NFL veteran Tim Watson).

The 2021 NFL Draft also saw the continuation of NFL family legacies, with the selections of **JAYCEE HORN** (No. 8 overall, son of 12-year NFL veteran Joe Horn), **PAT SURTAIN II** (No. 9, son of 11-year NFL veteran Patrick Surtain) and **ASANTE SAMUEL JR**. (No. 47, son of 11-year NFL veteran Asante Samuel) in the first two rounds.

Two years ago, Day 2 of the 2020 NFL Draft saw three players join their brothers in the NFL: cornerback **TREVON DIGGS** (No. 51 overall, brother of Buffalo wide receiver Stefon Diggs), defensive end **JULIAN OKWARA** (No. 67, brother of Detroit defensive end Romeo Okwara) and center **MATT HENNESSY** (No. 78, brother of N.Y. Jets long snapper Thomas Hennessy).

During the 2019 NFL Draft, the San Francisco 49ers selected defensive end **NICK BOSA** with the second overall pick, joining his brother, Los Angeles Chargers defensive end **JOEY BOSA**, the No. 3 overall selection in 2016, in the NFL. Along with their father, **JOHN BOSA**, who was a first-round pick of the Dolphins in 1987, the Bosa family became the second family in NFL history to have a father and two sons chosen in the first round of the NFL Draft, joining **ARCHIE MANNING** and sons **ELI** and **PEYTON**.

The 2018 NFL Draft featured the first pair of brothers to be drafted in the first round of the same draft, as Pittsburgh safety **TERRELL EDMUNDS** was selected 28th overall and Buffalo linebacker **TREMAINE EDMUNDS** was selected 16th overall. Terrell and Tremaine's brother, running back **TREY EDMUNDS**, spent the last four seasons (2018-21) as Terrell's teammate in Pittsburgh. Their father, **FERRELL EDMUNDS**, was a two-time Pro Bowl selection at tight end during his seven-year NFL career with Miami and Seattle.

The **ELLISS'** - New Orleans linebacker **KADEN** and Philadelphia linebacker **CHRISTIAN** and defensive tackle **NOAH** - **QUESSENBERRY**s - Buffalo guard **DAVID** and Houston fullback **PAUL** and offensive lineman **SCOTT** - and the **WATT**s - Arizona defensive end **J.J.** and Pittsburgh fullback **DEREK** and linebacker **T.J.** - are the only other sets of three brothers currently in the league.

The Watt brothers enter this season with 174 combined sacks (J.J. - 102, T.J. - 72), which ranks as the most combined sacks among brothers or father-son duos since 1982, where each player recorded at least one sack.

STRENGTHENING THE PIPELINE



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As part of its ongoing commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, the NFL offers innovative career development programs aimed to inspire, engage, and connect women with careers in football. Hosting these events is part of the League's overall effort to develop a pipeline of qualified women for football operations positions and provides women with critical knowledge, tools and resources to pursue careers in football.

As part of this outreach, the NFL created the NFL Women's Forum. The Forum educates and connects female candidates working in football operations. Participants interact with NFL club owners, general managers, head coaches and club executives in the NFL and college football programs.



Prior to the Forum's inception in 2017, there had been one full-time female coach and one female coaching internship. In its first six years, the Forum has resulted in 229 opportunities for women to work in football operations across the professional, collegiate, and high school levels.

Among the participants of the program, there were many "firsts" including the NFL's first Black full-time female coach (Jennifer King - Washington Football Team) and scout (Salli Clavelle - San Francisco 49ers), as well as NCAA college football's first Division 1 football coach (Callie Brownson - Dartmouth College, now Chief of Staff to head coach Kevin Stefanski for the Cleveland Browns since the 2020 season) and positional coach (Heather Marini - Brown University). Additionally, Lo Locust and Maral Javadifar were both members of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Super Bowl LV champion coaching staff.

During the 2022 offseason, the New York Giants hired their first female coach who was a 2017 Women's Forum participant, Angela Baker as their offensive assistant. Seven Women's Forum participants also landed Bill Walsh coaching fellowships during offseason programming and training camp this year.

The 2022 Women's Forum took place virtually again this year and invited 40 women who hold roles in college and high school football programs were selected to participate in the Forum. This year's participants learned and networked with NFL coaches, general managers and club owners. In addition to placements across the NFL in previous years, several NFL clubs have hired women in coaching and/or personnel roles. The NFL has also worked with several NCAA programs and head coaches who have learned about these efforts and have committed to interviewing more women for openings on their staff.

While the NFL is encouraged by the progress, it is dedicated to further advancement and the normalization of women on the sidelines.



Commissioner Roger Goodell and Jane Skinner Goodell opened this year's Forum with NFL Network's MJ Acosta Ruiz who hosted a discussion with the Falcons, Bills, Browns, Rams, Giants, Buccaneers and Commanders to kick off the opening virtual panel of the 2022 Women's Forum.

In 2015, Jen Welter became the first female coaching intern in the NFL, working with the Arizona Cardinals' linebackers during training camp and preseason. The next year, Kathryn Smith became the first female to be hired full-time by an NFL club, joining the Buffalo Bills as a quality control coach.

Since 2017 and the launch of the NFL Women's Forum, women have earned 38 coaching opportunities with NFL clubs.

NFL HOSTS THE ANNUAL OZZIE NEWSOME GENERAL MANAGER FORUM AND THE OUARTERBACK COACHING SUMMIT

In partnership with the Black College Football Hall of Fame, the NFL held the second annual **OZZIE NEWSOME GENERAL MANAGER FORUM** and the fifth annual **QUARTERBACK COACHING SUMMIT**. From June 21-23, front office personnel along with coaches from the NFL and NCAA took part in the programs at the NFL Los Angeles office and virtually to experience professional development and networking opportunities with NFL club executives.

"The Ozzie Newsome General Manager Forum and Quarterback Coaching Summit are part of our ongoing efforts to break mobility barriers, establish a cultural norm of opportunity for all, and a steadfast commitment to developing a diverse and inclusive workforce," said NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations **TROY VINCENT, SR**. "With the in-person engagement participants will be exposed to the experienced coach and seasoned football personnel. They will have the opportunity to gain insight from these leaders in the football community."

This year, participants learned best practices from NFL coaches and front office executives. The Forum provided a platform to help prepare, educate, and identify excellent minority candidates. Additionally, it featured a variety of sessions including how to build a coaching staff, position coach roles, analytics and best practices for interview sessions.

"We want to continue to create opportunities for some of the best and brightest football minds around the country to display their knowledge to NFL club leadership and media," said Black College Football Hall of Fame Co-Founder **DOUG WILLIAMS**. "There are many quality diverse coaching candidates and front office executives that deserve to be considered for open positions in the league."

BILL WALSH DIVERSITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP

Established in 1987, the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship provides annual NFL coaching experience to outstanding coaches from diverse backgrounds. The program, which was named after the man who conceived the idea - late Pro Football Hall of Fame head coach Bill Walsh - exposes talented coaches from other levels of football and NFL Legends to the methods and philosophies of NFL coaching staffs. Walsh introduced the concept to the league in 1987 when he brought a group of minority coaches into his San Francisco 49ers' training camp.

The fellowship was designed as a vocational tool to increase the number of full-time NFL minority coaches within the League. There are currently 170 coaches participating in the 2022 fellowship from 31 teams across the League; of this number, eight fellows are women.

The Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship is just one NFL program aimed at developing a diverse pipeline for club personnel.



The Nunn-Wooten Scouting Fellowship has served to expose former NFL players, former football student-athletes, and college recruiting and personnel staff members to careers in professional scouting since 2015. Named after longtime NFL executives Bill Nunn and John Wooten, the fellowship provides participants rare access to an NFL front office, giving them an on-site, inside look at the skills needed for a career in NFL scouting. There are currently 26 fellows participating in the 2022 fellowship from 16 teams across the League, five of which are female.





Since the inception of these programs, all 32 NFL clubs have helped tutor more than 2,000 minority coaches through the years and now participate during offseason workout programs, minicamps and training camp.

In addition to the annual in-person fellowships, virtual programs were established in 2020 by Football Operations and continued as an additional developmental opportunity for current fellows of both programs. These virtual sessions, hosted by coaches and personnel executives at clubs, focused on advancement and mentorship, providing an opportunity for minority coaches and scouts to further their skillset, enhance their knowledge of the game, and engage with other colleagues around the league.

Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin, who at the time was the youngest head coach (36) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when he led Pittsburgh to a victory in Super Bowl XLIII, completed a Bill Walsh fellowship with the Cleveland Browns in the summer of 2000 while the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati.

Washington Commanders head coach Ron Rivera understands the value of the program and serves on the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship Advisory Council. The council is comprised of club presidents, general managers, head coaches and assistant coaches, who focus on developing a pipeline of diverse coaches, including former NFL players pursuing opportunities in the coaching profession.

"The Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship is essential in creating opportunities," said Rivera. "You can see the benefits of the fellowship program on virtually every coaching staff in the league and the education provided through the program has been invaluable in the development of many young coaches who may not have received exposure to the NFL without it."

For the past 35 years, The Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship proves to be a strong pipeline for diverse talent with a rich legacy of success stories.

This past March, the National Football League (NFL) announced the creation of the NFL Diversity Advisory Committee, following its pledge last month to retain outside experts to review the league's diversity policies and practices. The six-member committee will lend its expert, external perspective on industry best practices and will evaluate league and club diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) strategies and initiatives, including all hiring processes, policies and procedures, with a primary focus on senior-level coach and front office personnel positions.

After completing this evaluation, the committee will provide comprehensive recommendations to the league office and club ownership for consideration.

Comprising top experts from the academic, legal, DEI, football and corporate worlds, the committee's membership, which will convene initially in the coming weeks, is as follows:

"We've worked for years and made progress in many areas to ensure that staff and leaders in our office and at our clubs reflect the racial and gender makeup of America, but we have more work to do, particularly at the head coach and front-office level," said NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell. "This esteemed group's work will help us build a more inclusive league. We look forward to their recommendations - and to continuing our conversations with other outside experts, community and civil rights leaders, Fritz Pollard Alliance and current and former players and coaches - to make our efforts and those of the clubs more effective so that real and tangible results will be achieved."

"I am pleased to have the opportunity to work with the NFL, a vitally important organization in the world of sports and in American culture, on such critical matters like DEI and its policies and practices related to hiring and retention," said Pamela Carlton. "The other committee members and I look forward to completing a rigorous, independent analysis of how the NFL and its clubs approach diversity and inclusion to ensure that minority candidates have equitable opportunities at the highest levels."

MINORITY OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Beginning with the 2022 season, each Club will hire a diverse person (female or a member of an ethnic or racial minority) as an "Offensive Assistant." This person is to have a minimum of three (3) years of collegiate or professional coaching experience. The Offensive Assistant shall receive a one-year contract with salary and benefits to be determined by the employer Club.

SIXTH ANNUAL CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM FOR HBCU STUDENTS

Career development program for Historically Black Colleges and Universities hosted virtually this past season

More than 170 students from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) were selected to attend the 2021 NFL HBCU Careers in Football Forum. The annual forum, which was held virtually this year, took place on December 8th.

Since 2016, the Forum has introduced more than **300** students and entry-level athletic department administrators to career opportunities in professional football. Each year, the Forum invites participants to hear from sports industry professionals and creates networking opportunities for students to learn more about their desired career path. This year, attendees will represent **43** institutions.

The event opened with a panel discussion entitled "Business Operations Inside the League Office" featuring Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of NFL Media, **Hans Schroeder**, Senior Vice President and General Manager of NFL Media, **Dave Jurenka**, NFL Vice President of New Business Development, **Nana-Yaw Asamoah**, and NFL Senior Vice President of Social Responsibility, **Anna Isaacson**. The panelists shared insights on their roles and responsibilities leading the NFL's business operations at the NFL league office.

Additionally, attendees engaged with NFL league office and club executives, featuring Detroit Lions Executive Vice President and General Manager, **Brad Holmes**, Arizona Cardinals Chief People Officer, **Shaun Mayo**, Kansas City Chiefs Executive Vice President of Communications, **Ted Crews**, and NFL Senior Vice President of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion **Jonathan Beane**. Covering football administration and careers found across the sports industry, other event panelists included representatives from ESPN, Twitter, House of Athlete, the NCAA, and others from the collegiate athletic offices. The forum concluded with breakout sessions where attendees can engage with personnel in smaller settings in an open forum. Participants received advice from personnel on the ins and outs of their fields and guidance on career mobility.

Since the program's inception, **14** students from the Forum have gone on to secure internships or full-time opportunities with the NFL, NFL clubs, colleges and universities, and other sports entities.

"The HBCU Careers in Football Forum provides an unmatched level of access to professional development advice and connection to industry professionals across multiple facets of the world of sports," said **Micah Holmes**, NFL Junior Rotational Program participant. "Being able to continue my work with the Football Operations team at the Careers in Football Forum allowed me to gain hands-on experience running larger events, but also see first-hand how important events like these are to HBCU students who may not traditionally have this level of access to the NFL and representatives of other large sports entities. As a member of the Junior Rotational Program and an HBCU Alum (Morehouse College), I can attest to the fact that the networking opportunities, and encouragement from professionals at the Forum helped propel my career forward and a mandatory experience for HBCU students looking to make their mark in the sports world in the future."

During the 2020 season, the league established an online talent community to serve as a source of diverse talent for current and future career opportunities accessible by the league office and NFL clubs. Through the platform, HBCU students can submit an expression of interest which outlines their professional experience, career goals and specific interest in working in professional football. Individuals can also interact with an NFL Talent Specialist to learn about league news, careers, networking opportunities and recruitment events after the Forum.

The Careers in Football Forum is just one component of a larger initiative to increase career development opportunities for students and athletic administrators from HBCUs.

Throughout the 98-year storied history of the East-West Shrine Bowl, the legendary game has produced players that have combined for more than 500 NFL Pro Bowl appearances. The 2023 game will mark the second time that both the Shrine Bowl and Pro Bowl align during the same week. The Shrine Bowl is a part of Pro Bowl week in order to strengthen the relationship between the two events. It was previously played in St. Petersburg, Florida, for the past 10 years.

As the official operating partner of NFL FLAG, RCX Sports is a proactive leader in building awareness and promoting participation in women's flag football across the nation. With the grant the NJCAA women's flag football programs have exclusive access to different invitational events lead by RXC.

"For so many young girls in flag football, the idea of playing the game they love in college has seemed like an impossible dream,"

IZELL REESE, executive director of NFL FLAG and general manager of RCX, said. "RCX and NFL FLAG have been working hard to make that dream a reality and we're proud to work with the NJCAA to help create a viable path for female athletes to potentially earn a scholarship to compete at the collegiate level and earn a degree."

NJCAA women's flag football competition has been active at institutions since spring 2022. NFL FLAG and RCX will continue to assist the NJCAA women's flag football committee as it works with participating NJCAA institutions, providing resources and rulings as they relate to the sport's success.

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LEAGUE WILL PLAY FIVE INTERNATIONAL GAMES IN 2022

The National Football League announced that five international games will be played in 2022. The New Orleans Saints and Minnesota Vikings will each play in the UK for the third time. Both teams have won on two previous occasions in the UK and will make their debut at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium on Sunday, October 2. The following Sunday, October 9, the Green Bay Packers will face the New York Giants in their first international trip, becoming the 32nd NFL team to play in London since 2007. The Giants will play in the UK for the third time, having won both the inaugural London game at Wembley Stadium in 2007 and the first game played at Twickenham Stadium in 2016. This will be their first game at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium.

On Sunday, October 30, the Jacksonville Jaguars, who played at Tottenham last season, return to Wembley for the first time since 2019, having played there for seven straight seasons from 2013-19. They will face the Denver Broncos who are making their first trip to the UK since they last played at Wembley in 2010.

The reigning NFC South champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers, led by quarterback Tom Brady, will face the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday, November 13, in the first-ever NFL regular-season game in Germany, played at Allianz Arena - Home of FC Bayern Munich.

The NFL will return to Mexico City on November 21 with Monday Night Football. Estadio Azteca will host a matchup between NFC West rivals San Francisco 49ers and Arizona Cardinals in a rematch of the NFL's first regular-season game played outside the United States. In 2005, the teams played at Estadio Azteca with 103,467 fans in attendance, the eighth-largest crowd in NFL history.

"We are very excited to be staging five games outside the United States in 2022 and thank the clubs for their continued commitment to growing the sport internationally," said **PETER O'REILLY**, NFL Executive Vice President, Club Business and League Events. "Our fans in Germany, Mexico and the UK can look forward to seeing some of the most iconic names and biggest stars in the League and enjoying an incredible series of events."

FIRST EVER REGULAR SEASON GAME IN GERMANY TO BE HOSTED IN MUNICH

Following an intense application process and an enhanced season structure, the National Football League announced that Munich, will be hosting the first regular season game ever in Germany during the 2022 season. Including the first game, Allianz Arena - home of FC Bayern Munich' was chosen as the venue to host two of the four international games in Germany over the next four years. Frankfurt Stadium will host the other two of the four games.

"We are very pleased to welcome Munich and Frankfurt to the NFL family and are excited to reward our fans in Germany for their passion by bringing them the spectacle of regular-season NFL football," said NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell. "We look forward to staging our first game in Germany at FC Bayern Munich's fantastic stadium later this year and to exploring areas of broader collaboration with the Bundesliga."

The partnerships between the NFL and Munich and Frankfurt include a joint commitment to deliver fan engagements activities, community participation programs and other NFL initiatives.



NFL HOSTS FIRST OFFICIAL EVENTS IN AFRICA

On June 21, 2022, the NFL hosted its first official events in Africa. The scheduled events involved a week of activities including a talent identification camp, a fan event and a flag football clinic. In these events the league highlighted the contribution of its 100+ players with African decent (born in Africa or first generation born in the U.S.), while introducing the sport to the next generation of fans across the continent. Many current NFL players took part on-site, including Seattle Seahawks linebacker Uchenna Nwosu (Nigeria), Houston Texans defensive lineman Ogbonnia Okoronkwo (Nigeria), Cleveland Browns linebacker Jeremiah Owusu-Koramoah (Ghana), and Indianapolis Colts defensive end Kwity Paye (Liberia), as well as NFL Legends Mathias Kiwanuka (Uganda), Roman Oben (Cameroon), and Osi Umenyiora (Nigeria).

The talent identification camp brought in 49 athletes from across Africa. The top prospects progressed to various exit pathways (International Player Pathway Program, NFL Academy, International Combine). Of the 49 athletes, 11 participants were invited to the International Combine, and six participants identified for the NFL Academy. "This is a truly remarkable initiative," said Umenyiora. "This camp is not only giving opportunities to great African athletes, it is also highlighting the incredible African athletes already in the NFL. The positive impact of this cannot be overstated."

The NFL Fan Zone gave fans the opportunity to interact with the sport by learning about the history of the game, engaging with NFL players and putting their skills to the test via combine-style activities. There were almost 2000 attendees including the Ghanian Vice President, the Deputy Minister of Youth & Sports and the Chief Director (Ministry of Sports), and over 15 media outlets present.

100 kids from 10 schools participated in the flag football event. The NFL, alongside the Philadelphia Eagles, hosted the NFL Flag experience days for both teachers and students to launch NFL Flag-In-Schools in Accra. The Activities included on-field drills, individual and small group coaching, player question and answer sessions and combine-style activities.

After the successful week of NFL Africa, the vision for the program is the first NFL Academy in Asia-Pacific Region around 2024.

Among the prospects eligible for the 2022 NFL Draft, many had international ties, including:

GEORGE KARLAFTIS, a defensive end from Purdue who was born in Athens, Greece, was selected in the first round (No. 30 overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs. He moved to Indiana with his mother and two siblings in 2014 and began playing football in the eighth grade.

The second round of the 2022 NFL Draft saw a run on internationally born players selected. **ARNOLD EBIKETIE**, a native of Yaoundé, Cameroon who moved to Maryland with his family when he was 12 and began playing football as a sophomore in high school, was selected No. 38 overall by the Atlanta Falcons.



JOHN METCHIE III was also selected in the second round (No. 44 overall) by the Houston Texans. Originally born in Taiwan, the Alabama wide receiver has lived internationally for a large portion of his life. His family moved to Ghana when he was young before emigrating to Canada when he was six years old. They then moved from Brampton, Ontario, Canada to Maryland for high school.

DAVID OJABO, a linebacker from the University of Michigan and born in Port Harcourt, Nigeria, was selected with the No. 45 pick by the Baltimore Ravens. His family moved to Aberdeen, Scotland, in 2007 before he came to the United States for high school.

In the third round, the Indianapolis Colts used the No. 77 overall pick to select Central Michigan offensive tackle **BERNHARD RAIMANN**, a native of Steinbrunn, Austria. He moved to Michigan as part of a high school exchange program and previously played American football in Austria before moving to the United States.

Other players with international ties that were selected during the 2022 NFL Draft included Minnesota offensive lineman **DANIEL FAALELE**, a native of Melbourne, Australia, who was chosen in the fourth round by the Ravens, and Penn State linebacker **JESSE LUKETA**, a native of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, who was selected in the seventh round by the Arizona Cardinals.

The International Player Pathway Program was instituted in 2017 and aims to provide international athletes the chance to compete at the NFL level, improve their skills and ultimately compete for a spot on an NFL roster. This season, the AFC South was chosen to participate in the International Player Pathway Program in a random draw. It becomes the sixth division to participate in the program.



This year, three players that were discovered through The

Uprise - which is a football program established in Nigeria by NFL Legend Osi Umenyiora and former Nigerian pro basketball player Ejike Ugboajaand - went on to participate in the International Combine and IPP Pro Day. The three players have since signed with NFL teams - Chigbo Roy Mbaeteka (New York Giants), Haggai Chisom Ndubuisi, (Arizona Cardinals), and Kehinde Hassan Oginni (Kansas City Chiefs).

"The IPP program is instrumental in the discovery and development of international players, and we are excited the quality of players continues to increase each year," said Damani Leech, former NFL Chief Operating Officer of International and current Denver Broncos President. "We've seen great momentum in the program with Roy and Haggai having already signed with teams this year. They, along with the players allocated to teams through the program, will now have the chance to further develop their skills in an NFL environment. Teams are looking forward to welcoming the players to their camps this summer."

The 2022 players are: MARCEL DABO (Indianapolis Colts), a defensive back from Germany who played for the European Football League. He was the league's defensive rookie of the year. ADEDAYO ODELEYE (Houston Texans), a defensive lineman born in Nigeria and raised in the UK since age nine. He spent that last season in the European football league after playing at Loughborough University; THOMAS ODUKOYA (Tennessee Titans), a tight end from the Netherlands who played college football at East Michigan University; and AYO OYELOLA (Jacksonville Jaguars) a defensive back who played football at the University of Nottingham where he graduated in 2020 and spent last season with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League.

It's been three years since the NFL Academy opened its doors in London. The Academy, the first of its kind outside of the US, was initially based at Barnet and Southgate College in North London and gives student athletes aged 16-18 the opportunity to experience a high school-type program, combining education and life skills with intensive training in the sport under full-time professional coaches.

During the first year, 90 students were selected as the inaugural intake, since then a total 175 players have been part of the Academy. The program has seen its popularity soar in the UK - with more than 4,000 registering their interest in the Academy and more than 1,300 people having applied to join from the UK, Europe and around the world.

Here's a look at some of the key highlights from the first three years:

SCHOLARSHIP OFFERS

So far there have been 39 NCAA Division 1 scholarship offers to NFL Academy students, including offers from Alabama, Auburn, Arkansas State, Akron, Brown, Ole Miss, Michigan State, Florida State, Notre Dame and West Kentucky, with students committing to Arkansas State, University of Ottawa in Canada and Tecnológico de Monterrey in Mexico. There were also successes on home soil with offers from UK universities such as Nottingham, where five students currently have offers.

A great example of the success so far is Seydou Traore, who started with the NFL Academy in 2019 and this autumn will attend Arkansas State on a football scholarship:

"The game of football has completely changed my life," said Traore. "From BAFA (British American Football Association) to the NFL Academy in London, high school football in Florida and now to Division 1 FBS football. This sport has given me a career plan and



something I loved and had a real passion for. It all started playing American football in south London as a youth having been given the opportunity to watch live NFL games in London, which was a great experience. I have had the opportunity to reach this stage because of the growth of football in the UK, with great coaches and mentors to help me along my path."

ROGER GOODELL VISITS THE NFL ACADEMY

During the 2019 NFL London Games in October, NFL Academy students were able to spend time learning from the legends of the game, taking part in practice sessions with the Los Angeles Rams and Jacksonville Jaguars. The students even had a special training session with NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell.

In November 2019, the NFL Academy opened a new state of the art facility where an old drama hall was changed into a fully functioning NFL gym.

And when it came to its opening ceremony, only an NFL legend would do. Pro Football Hall of Fame wide receiver and NFL Academy ambassador Jerry Rice travelled from the US to give the Academy team a training session they would never forget.

"This is an amazing Academy, just being here feels amazing," said **JERRY RICE**. "The NFL is doing a fantastic job of growing the game. We didn't have these kinds of facilities when I was learning the game. The students here have everything they need to be successful in life. The NFL Academy is about the sport, the education and the character and those things are very important. It's important to get your education first and everything that follows is the icing on the cake."



UK NFL STARS GIVE THEIR BACKING

In 2019, Rice wasn't the only NFL player to take an interest in the NFL Academy. UK NFL players Efe Obada, Christian Wade and Jamie Gillan all took time out of their busy schedules to train with the players and have spoken of their excitement for the future of the Academy.

"As someone that wishes they had the opportunity to take part in the NFL Academy, it's amazing," said OBADA. "It's an amazing experience that's going to put you in touch with great coaches and people who can help you succeed. You'll watch your life change the way the game has changed mine. I really want everyone to follow these guys and follow their stories because they are the future. I want to increase the awareness of the sport in the UK because it's changed my life and I just want it to change lives for everyone else."



NFL ACADEMY TACKLES PRO BOWL 2020

In January 2020, the NFL Academy students experienced a once-in-a-lifetime trip to the NFL Pro Bowl, where the students got to take part in a Skills Showcase and met up with the NFL all-stars.



TRAINING IN A PANDEMIC

As with every sport, in 2020 the NFL Academy was disrupted by the on-going challenges of the pandemic, but it didn't stop the hard work. The academy launched its first ever virtual tryouts to find the next generation of talent. The students were also able to keep up with their training at home and returned to on the field training later in the year.

This year the NFL Academy was able to host its first scrimmages as the students battled against each other with many more scrimmages and formal games planned throughout 2021 and beyond.

NFL ACADEMY RELOCATES TO LOUGHBOROUGH

The National Football League's UK-based NFL Academy will relocate to Loughborough College

and Loughborough University for the start of the 2022-23 academic year. It is currently based at Barnet and Southgate College in London. From September 2022, all football and academic operations will move to Loughborough, where a partnership between the College and the University will provide an opportunity for young players to become part of a world-renowned centre of sporting excellence.

Throughout the partnership, the College will provide high-quality coaching, education, accommodation and pastoral support to its cohort of players, while the University will provide performance staff and world-class facilities to focus on the physical development of students. Both Loughborough College and Loughborough University have a proven track record of developing hundreds of elite level athletes including Olympic and Paralympic champions.

"Barnet and Southgate College has been an excellent partner in getting the Academy established, and we are now very excited about the opportunity to further develop both the academic and athletic offering in a move to Loughborough," said Brett Gosper, NFL Head of Europe and UK. "Operating at an elite athletic performance centre with a global reputation, combined with the excellent classroom offering, gives the students the greatest chance of future achievement in all fields. It will allow us to achieve our aim of creating life-changing opportunities for young people through the sport of American football."

Our game is at its best when we have full, vibrant and energetic stadiums, and as we welcomed fans back to full stadiums, we also recognize the responsibility to use our stadiums as civic centers and community pillars both on game day and beyond. We are taking steps to make sure our stadiums are more inclusive than ever before, from sensory inclusion rooms to private nursing areas and a host of other enhancements. And we are proud of the role our stadiums served during the past two seasons as voting sites, vaccination centers and beyond.

Our communities continue to experience challenges old and new, and so this year we also focused on critical topics like closing the digital divide through grant funding and programs aimed at reducing barriers to digital access, improving digital literacy, and creating more equitable education outcomes. And we worked to fight food insecurities, delivering and prepping meals to thousands of families. Virtual and in-person events enabled us to get back on the ground in communities to continue the push for positive change off the field.

As we do every year, we used our major events to leave a community legacy. We restored green spaces and watched NFL Flag Champions take center stage at Pro Bowl. We also continue to recognize the absolute best in our players, who exemplify the values and commitment that stands at the heart of our game, highlighted by the 32 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year nominees and winner, Andrew Whitworth. Since the start of his career, Andrew has dedicated himself to making a lasting impact in his communities and his teams. During his five seasons in Los Angeles, he has dedicated his time and resources to social justice efforts that are working to tackle food insecurity, homelessness, and education inequities. These are just a few examples of an extensive philanthropic legacy that Andrew has created. He is incredibly deserving of this prestigious award and we are proud he is the 2021 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year.

These examples are just the beginning. It is our responsibility to use the power of the NFL platform to continue to push for societal change. The work is never done, and we must always strive to be better. For the 13th consecutive year, the NFL and American Cancer Society (ACS) worked together to support the fight against cancer through Crucial Catch: Intercept Cancer.

THE NFL'S CRUCIAL CATCH MISSION IS TO FIGHT CANCER THROUGH EARLY DETECTION AND RISK REDUCTION.

The League, its clubs and players, the **NFL Player Association** and the American Cancer Society are committed to providing individuals with the tools they need to help them better understand early detection and ways to reduce their cancer risk. Each year, every NFL team raises awareness during their Crucial Catch game, which features on-field and in-stadium Crucial Catch elements. Crucial Catch games also present a special opportunity to honor cancer survivors and those currently battling cancer.









The COVID-19 pandemic has had a devastating impact on screening. At the height of it, some cancer screenings declined by 90%. Through Crucial Catch, the NFL and ACS have allocated resources dedicated to safely restarting cancer screenings in communities with the most need. For many forms of cancer (breast, cervical, colorectal and prostate), the five-year survival rate is above 90% when detected early before it has a chance to spread.

This year, New Era and Nike designed Crucial Catch gear that highlighted the NFL's commitment to drawing awareness to and supporting multiple cancer prevention efforts. Fans could purchase NFL-licensed Crucial Catch apparel on **NFLShop.com** and game-worn merchandise was auctioned on **nfl.com/auction**.

Additional partners in this year's Crucial Catch initiative included mobile games platform **Skillz**, **Fan Creations** and **Fathead**.

CHANGE GRANTS

Since 2012, the NFL has funded ACS' Community Health Advocates Implementation Nationwide Grants for Empowerment and Equity (CHANGE) grants, which have contributed to over 600,000 screenings in underserved communities and reached more than 1,100,000 individuals with education, screening reminders and patient navigation, bringing these life-saving messages and screening services to those who need them most.




YOUTH CRUCIAL CATCH

Each season, youth football teams from across the country participate in Youth Crucial Catch to host their own Crucial Catch football games to raise both awareness for multiple cancers and money for ACS. At the end of the season, the youth team with the most funds raised is named the youth team champion. This season, several NFL players—including Pittsburgh Steelers rookie running back NAJEE HARRIS conducted local and national meet and greets with the youth team winners. During Pro Bowl week in Las Vegas, American Youth Football's top 8th grade football players competed in an All-Star game at **Bishop Gorman High School** to support the initiative. Arizona Cardinals running back JONATHAN WARD and Detroit Lions offensive tackle TYRELL CROSBY served as honorary assistant coaches, and the players showcased their skills on the field to raise awareness for the fight against cancer.



NFL players reveal their passions beyond the game and wear their hearts on their feet through **My Cause My Cleats**. Players have the opportunity to pick a cause that is important to them and represent their chosen organization on custom designed cleats to wear during Week 13.

This year's causes included topics such as tackling social injustice, supporting youth education, addressing mental health, raising awareness for disability research, and empowering veterans. NFL Network also aired features that highlighted the charitable efforts of players and their chosen initiatives.

Following Week 13 games, hundreds of players donated their cleats through **NFL Auction**, where 100% of funds raised are donated to the charities they select. Since its inception, My Cause My Cleats has raised more than \$1 million through NFL Auction to support player causes.

Considered the League's most prestigious honor, the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award Presented by Nationwide recognizes an NFL player for outstanding community service activities off the field, as well as excellence on the field. First established in 1970, the national award was renamed in 1999 after the late Hall of Fame Chicago Bears running back WALTER PAYTON.

Representing the best of the NFL's commitment to philanthropy and community impact, each team selects their own Man of the Year who is then eligible to win the national award. For the fourth year in a row, all team winners were highlighted as nominees and recognized for their important work during the week leading up to **Super Bowl LVI**.

Each of the 31 runner-up nominees received up to a \$40,000 donation in their name to their charity of choice, with the winner of the 2021 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award receiving a \$250,000 donation to the charity of their choice. All donations were courtesy of the NFL Foundation and Nationwide.

The nominees support many different causes, including social justice work, supporting veterans, fighting homelessness and more.







2021 WALTER PAYTON NFL MAN OF THE YEAR

Los Angeles Rams tackle **ANDREW WHITWORTH** was named the **2021 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Presented by Nationwide** for his commitment to making a lasting impact in his communities and for his teams, dedicating his time and resources to social justice efforts that work to tackle food insecurity, homelessness and education inequities.

This marked the fourth time Whitworth was nominated for the award over his 16-year NFL career. He remains a core pillar of a Rams offense, becoming the first 40-year-old offensive lineman to start an NFL game in nearly two decades. A four-time Pro-Bowler and two-time All-Pro, Whitworth has over 239 career games with 235 starts.

Whitworth's work addresses the often-unseen issues that continue to plague underserved communities in Los Angeles and beyond. At the beginning of the 2021 season, Andrew launched his **Big Whit for LA Families** program, donating \$20,000 after each home game to repair homes in his home state of Louisiana and move Angelenos facing housing insecurity into affordable homes. In Los Angeles, Andrew works with nonprofits to help individuals pay for rent and groceries, support down payments and furnish homes.

Every year, Andrew actively recruits teammates to join him and Make-A-Wish to help grant wishes for children battling life-threatening illnesses. Over the past three years, he has been a significant catalyst in raising more than \$875,000 to grant wishes. For the holidays, Andrew and his family purchased wish list items for 53 families living in crisis motels and shelters, buying gifts for nearly 100 children and providing \$500 local grocery store gift cards and packaged holiday meals for the families.

From 2017-2019, Whitworth purchased 50 tickets for each Rams home game and donated them to local charities and schools. During the 2021 season, he continued this tradition and purchased game tickets for community members who otherwise might not have had an opportunity to experience the thrill of an NFL game at **SoFi Stadium**.

In the wake of civil unrest that struck the nation following the death of **GEORGE FLOYD**, Whitworth agreed to match all proceeds raised through his team's **Social Justice Fund** throughout the 2020 season, resulting in a \$215,000 personal donation.

In March 2020, Whitworth made a \$250,000 donation to the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank to kick off the team's virtual Te'LA'thon for Los Angeles and support COVID-19 response efforts. His contribution financed a total of one million meals that were distributed to Angelenos in need. He has also funded STEAM Labs at elementary and middle schools to help close the technology gap for low-income students and provide them opportunities to achieve upward mobility.

Aside from his efforts in Los Angeles, Whitworth was also a community steward in Cincinnati during his time with the Bengals. Before joining the Rams, Andrew started The Big Whit 77 Foundation, which impacts the lives of youth and families in his home state of Louisiana. One of the foundation's programs, Whit's Warriors, offers financial assistance to high school seniors in Louisiana, having awarded \$400,000 in scholarships and school supplies.

Whitworth received a donation of \$250,000 to go to a charity of his choice, courtesy of the NFL Foundation and Nationwide.

To complement the physical award, the NFL, in collaboration with Panini America, launched the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Trading Card NFTs, beginning with Walter Payton.

A 1-of-1 trading card was minted and gifted to the Walter and Connie Payton Family Foundation with a parallel base set (500 units) being made available for public auction. The public auction benefited the Walter and Connie Payton Family Foundation. Past and future Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year winners have the option to participate in this NFT program with all proceeds of each initial sale going to the player's selected foundation.





NFL Inspire Change is the League's social justice platform, open to all teams and players. It includes an acknowledgment of the ways that systemic racism contributes to barriers to opportunity. Inspire Change work encompasses programs and initiatives in four key areas: Education, Economic Advancement, Police-Community Relations and Criminal Justice Reform.

For the first time during the NFL regular season, all teams hosted Inspire Change games with in-stadium elements and video content during ingame broadcasts, amplifying ongoing social justice work by players, clubs, the League and nonprofit social justice grant partners.

Fans were also able to watch video compilations—both in-stadium and during in-game broadcasts—of players taking part in social justice activities, as well as view Inspire Change grant partner features and public service announcements.





In addition, during Inspire Change games, the NFL worked with New Era and the Players Coalition to offer an Inspire Change knit hat that could be worn during Weeks 17 and 18 by players, coaches and team personnel. The hat featured the messaging "Justice, Opportunity, Equity, Freedom" and was also available for sale with 100% of the League's proceeds donated to Inspire Change grant recipients.

Since 2017, the NFL family has committed more than \$237 million to national grant partners and hundreds of grassroots organizations across the country. This includes more than 1,800 grants provided by the **NFL Foundation** to current NFL players and Legends towards social justice nonprofits of their choice.

These donations are part of the NFL family's larger \$250 million commitment to social justice efforts over 10 years.

For the first time ever, the NFL held a playoff game on **Dr.**Martin Luther King Jr. Day with a matchup between the Los

Angeles Rams and the Arizona Cardinals. The NFL worked
alongside Inspire Change social justice grant partner The

King Center and its CEO, DR. BERNICE KING, to celebrate
Dr. King's life and legacy on-field. Building upon the social
justice in-stadium activations throughout the season,
player helmets featured a circular "MLK" sticker. Helmet
decals also featured the messages "BE LOVE" and "STOP
HATE." The phrase "Be LOVE" is a nod to The King Center's

Be Love movement, which was also incorporated into the
end-zone stencils along with the phrase "End Racism."

During the 2021 season, the Player-Owner Social Justice Working Group, comprised of five team owners and five NFL players, approved renewals of nine national grant partners, as well as four new national grant partners: Year Up, Wall Street Bound, Free Minds Book Club and Writing Workshop and Get Schooled. Grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations that focus on the four Inspire Change pillars.

To help explain the Inspire Change initiative, the NFL launched a content series that highlighted the League's social justice efforts. The **Inspire Change Explainer Essay** examined how the NFL and its players, clubs and partners address social injustice across the country while the **Where the Money Goes** vignette broke down how the social justice funds are allocated.

Also during the season, NFL Media aired a four-part docuseries that featured New Orleans Saints All-Pro and team captain CAM JORDAN and his community partnership with Crescent City Corps, a New Orleans-based nonprofit that equips police officers with leadership development, racial equity and community engagement training so they can work alongside citizens to build a more just, safe and inclusive city.

At the team level, Inspire Change comes to life through club and player community engagement throughout the season. NFL clubs and players support local social justice nonprofits and participate in events, including advocacy for criminal justice reform, financial commitments to assist in closing the digital divide for youth without access to technology, and joint work with local law enforcement to help build trust within the community.

In schools, the League expanded its partnership with digital learning curriculum leader EVERFI on 306, a high school focused African-American History education program. Schools nationwide received access to the 306 curriculum, where students took part in modules including Black Business Titans, the Civil Rights Movement, and Black Contributions to Medicine.





THIS YEAR, SALUTE TO SERVICE CAME TO LIFE IN-STADIUM DURING GAMES IN WEEKS 9-11 AND IN OTHER SPECIAL EVENTS AROUND THE LEAGUE AS FANS AND THE NFL'S 32 CLUBS DEMONSTRATED THEIR GRATITUDE FOR THE SACRIFICES MADE BY OUR MILITARY COMMUNITY.

On-field, this included field stencils, banners, goal post wraps, game balls, helmet decals, and player gear. There was also Salute to Service apparel available for purchase with all league proceeds donated to initiative partners. In addition, fans were able to bid on game-worn jerseys and gear from Salute to Service games to raise money for the NFL's Salute to Service nonprofit partners.

The League also partners with **USAA**, an Official NFL Salute to Service Partner, to work together to honor and recognize service members and veterans with unique experiences around NFL calendar events.



NEW ACTIVATIONS

USO LAKENHEATH

In the United Kingdom, the NFL helped fund the November opening of **USO Lakenheath**, which supports more than 22,000 military personnel stationed in the area. USO Lakenheath provides a place for service members and military families to enjoy a variety of programs and services that help them relax, recharge and connect with family and friends around the world. The center also conducts outreach with the Royal Air Force Station Mildenhall in Suffolk, England, which is home to the U.S. Air Force's 100th Air Refueling Wing.

USA WHEELCHAIR FOOTBALL LEAGUE

In 2019, Move United launched the first ever USA Wheelchair Football League for wounded veterans and other adults with disabilities, with support from an NFL and Bob Woodruff Foundation Salute to Service grant. Move United worked with USA Football and experts in adaptive sports to create the rules and infrastructure for the new wheelchair football league. This season, Move United hosted the first two tournaments for the Wheelchair Football League, with teams competing from Birmingham, Buffalo, Chicago, Cleveland, Kansas City, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Phoenix and Tampa. Many teams also engaged with the local club in their market, wearing team colors and helmets with the club's logo on it.



PARTNER SUPPORT

ROCKET MORTGAGE

With its **Six for Service** program, **Rocket Mortgage** donated \$1,000 toward the fight to end veteran homelessness for every touchdown scored during November's Salute to Service games. During the initiative, Rocket Mortgage donated a total of \$210,000 for the cause.

CROWN ROYAL

Crown Royal partnered with the NFL and the USO around Salute to Service to donate care packages to service members around the world as part of its **Purple Bag Project**, which has packed and provided over one million bags.

Throughout November, **NBC Sports Next** helped generate funds through its **GolfNow** round-up campaign. Anyone who booked tee times on GolfNow or its TeeOff brand during that month was offered the opportunity to round up the total cost of the reservation to an evendollar figure, with all additional contributions going to Salute to Service. A total of \$100,000 was raised for the NFL's Salute to Service partners through this initiative.

TRAGEDY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR SURVIVORS

The NFL partners with **Tragedy Assistance Program For Survivors (TAPS)** to fund programs that support the families of fallen military service members. Many thousands of survivors are able to access youth and mentor programs and services to support all those grieving the loss of a military loved one. Through this partnership, more than 5,500 survivors who are part of TAPS have been able to participate in NFL events and honor their loved one.

WOUNDED WARRIOR PROJECT

The NFL partners with **Wounded Warrior Project*** to provide over 200,000 wounded veterans and family support members access to free programs and resources in mental health, career counseling and long-term rehabilitative care. Since 2011, the NFL has donated more than \$9 million to help injured veterans and their families tackle their next mission in life.

BOB WOODRUFF FOUNDATION

In 2019, the NFL and the **Bob Woodruff Foundation** (**BWF**) established an \$8 million, three-year partnership designed to optimize the positive impact that the NFL and its 32 clubs have on the veteran community by leveraging BWF's national network. To date, BWF has invested nearly \$7.8 million in 62 best-in-class organizations supporting veterans and their families through **NFL-BWF Healthy Lifestyles and Creating Communities** grants. Early in the COVID-19 pandemic, the NFL and BWF also invested \$250,000 in four organizations tackling urgent service coordination and emergency financial assistance, and provided an additional \$334,000 in stimulus funding to 101 local community organizations serving veterans.

Leveraging American football as the cornerstone of the partnership, the USO and NFL honor, empower and connect service members and military families. Through support of USO center expansions, holiday programming and a variety of other events and activations, the NFL helps to deliver sports, entertainment and gaming to troops being called to serve missions around the world. Since 2007, NFL players and coaches have traveled on USO Tours to 26 countries to meet and thank more than 97,000 service members.

Beck, who comes from a military family due to his father's current service in the U.S. Army as a Brigadier General, knows firsthand some of the sacrifices made by our military community. While volunteering at a Salute to Service PLAY 60 Clinic in 2019, Beck learned that kids drove from Fort Carson Army Base in Colorado Springs. Beck's face immediately lit up, as he had played high school football in the area while his dad was stationed at the same base.

MORE THAN 425 MILITARY FAMILIES IMPACTED THROUGH BECK'S STRATEGIC OUTREACH

Despite cancellations, protocols and restrictions, Beck refused to let the pandemic impact his commitment to support the military. In November of 2020, he assembled Salute to Service care packages for military bases across Colorado and helped host a virtual visit with Wounded Warrior Project veterans.

In the 2021 offseason, Beck participated in a virtual visit with Buckley Space Force Base and USO Colorado to celebrate WingMan Week, a program dedicated to strengthening connection, relaxation and the rejuvenation of the fighting spirit. He also partnered with Freedom Service Dogs of America on multiple initiatives, including highlighting the organization on his cleats for **My Cause My Cleats**.





In 2021, the NFL Foundation further expanded its grant programs, offering players matching funds to support a wide range of community projects. This year, the NFL Foundation granted \$500,000 to more than 100 Legends and current players impacting their local communities.

PANDEMIC RECOVERY & SUPPORT

This season, the NFL Foundation announced a \$500,000 donation to Team Rubicon and a \$750,000 donation to the CDC Foundation to help continue the fight to eliminate health disparities and roll out COVID-19 vaccine services to vulnerable communities across the country. Additional pandemic recovery fundraising through Draft-a-Thon brought the total donation to nearly \$2 million to help communities across the country.

The NFL also worked closely with the White House COVID Response Team to announce during Global Citizen's VAX Live: The Concert to Reunite the World show that 50 free tickets to Super Bowl LVI would be provided for fans who shared their story on why they got vaccinated or would soon get vaccinated.

TEAM RUBICON

Team Rubicon pairs the skills and experiences of military veterans with first responders, civilian volunteers and technology solutions, aiming to provide the greatest service and impact possible to those affected by disaster and humanitarian crises. As vaccines became available, the organization shifted its focus to prioritize the delivery of COVID-19 vaccinations to rural and underserved communities.

With its \$500,000 donation from the NFL Foundation, Team Rubicon was able to deliver free, timely and equitable vaccine services through ten vaccination sites in rural, marginalized and vulnerable communities across the country.

CDC FOUNDATION

The **CDC** Foundation is an independent nonprofit created by Congress to mobilize philanthropic and private-sector resources to support health protection work. The COVID-19 pandemic exposed and intensified health inequities facing Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) communities, older and rural Americans, and other marginalized and under-resourced communities.

With its \$750,000 donation from the NFL Foundation, the CDC Foundation bolstered its support of COVID-19 vaccine rollout efforts in underserved areas across the country and in NFL markets. Local health departments and community-based organizations were also able to receive microgrants for under-resourced and at-risk communities.

CHARACTER PLAYBOOK POWERED BY EVERFI

Character Playbook is a digital education resource that helps middle school students learn how to cultivate and maintain healthy relationships. Powered by learning innovator EVERFI, Inc. and presented by the NFL and United Way Worldwide, the program has reached over one million students since its launch in 2016.

Designed for grades six through 12, Character Playbook is composed of two module-based experiential learning courses: **Healthy Relationships** and **Mental Wellness Basics**. Together, these virtual learning experiences equip students with tools to help address their interpersonal relationships and mental well-being on a foundational level. The program is available to U.S. schools at no cost and has been implemented in over 12,000 schools nationwide.

The NFL and United Way have consistently risen to meet the increasing demand for character education, especially amid the COVID-19 pandemic. With widespread school closures that began in mid-March 2020, students and schools continued to access and benefit from Character Playbook's free educational resources. Nearly 260,000 students completed over 460,000 hours of learning during the 2020-2021 academic year, with almost 1,500 more schools leveraging the program.

INSIDEOUT

The InSideOut Initiative is an evidence-based, systems-level approach that aligns school communities around the value of purpose-based sports, connecting student-athletes to transformational coaches and a culture of belonging for their social-emotional and character development.

Now in its 6th year, the InSideOut Initiative continues to develop and implement effective strategies and publish its evidenced-based findings as it helps reclaim the educational and social-emotional value of youth and high school sports.

As the pandemic continued through 2021, the InSideOut Initiative provided professional development to thousands of educational leaders, athletic administrators and coaches through multimedia outreach that included Zoom trainings, course development, website posts, email outreach and social media strategies.

FLAG-IN-SCHOOLS

With a renewed commitment of \$1.5 million from the NFL Foundation, the NFL, **GENYOUth**, **Fuel Up to Play 60** and **Reigning Champs Experiences (RCX)** were able to extend GENYOUth's NFL FLAG-In-Schools (FIS) national program. Since 2014, NFL FIS has provided a total of 28,000 kits to U.S. schools, helping an estimated 15 million students become more active before, during and after school.

NFL FIS came at a critical time as COVID-related school disruptions left millions of kids at home and severely limited their access to sports, increasing the level of interest in turn-key solutions for student engagement in physical activity. Scalable and sustainable, NFL FLAG-In-Schools is a proven resource that inspires boys and girls to participate in school-based sports.

The program's positive impact on girls has been especially significant with schools reporting increased female students' participation in physical activity, and even a movement toward girls flag as a varsity sport due to NFL FIS.

NERF BELTS AND FOOTBALLS

Global play and entertainment company Hasbro, Inc. supplied iconic NERF footballs and flag belts to the NFL FIS kits, infusing the equipment with a new level of flexibility, size and softness.

CURRICULUM ENHANCEMENTS

30 new online videos were made available to teach students the fundamentals of flag football and provide nutritional tips.

A dual English-Spanish language "Rules of the Game" resource was introduced in conjunction with the NFL's celebration of Spanish Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, helping more parents familiarize themselves with the NFL FIS program.

EXPANDED PROGRAM REACH

NFL FIS continued to support the Boys and Girls Clubs of America (BGCA), providing kits to nearly 200 clubs selected by BGCA on Native Lands and introducing 90,000 Native youth in American Indian, Alaskan Native, American Samoan and Hawaiian tribal communities to flag football.

NFL FIS forged a three-year partnership with Special Olympics, which will provide kits to Special Olympics Unified Sports coaches and Unified physical education teachers who offer flag football instruction within Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools.



FIELD GRANTS

The NFL Foundation/Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) Grassroots Field Grant Program—a partnership of the NFL Foundation and LISC, the nation's leading community development support organization—bestowed grants totaling \$6 million to community organizations, schools and parks in 30 cities and towns across the country.

This marked the most awards given in a single year since the NFL Foundation/LISC Grassroots Field Grant Program began in 1998, bringing the program's total commitment to \$58 million, resulting in the creation or refurbishment of 416 fields nationwide.

LISC identifies local, nonprofit and community-based agencies that have an interest in building or refurbishing football fields in schools and neighborhood parks. Through the program, the local agencies are provided with the necessary financing and technical assistance to improve the quality and safety of fields in their communities. The agencies oversee the construction, maintenance and programming of the fields.

The fields are newly built or significantly renovated, with improvements such as irrigation systems, lights, bleachers, scoreboards, goal posts and turf. Grassroots grants are issued once established funding thresholds are reached for each project.

Game-used and game-issued items are featured on the site so that money can be raised for charitable partners. NFL Auction plays a key role in the NFL's Crucial Catch cancer awareness, Salute to Service military appreciation and My Cause My Cleats player cause campaigns. In 2021, NFL Auction raised more than \$1.5 million for these causes.

The NFL does not profit from the sale or auction of items, packages or experiences on the NFL Auction platform. Charitable contributions are awarded by the NFL Foundation to the NFL's nonprofit partners, including the American Cancer Society, USO, Wounded Warrior Project, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, NFL Player Care Foundation, and many team and player charities. This has included more than \$8.5 million in charitable contributions made over the past seven years.

NFL Auction also provides a fundraising platform when disasters strike. After the devastation in New Orleans from Hurricane Ida, the Green Bay Packers and New Orleans Saints teamed up to fundraise. Select game-worn jerseys from each team, along with a curation of signed memorabilia, were auctioned off following Week 1. The auction raised nearly \$150,000 for local hurricane relief efforts in Louisiana.

Thousands of children across 57 youth football organizations in high-need communities spanning 30 states now have the opportunity to enjoy the fun and fitness of football through this partnership and its awarded equipment packages.

USA Football and Good Sports' partnership represents an expansion of USA Football's annual grant program, which awarded more than \$2 million in equipment and other resources to youth football programs in 2021.

USA Football's Football Development Model is a new approach to youth football. It's designed to help coaches teach athletes based on their age, the skill they are learning and game type. Like many sports, football has changed and evolved over time. Regardless of challenges it has faced, the sport remains "America's game," with millions of young athletes participating nationwide.

Each year, the 32 NFL clubs nominate a deserving high school football coach from their market as their Coach of the Year.

All Don Shula Award nominees were again invited to attend the **2022 Pro Bowl** in Las Vegas and were recognized in special ways during the NFL's week-long celebration of football.

This year's winner, **COACH BOB PALKO** from Mt. Lebanon High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, was announced during the 2022 Pro Bowl. Coach Palko not only led his team to a 15-0 record and a State Championship, but his program also has a 100% graduation rate among players and the team gives back to their school and community through volunteerism and support of charitable causes.

With the continued impact of COVID-19, the NFL and its PLAY 60 partners—including Fuel Up to Play 60, the American Heart Association (AHA), GoNoodle and Special Olympics—have teamed up to provide parents, teachers and students with free digital resources to stay physically active and healthy. Despite delays of reopening in-person sports events across the country due to the pandemic, the NFL, Special Olympics and NFL clubs found innovative ways to provide resources to Special Olympics athletes across the country. This season, the NFL Foundation increased its financial support of Unified Flag Football, which added crucial funding to local Special Olympics Programs that had been hit hard financially due to COVID-19.

Research conducted by **The Cooper Institute** through its **NFL PLAY 60 FitnessGram Project** revealed annual improvements in aerobic capacity and body mass index for students participating in NFL PLAY 60 programming when compared to schools not utilizing NFL PLAY 60 programs.



HEALTHY LIVING GRANTS

The NFL Foundation encourages active and healthy living by providing grants to the American Heart Association and The Cooper Institute. These grants power the NFL PLAY 60 initiative. NFL clubs also receive grants from the NFL Foundation to fund NFL PLAY 60 programs in their areas.

ST. JUDE CHILDREN'S RESEARCH HOSPITAL®

NFL PLAY 60 is the "Official Champion of Play" at **St. Jude Children's Research Hospital**", which is leading the way the world understands, treats, and defeats childhood cancer and other life-threatening diseases.

Since 2015, NFL Network personality RICH EISEN has capped off the NFL Scouting Combine Presented by Verizon with his signature 40-yard dash in a suit for the "Run Rich Run" charitable campaign in support of St. Jude Research Hospital. Eisen completed his first ever dash at the 2021 NFL Draft and this year he will compete in Run Rich Run leading up to the 2022 NFL Draft.

2021 NFL DRAFT WEEK

From local efforts to fight hunger, to youth football events and character-building initiatives, to community greening projects, the NFL left a lasting, positive legacy in Cleveland and throughout Ohio during **2021 NFL Draft Week**.

DRAFT-A-THON

The 2021 Draft-a-Thon drove awareness and action, working to close critical gaps at the intersection of pandemic recovery and social wellbeing in the hardest hit communities. Draft-a-Thon raised funds on behalf of four national nonprofit organizations that support underserved communities in these areas: the digital divide in education, health disparities, food insecurity and mental health. The CDC Foundation, The Education Trust, Feeding America and Mental Health America were all beneficiaries of this year's Draft-a-Thon, which raised nearly \$700,000.



INSPIRE CHANGE HUDDLE LEGACY PROGRAM

The Cleveland Public Library hosted the kickoff of the Inspire Change Huddle Legacy Program, a season-long commitment to help close the digital divide. As part of the program, the NFL Foundation and Cisco each donated \$75,000 to The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland and the Cleveland Public Library Foundation. The donations allowed for upgraded technology for children's programming at the Cleveland Public Library and created new technology justice hubs for families with children to access Legal Aid's services while at library branches.

GREATER CLEVELAND FOOD BANK

To kick off the week, the NFL partnered with the **Greater Cleveland Food Bank** to fight food insecurity by making a \$35,000 donation and handing out NFL-themed items to those who came to receive fresh produce and shelf-stable food.

NFL-DRAFT YWCA RACIAL EQUITY AND SOCIAL JUSTICE CHALLENGE

In advance of the Draft, the NFL worked with the YWCA of Greater Cleveland to curate a 21-day challenge. Members of the NFL family participated in the challenge by listening to podcasts, reading articles and watching videos to deepen their understanding of topics such as racism and identity, systemic racism and intersectionality.

2021 NFL KICKOFF WEEK

In the lead up to the Dallas-Tampa Bay Kickoff Game in Tampa, the NFL hosted a series of community and service events to celebrate the start of the season. With events including local efforts to fight hunger, honoring military members and community greening projects, the NFL united and strengthened the community, leaving a lasting, positive impact on Tampa and its surrounding areas.

SEPTEMBER 11TH

As the League kicked off its 102nd season, the NFL family joined together to recognize the 20th anniversary of the tragic events of September 11, 2001, and honor those who have lost and sacrificed their lives over the last two decades. The NFL pledged its continued commitment to **Tuesday's Children**, which works to ensure that families who have suffered losses due to the events of 9/11, post-9/11 military service, or other acts of mass violence and terrorism always have a comforting place to turn to for support and community. Tuesday's Children helped the NFL identify families to honor instadium during the game.

INSPIRE CHANGE HUDDLE LEGACY PROGRAM

The Inspire Change Huddle Legacy Program honored the League's commitment to helping close the digital divide. As part of the program, the NFL Foundation and Cisco each donated \$75,000 to Safe & Sound Hillsborough. The donation helped to fund technology infrastructure at the reporting center and support online STEM curriculum for the youth.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES DROP-OFF

The NFL worked with **The Crisis Center of Tampa Bay** and **The Spring of Tampa Bay** to drop off backpacks full of school supplies, allowing both organizations to directly support families in the Tampa Bay community.

SALUTE TO SERVICE

To honor military members and their families, the NFL, Tampa Bay Sports Commission and FORCE BLUE hosted a Salute to Service event to share the documentary, 100 Yards of Hope, with hundreds of Tampa Bay service members. The film focuses on the collective partnership between the NFL, special operations military divers, scientists and natural resource managers who came together to restore a football field-sized coral reef for Super Bowl LVI and LV.

The NFL and United Service Organizations (USO) also hosted an event inside of the NFL Kickoff Experience that invited fans to prepare care packages for service members.

HUDDLES TO TACKLE HUNGER

Ahead of Kickoff, the NFL worked with Feeding Tampa Bay (FTB) to host two Huddle to Tackle Hunger events. These built upon the initial program that was launched at Super Bowl LV, where the NFL Foundation made a \$250,000 donation to FTB to combat food insecurity in the region—an issue that has been exacerbated by the pandemic. The events were hosted at FTB's Trinity Café locations as a part of its daily commitment to serve food to those in need. NFL Legends were on site to help hand out healthy meals and NFL-branded merchandise.

From a park refurbishment project to flag football games and greening projects, thousands of local children and their families were able to experience the positive impact and community spirit of the NFL.

PRO BOWL COMMUNITY DAY

NFL Legends participated in hands-on volunteering activities alongside local youth for Pro Bowl Community Day. Activities included refurbishing Wells Park by painting graffitied picnic tables, planting trees and contributing to a community mural. Other activities included packing care bags for community members impacted by domestic violence and sexual assault, as well as writing positive messages as part of an allyship wall that promotes acceptance and inclusion for the LGBTQ+ community.



INSPIRE CHANGE HUDDLE LEGACY PROGRAM

To help close the digital divide through the continuation of the NFL Foundation's Inspire Change Huddle Legacy Program, the NFL partnered with Comp-U-Dopt—with support of the Latin Chamber of Commerce Nevada Inc.—to provide laptops, technical support and digital literacy curriculum to more than 200 Latinx families in need. The event aimed to break down barriers to education, particularly for individuals who speak English as a second language.

SUPER BOWL LVI WEEK



Super Bowl LVI left a positive impact on Los Angeles with more than 30 charitable activities and community outreach events to enrich the community and provide lasting legacies long after the game was over.

Super Bowl Week activities included community projects made possible by NFL Foundation Super Bowl Legacy Grants and the Super Bowl LVI Host Committee, community greening projects, Salute to Service events to honor our military and veterans, and NFL PLAY 60 Kids Day.

SUPER BOWL LEGACY GRANT

Each year the NFL, via the NFL Foundation, seeks to leave a lasting legacy in the Super Bowl host community through its Super Bowl Legacy Grant initiative. A \$1 million grant is matched by the Super Bowl Host Committee and allocated to nonprofit organizations in the surrounding community. This year, the Super Bowl LVI Legacy Grant Program—Champions Live Here—recognized 56 "unsung hero" grassroots organizations through grant assistance and other support for making a transformative impact in their communities. Each organization received a \$10,000 grant, professionally produced marketing videos and public recognition of their work. Six of these organizations received a total grant award of \$50,000 to make an even bigger impact in their community.

SALUTE TO SERVICE

With support from an NFL and Bob Woodruff Foundation Salute to Service Grant, Move United launched the first ever USA Wheelchair Football League for athletes with disabilities, including veterans. The NFL was proud to host a tournament and Championship Game during Super Bowl Week.

With a visit to **Joint Forces Training Base Los Alamitos**, NFL representatives and players were able to personally interact with the pilots and service members who performed the Super Bowl flyover and thank them for their service to our country.





INSPIRE CHANGE

As part of the ongoing social justice work through its **Inspire Change** initiative, the **NFL Foundation** joined **Cisco** to address the digital divide for the children of incarcerated parents, as part of the season-long **NFL Foundation's Inspire Change Huddle Legacy Program**.

Working with nonprofits the **Anti Recidivism Coalition** and **The Place 4 Grace**, the NFL and Cisco provided funding to outfit 30 children with much-needed technology at home, including computers, WiFi hotspots, tablets and more. The contribution, which was part of the NFL Foundation and Cisco's \$150,000 donation to address the digital divide in Los Angeles, not only improved the kids' learning at home, but also provided them with the tools they need to virtually connect with their incarcerated parents on an on-going basis.

As part of the initiative, these children took part in a special event at the **NFL Network** studios, where they recorded messages on-set with the help of NFL Network talent, and were surprised with a video compilation from their parents.

PLAY 60 KIDS DAY

In celebration of the 15th anniversary of the NFL PLAY 60 initiative, the NFL hosted NFL PLAY 60 Kids Day: Huddle Up to Make A Difference at Edward Vincent Park. Nearly 600 local **Inglewood Unified School District** students had the opportunity to participate in this festival-style event centered around youth health and wellness and community impact. The event included fun-filled activities for kids to get active as well as opportunities for them to give back to their local community on key causes important to the NFL and the City of Los Angeles. Students participated in packing 1,000 care bags in support of a local nonprofit Peace Over Violence, a garden restoration and tree planting project hosted by the American Heart Association and the NFL, a PLAY 60 fitness zone area, and painting a mural alongside a local Inglewood artist.

MAKE-A-WISH®

As one of the longest-standing partners of **Make-A-Wish**, the NFL helped celebrate 40 years of partnership together by working to grant the wishes of 15 children with critical illnesses to attend Super Bowl LVI in Los Angeles.

CELEBRATION OF PRIDE & ALLYSHIP

The NFL celebrated the LGBTQ+ community and recognized the importance of allyship together with Covenant House of California and the LGBT Center. NFL players joined the celebration and delivered notes of allyship and support for the LGBTQ+ community that were completed by players throughout the League.



BUSINESS CONNECT CELEBRATION

For 18 months, the **NFL Business Connect** program worked with 225 local diverse business owners in Los Angeles to prepare them to compete for and win contracts related to Super Bowl LVI. The program hosted professional development workshops and networking events designed to grow the business acumen of women, minority, veteran and LGBTQ+-owned businesses.

DUI PREVENTION

The NFL is proud to team up with Mothers Against Drunk Driving[®] (MADD) for the 12th season. Together, the organizations are working to educate players and fans that the most valuable position is the designated driver.



Drunk driving is the biggest killer on America's roads, causing more than 11,000 deaths and 300,000 injuries every year. Countless more lives are changed forever. All these tragedies are 100% preventable. MADD is zeroing in on a day when there are No More Victims* of impaired driving. Through education and awareness campaigns and new advancements in auto technology, the end of drunk and drugged driving is closer than ever.

Since 2015, MADD and the NFL have engaged more than one million NFL fans to take the Most Valuable Position (MVP) pledge to be a non-drinking designated driver. Together, the organizations have also been able to inspire players and team staff through meaningful discussions, training and impact stories to make safe choices that protect themselves and others from the consequences of driving impaired. In addition, MADD has been there to support players, staff and their communities when lives have been changed because of an impaired driving crash.

This partnership focuses on MADD's lifesaving message, "If you drink, don't drive." MADD remains focused on one number: ZERO. Together with the NFL and the fans, MADD is creating a nation of zero deaths, zero injuries, zero families impacted by impaired driving.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE / SEXUAL ASSAULT

The NFL is committed to addressing and preventing domestic violence and sexual assault. Through national and local partnerships, the NFL works year-round to provide resources to educate communities and support survivors. During Super Bowl Week, the NFL also works annually to recognize and assist local domestic violence and sexual assault resources through its **Unsung Heroes Gathering**. At the 2022 gathering, attendees enjoyed brunch and took part in painting activities to benefit a local domestic violence shelter, while hearing words of support from **COMMISSIONER GOODELL**, NFL players and inspirational speakers.

NFL clubs continue to work in their communities on efforts including abuse intervention programs, crisis center fundraisers, high school healthy relationship assemblies and local public service campaigns.

ADDRESSING & PREVENTING RELATIONSHIP VIOLENCE

Since 2014, the NFL has provided financial support to the **National Domestic Violence Hotline (The Hotline)** in its mission to shift power back to people affected by relationship abuse. The Hotline remains the only national, 24-hour, year-round resource for survivors offering services via call, chat and text.

In addition to intervention services, the organization is leading the way on preventing relationship abuse with **love is respect**, an initiative that engages, educates and empowers young people to prevent and end abusive relationships. It is the first 24-hour national resource for teens and is a safe, inclusive space where young people can access information and get help in an envi- ronment designed specifically for them.

Support from the NFL continued to make a positive impact at The Hotline. The Hotline answered 408,370 calls, online chats and text messages from people across the country. The Hotline also advocates for strong survivorcentered policies and legislation, including the passage of the reauthorized Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and the Family Violence Prevention Services Act. Financial support provided by the NFL helped The Hotline further its policy work in Washington, D.C., helping to shape the way government, communities and providers approach this issue and best serve survivors.

Finally, support from the NFL helped advocates offer 208,765 referrals to shelter and domestic violence service providers and 192,898 referrals to additional resources across the nation.

RALIANCE

The NFL continues to support **RALIANCE**, a trusted adviser for organizations committed to building cultures that are equitable, respectful and safe. RALIANCE offers unparalleled expertise in serving survivors of sexual harassment, misconduct and abuse, which drives its mission to help organizations across sectors create inclusive environments for all.

Every day, RALIANCE helps organizations establish safer workplaces and communities by supporting innovative prevention programs and providing expert consulting services such as organizational assessment, policy review, customized trainings, internal auditing and crisis communications guidance. RALIANCE helped expand resources for businesses and organizations, including co-publishing *The New World of Work*, a report on how employers have adapted due to COVID-19 with insights on how to address and prevent workplace harassment.

RALIANCE continued to engage the sport community as a partner in ending sexual violence, including highlighting best practices in preventing sexual violence in sport at the National Conference on Health and Domestic Violence and the American Public Health Association Conference. In addition, RALIANCE supported the passage of the Ending Forced Arbitration of Sexual Assault and Sexual

Harassment Act. This included organizing a sign-on letter with seven other national groups, securing 64 signers and briefing Senate Judiciary staff.

With the NFL's support since 2016, RALIANCE has awarded nearly \$3 million in one-year grants to prevention programs and projects that advance policy and practices in support of survivors and make communities safer. RALIANCE uses an intersectional approach to prevention, therefore the majority of the 68 projects funded to date have been awarded to programs serving people of color, LGBTQ+ communities, people with disabilities, religious minorities, immigrants, young people and others who often are heavily impacted by sexual violence and yet historically overlooked by funders.

TRAFFICKING PREVENTION

Human and sex trafficking are issues that the NFL works to address, particularly as it relates to Super Bowl host cities. Each year, the Super Bowl Host Committee selects a local organization to head up trafficking awareness and prevention work in advance of Super Bowl. The NFL provides financial support to the selected organization, which then coordinates all ongoing efforts between nonprofits, law enforcement, and the hospitality and transportation industries, among others.

The Los Angeles Super Bowl LVI Host Committee selected the U.S. Institute Against Human Trafficking (USIAHT) to head up trafficking prevention and awareness work in the region ahead of Super Bowl. USIAHT assembled the Alliance Against Human Trafficking & Exploitation to raise awareness, offer community trainings, provide victim services and coordinate with local law enforcement agencies in Los Angeles. The Alliance is made up of the following organizations: It's A Penalty, A21, Inner City Visions and kNot Today. The Alliance worked jointly with the South Los Angeles Anti-Trafficking Committee (SLAATC), comprised of many local Los Angeles nonprofits, to educate the public on the warning signs of human trafficking, empowering them to report suspicious activity and provide resources to victims and those most vulnerable to exploitation.

EMPLOYEE RESOURCE GROUPS & EMPLOYEE INTEREST GROUPS



APEX

Asian Professional Exchange (APEX) is an NFL Employee Affinity Group open to all NFL employees. APEX aims to serve as a bridge between the AAPI community, AAPI employees and allies, adjacent NFL affinity groups, and the NFL's corporate culture and brand.

PIN

The Parents Initiative Network (PIN) is a parenthood community dedicated to fostering unbiased inclusion, transparency and support for working parents within the NFL.

PRIDE

NFL Pride is an employee resource group that aims to heighten the visibility of the LGBTQ+ community in the NFL offices so that employees of all sexual orientations feel comfortable being themselves in the workplace. Through networking events, guest speakers, community outreach and employee education, NFL Pride serves LGBTQ+ employees and their "allies" who support a culture of inclusion.



NFL Women's Interactive Network (WIN) aims to empower and inspire those within the NFL dedicated to the professional development and advancement of women, while deepening the engagement of all employees at the League.

BEN

Black Engagement Network (BEN) is an employee affinity group established to develop, acquire and retain Black talent at the NFL while also serving as an employee resource group for League leadership. BEN's mission is to create a diverse and inclusive culture within the NFL for employees at every level and strengthen the NFL's commitment to Black employees through professional development, career management, mentoring, networking and community outreach.

LIGA

LIGA is a coalition of employees focused on supporting the engagement and professional development of Latinx employees at the NFL while bringing a greater understanding and appreciation of the Latinx community to NFL employees of all walks of life. By facilitating discussions around cultural inclusivity and important diversity issues, LIGA hopes to identify opportunities that expand on the NFL's positive work environment while celebrating the richness of Latinx cultural diversity and driving cultural engagement.

COMMUNITY TEAMMATES

Community Teammates is a cross-departmental affinity group of employees dedicated to volunteering together in their communities. Its mission is to build a culture of community service and volunteerism at the NFL in order to enhance meaningful team building, company morale and impact.

GREEN TEAM

The Green Team helps to lead the charge in environmental stewardship at the NFL, creating a strong culture of sustainability and awareness of environmental impact.





WOMEN'S FORUM

The NFL virtually hosted its sixth annual **Women's Forum** as part of its ongoing, League-wide commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion. The Forum connected 45 women, 64% of whom are women of color, with leaders in the professional football space to provide insight and opportunities into open positions, as well as coaching, scouting and football operations.

The Women's Forum aims to connect female participants with leaders in professional football. There have been 23 NFL clubs that have hired past Forum participants and over 200 opportunities have emerged for women in all levels of football since its inception in 2017.

For the second consecutive year, participants took part in the two-day virtual event. This included panel discussions, breakout sessions and networking activities with owners, executives, coaches, industry experts and hiring managers representing organizations including the NFL and Women Leaders in College Sports. Most participants who attended the forum work in entry-level college football roles and learned what could be next for them in a career in professional football.

SUPPORTING THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY

The NFL supports **The Trevor Project**, a nonprofit organization whose mission is to end suicide among lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and questioning (LGBTQ) young people. NFL funding has supported The Trevor Project in the scaling and growth of its crisis intervention services and suicide prevention programming, enabling the organization to provide more LGBTQ youth with life-affirming support.

Another partner the NFL works with to enhance its efforts in the LGBTQ+ space is **GLAAD**, an American non-governmental media monitoring organization that was founded as a protest against defamatory coverage of LGBT people. This year, during **Super Bowl Week**, the NFL and GLAAD teamed up for 'A **Night of Pride with GLAAD**,' which provided an evening of music, cocktails and conversations to spotlight advances in—and the future of—LGBTQ+ inclusion in professional sports, as well as the NFL's commitment to LGBTQ+ former and current players.

At NFL tentpole events throughout the season, the League consults and works with a variety of organizations—both local and national—that are focused on providing an inclusive, positive environment for the LGBTQ+ community.





RESPONSIBLE GAMBLING


During the 2021 season, the NFL launched an extensive, integrated Leaguewide responsible betting public awareness program designed to educate fans who choose to engage in sports betting to do so responsibly. The key message encourages people to play responsibly by sticking to a game plan, including setting a budget to know their limits, using licensed, regulated operators, and asking for help if they need it.

As part of the initiative, the NFL made a multimillion-dollar, multi-year commitment to significantly expand its long-standing partnership with the **National Council on Problem Gambling (NCPG)**, the leading advocacy group committed to addressing problem gambling through public education programs and help services. The NFL's funding enabled the NCPG to launch a national grant program to fund enhanced services offered by local and statewide providers, as well as innovative prevention programs, including expansion of youth-facing curricula.

The League's support also helped transform the national problem gambling **Helpline** system and allowed for the development of improved communications tools, including a new website, **www.responsibleplay.org**, which provides the public with quick tips about betting safely and support resources for those in need.

NFL GREEN

NFL Green is the League's environmental program and works to mitigate the environmental impact of the NFL's major events and create a "green" legacy in each community that hosts the NFL's biggest events.





2021 NFL DRAFT WEEK

NFL Green, in partnership with the Greater Cleveland Sports Commission, planted trees, built community gardens, donated unserved food, repurposed event materials and supported a harbor cleanup during 202 NFL Draft Week. NFL Green also premiered the 100 Yards of Hope Coral Reef Restoration documentary virtually with the Greater Cleveland Aquarium.

2021 KICKOFF WEEK

As a follow-up event to Super Bowl LV, the NFL began 2021 Kickoff Week by celebrating the Passing of the Golden Shovel from Tampa to Los Angeles, which further progressed its dedication to sustainability across the country. NFL Green worked alongside Verizon, Keep Tampa Bay Beautiful, The Tampa Bay Estuary Program and the Tampa Bay Sports Commission to restore and plant sand dunes on Picnic Island.

Together, the partners also built and installed a hydroponic garden and pollinator gardens at the Forest Hills Park Community Center. In addition, NFL Green teamed up with FORCE BLUE, Pepsi Stronger Together, Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission, NAUI, Keep Florida Beautiful and The Florida Aquarium for a marine debris and ghost fishing gear removal operation, as well as a pier cleanup at Anna Maria Island.



2022 PRO BOWL WEEK

The NFL kicked off Pro Bowl Week with the NFL Green Wetlands Restoration Project. Together with Clark County, the NFL worked to revitalize portions of the Clark County Wetlands Park by planting 1,200 trees and native plants with students and community volunteers.

NFL GREEN EVENTS INCLUDED:

- Swag for Seedlings: NFL Green and Verizon partnered with the White Mountain Apache Forestry Teams to plant 5,000 trees to reforest areas damaged by wildfire. Fans at Allegiant Stadium and the Las Vegas Ballpark who showed their team spirit and wore team swag had the opportunity to have trees planted in their honor.
- Food Recovery: The NFL teamed with Three Square to recover unserved, prepared food and beverages from Pro Bowl events to minimize food waste.
- Material Recovery: An intensive drive was held to collect and donate all items left over from Pro Bowl events. In partnership with the Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity and other local organizations, the NFL donated decorative materials, office supplies and other items that could be reused or repurposed.
- Renewable Energy Project: Emissions from energy use at Allegiant Stadium were offset using renewable energy certificates (RECs).



SUPER BOWL LVI WEEK

The NFL, the Los Angeles Super Bowl LVI Host Committee and Verizon teamed up to develop a series of initiatives to reduce the environmental impact of Super Bowl LVI and create a "green" legacy in the greater Los Angeles area. The focus was on increasing tree canopy to provide shade, beauty and improve air quality, building community gardens to increase food security, and restoring a kelp forest off California's coast.

COMMUNITY GREENING EVENTS

- NFL Green Huddle consisted of building and planting vegetable garden beds and installing garden walls.
 Garden wall kits, soil and vegetable plants were also given to families enrolled in A Place Called Home's urban agriculture program.
- 56 trees were planted and beautification projects were completed at Edward Vincent Junior Park in partnership with the City of Inglewood Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department.
- In partnership with Los Angeles County Supervisor
 HILDA L. SOLIS, dozens of trees and a large vertical
 wall garden were planted at CultivaLA's Westlake
 Community Garden to provide fruit, vegetables and
 herbs to a neighborhood that had been highly impacted
 by Covid-19.
- The Mott Street Community Garden in the Boyle
 Heights neighborhood was refurbished and expanded in
 partnership with the LA Conservation Corps.

- In partnership with California Greenworks, 25 Brisbane Box trees and Australian Willows were planted along the north side of Jefferson Boulevard to increase tree canopy, provide shade and improve air quality in the neighborhood.
- 30 evergreen trees were planted along Huntington Street in the City of San Fernando to provide critical public health and environmental benefits, in partnership with TreePeople.
- Dozens of street trees were planted in the Watts
 neighborhood to add shade, beauty and additional tree
 canopy, in partnership with TreePeople.
- A large California Oak "Wishing Tree" was planted at Wishing Tree Park in West Carson as part of an initiative to create much needed greenspace in the neighborhood in partnership with the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust.
- A garden revitalization project took place in partnership with the City of Inglewood Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department to replace soil and plant garden beds, plant trees, paint, clean and beautify Queen Park Community Garden.

REFORESTATION

NFL sustainability partner **Verizon** planted 5,600 trees (100 trees for each Super Bowl) in the **Angeles** and **Los Padres National Forests**. The project was focused on reestablishing native ecosystems, and the recovery of lands and watersheds damaged by wildfire.

FORCE BLUE CHAMPIONSHIP DIVE

NFL Green and the Los Angeles Super Bowl Host Committee teamed up with Pepsi Stronger Together, PepsiCo VALOR, special operations veterans from FORCE BLUE, scientists and researchers from the Bay Foundation and the Cabrillo Marine Aquarium—as well as commercial urchin harvesters, local volunteers and Environmental Charter Middle School students—for a kelp restoration project and beach cleanup at Cabrillo Beach.



SUPER KIDS-SUPER SHARING

NFL Green, the YMCA of Metropolitan Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Super Bowl Host Committee, Verizon, the Los Angeles Rams and the Los Angeles Chargers teamed up with local schools and YMCA-LA branches for Super Kids-Super Sharing, where 22,000 books, pieces of sports equipment, school supplies and games were donated to local children.

ADDITIONAL NFL GREEN PROJECTS INCLUDED:

- Green and Win: Fans caught in the act of recycling were able to win a unique Super Bowl hat and have their photos posted on NFL social media.
- Food Recovery and Donation: Prepared, unserved food from Super Bowl events was recovered and distributed to shelters and feeding programs in partnership with the Los Angeles Food Bank and Los Angeles Mission
- Material Recovery: An intensive drive was held to
 collect and donate items from the Super Bowl, including
 building materials, décor fabric, carpeting and sign
 materials. In partnership with the Salvation Army, these
 items were donated to local organizations to reuse,
 repurpose or remanufacture the material.
- Green Energy: "Green" energy was used to power major Super Bowl event venues, including SoFi Stadium, the AFC and NFC team hotels, and the NFL headquarters hotel. Renewable energy certificates (RECs) equivalent to the electricity usage at these facilities helped to mitigate the climate impact of energy emissions.







PLAYER HEALTH AND SAFETY

HOW THE NFL IS ADVANCING PLAYER HEALTH AND SAFETY



The National Football League is committed to advancing progress in the diagnosis, prevention and treatment of sports-related injuries, enhancing medical protocols, improving how the game is taught and played, and protecting players' overall health, safety and wellbeing.

PLAYER HEALTH AND WELLNESS

The NFL continues to make changes on and off the field to protect the health and safety of every player.

CARING FOR PLAYERS ON GAME DAY

On average, there are 30 healthcare providers at a stadium on game day to provide immediate care to players, including:

- » Unaffiliated Neurotrauma Consultant: Three credentialed neurotrauma consultants, who are unaffiliated with either team, staff the sidelines, monitor the broadcast of the game, and work with the team medical staffs to identify, screen for and diagnose concussions.
- » Visiting Team Medical Liaisons: When traveling across state lines, every visiting team is required to retain a local board-certified and locally licensed emergency physician, who is typically affiliated with the trauma center nearest the NFL stadium.
- » Booth ATC Spotters and the Medical Timeout: For all NFL games, two certified athletic trainers retained by the league and unaffiliated with any NFL teams observe the game from a booth above the field and monitor the broadcast to identify potential injuries, especially concussions and other head and neck injuries. The booth ATC spotter has the authority to call a medical timeout to permit the medical evaluation of a player who may have suffered a concussion or head injury.

NFL CONCUSSION PROTOCOL

NFL medical professionals follow the NFL Concussion Protocol when identifying, diagnosing and treating player concussions. The Concussion Protocol, developed in 2011, is reviewed and revised each year to ensure that care reflects the most up-to-date medical information.

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To ensure consistent implementation of the protocol, the NFL and NFLPA developed an enforcement policy, which includes a process to investigate clubs that fail to follow the protocol and determine appropriate discipline - including fines and possible forfeiture of draft picks.

NFL RETURN-TO-PARTICIPATION PROTOCOL

The NFL and NFLPA established a five-step process that every NFL player diagnosed with a concussion must follow before being cleared to fully practice or participate in an NFL game. After a player goes through the process and is cleared for full participation by his club physician, he must also be cleared by an Independent Neurological Consultant, who is jointly approved by the NFL and NFLPA and who is not affiliated with any NFL club. Until a player is cleared by this independent physician, he may not return to contact practice or play in an NFL game.

NFL MEDICAL COMMITTEES

The NFL is advised by many of the world's preeminent experts in medicine and science. NFL medical committees frequently review player health and injury data and recommend policies, programs and protocols for the League. An overarching Health and Safety Committee—including chairs of the General Medical Committee, the Head, Neck and Spine Committee and the Musculoskeletal Committee—oversees committee efforts and facilitates collaboration among subject matter experts, team physicians and athletic trainers. The NFL also works closely with the NFLPA and its medical advisors on player health and safety issues. More information on NFL Medical Committees and their membership can be found here.

MEDICAL RESEARCH

The NFL supports preeminent experts and institutions in their research on the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of sports-related injuries and other issues affecting NFL players' health, safety and wellbeing.

- » NFL Scientific Advisory Board: In 2016, the NFL allotted \$40 million for medical research primarily dedicated to neuroscience. The NFL assembled a Scientific Advisory Board (\$AB)-chaired by Peter Chiarelli, U.S. Army General (Retired)-comprising leading independent researchers, experts, doctors, scientists and clinicians to identify and support research proposals on the diagnosis, treatment and natural history of concussion and associated comorbid conditions.
- » In 2018, the SAB granted \$35 million in total funding to five projects for research being conducted by investigative teams related to the diagnosis, treatment, and natural history of concussion (mild traumatic brain injury) and associated comorbid conditions.
- » In July 2021, the SAB announced a four-year, \$4 million award to a team of medical researchers led by the University of Wisconsin who are investigating the prevention and treatment of hamstring injuries in elite football players.
- » The remaining \$1 million in SAB funding was awarded to two teams of medical researchers at the University of California San Diego and University of Regina in February 2022 through a separate request for proposals process for studies investigating the effects of cannabis and CBD on the pain management of elite athletes.



ADDITIONAL RESEARCH

The NFL has also allotted more than \$30 million to support brain injury research conducted by the Foundation for the National Institutes of Health (FNIH), Department of Defense, and Department of Veterans Affairs.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS

In collaboration with the NFLPA, the NFL fosters a positive culture around mental health by providing players and the NFL family with resources and tools to succeed, on and off the field, over the course of their lives.

JOINT BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGREEMENT

The Comprehensive Mental Health and Wellness Committee, which develops mental health and wellness programs and resources for players and the wider NFL family, requires each club to retain a Behavioral Health Team Clinician to support players' emotional and mental health and wellbeing.

MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES

The league provides mental wellness benefits and resources to current and former players, including:

- » Team Clinicians, who are available to players at all team facilities for at least 8-12 hours per week. Six NFL clubs currently have full-time clinicians on staff.
- » **NFL Total Wellness**, which provides wellness resources to all members of the NFL family, including education at every stage of a player's career.
- The NFL Player Care Foundation, which staffs licensed clinical social workers who provide expert consultation and help facilitate specialized treatment services for former players.
- » NFL Life Line, a free, confidential, and independently operated resource that connects current and former players with trained counselors who can help individuals work through personal or emotional crises 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.
- » Cigna Work/Life Resources Benefit, which provides active players and Legends—and their loved ones—with eight free, in-person or virtual counseling sessions per topic, per year and unlimited telephonic consulting.
- » Additional mental health benefits for qualified members of the NFL Family, including through the NFL Player Insurance Plan and the NFL Dedicated Hospital Network Program.

PAIN MANAGEMENT

The NFL-NFLPA Pain Management Committee educates players and personnel on best clinical practices in pain management, awards grant funding for research to advance understanding of alternative treatments, and sets standards for club policies regarding pain management and the use of prescription medications by NFL players.

The Pain Management Committee also focuses on finding alternatives to opioids for pain management. The Committee conducts informational forums on the state of cannabidiol science and manufacturing, and as mentioned above, awarded \$1 million in research funding in February 2022 to two teams of medical researchers at the University of California San Diego and University of Regina to study the effects of cannabis and CBD on the performance and pain management of elite athletes.



PREVENTING THE SPREAD OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE

Before the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the NFL was working with epidemiologists and infectious disease experts to prevent the spread of infection in the NFL team environment and to prepare for potential viral outbreaks. For the past two NFL seasons, the NFL, together with the National Football League Players Association (NFLPA), have worked with medical experts and clinicians to develop COVID-related player safety protocols and were able to complete the 2020 and 2021 seasons on schedule. In addition, the NFL has worked closely with the NFLPA and club medical staffs to educate and encourage players to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19, resulting in a nearly 95% vaccination rate for NFL players and nearly 100% for personnel. More information on the NFL's COVID-19 protocols can be found here.

Contributing to COVID-19 Medical Science: Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the NFL has been working in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and local public health officials to ensure the safety of NFL players, personnel and fans, and to share our learnings navigating the COVID-19 environment that can be applicable to the rest of society. In November 2021, the CDC published a case study featuring the NFL's vaccination education efforts as a success story and model for society. In January 2021, the CDC featured the NFL's mitigation, testing, and contract tracing measures in their Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, detailing how the league used data to evolve the definition of close contacts and put in place protective measures such as masking to successfully carry out the 2020 season.

DIVERSIFYING SPORTS MEDICINE:

As part of the NFL's overall commitment to ensuring that staff and leaders in the league office and at NFL clubs reflect the racial and gender makeup of America, leaders in NFL Player Health and Safety are working to diversify the pipeline of people interested in pursuing careers in sports medicine and, over time, to help diversify NFL club medical staff. These efforts include, but are not limited to, a new NFL Diversity in Sports Medicine Pipeline Initiative that will provide medical students at the four Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) medical schools with the opportunity to complete a clinical rotation with NFL club medical staff. EQUIPMENT, DATA AND INNOVATION

The NFL is championing new developments in engineering, biomechanics and material science to better protect against injuries. The league collaborates with the NFLPA and the world's foremost engineers and scientists as advisors.

LEVERAGING DATA

Data is at the heart of the NFL's decisions about player health and safety.

Injury Data: Throughout the year, comprehensive NFL player injury data is compiled and analyzed by IQVIA, an independent, third-party company that provides results to the league, the NFLPA and medical and football committees. The NFL then shares this data publicly each year. Guided by the experts at IQVIA, NFL medical committee members identify trends in how, where and when injuries happen, and assess how protocols and rules changes affect player safety. Notably, the 2021 season saw the lowest number of concussions in regular season games for the period of 2015 to 2021. The league has sustained a 25 percent reduction in concussions for each of the past four seasons (2018-2021).



- » Electronic Medical Records: Every club's medical staff has access to its players' complete medical records via the Electronic Medical Record (EMR) system. Players can access their records at any time using a secure online portal, which remains active after the player retires. The EMR system helps the league make data-driven decisions on rules changes and permissible techniques used in play.
- » Comprehensive Video Review: Each season, biomechanical engineers complete a comprehensive video review of all reported concussions sustained in NFL games. The league shares the data with helmet manufacturers, designers, innovators, entrepreneurs, universities and others to stimulate new designs for protective equipment.
- » Mouthguard Sensors to Measure On-Field Head Impacts: In 2019, the NFL introduced a novel program in which NFL players wore mouthguards retrofitted with high-tech sensors designed to collect kinematic data, including impact speed, direction, force, location and severity. As of 2022, this program includes four universities at the collegiate level: The University of Alabama, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, The University of Washington, and the University of Wisconsin. Insights gleaned from the data collected help inform the NFL's approach to injury reduction and decrease head impacts overall.
- » Taking Data to the Next Level: In 2019, the NFL partnered with Amazon Web Services to transform player health and safety using cloud computing, machine learning and artificial intelligence. The NFL and AWS are developing tools to generate better insights into injuries, specifically the impact of game rules, equipment, and rehabilitation and recovery strategies. One of the partnership's primary goals is building the capacity to predict injuries before they occur.
 - The NFL and AWS are building the Digital Athlete, a virtual representation of an NFL player using actual NFL games and data that can run infinite in-game scenarios to understand the impact on player health and safety.
 - In 2022, the NFL and AWS awarded \$100,000 to the winners of its artificial intelligence competition, which challenged data scientists to teach computers to automatically detect players involved in head impacts from NFL game footage. The groundbreaking new computer vision models further strengthen the already-robust data and insights at the heart of the NFL's effort to understand and reduce head injuries.

USING DATA TO DRIVE RULES CHANGES

The NFL improves player safety by taking a data-driven approach to eliminating potentially dangerous tactics and reducing the risk of injuries. Over the past decade, these <u>include changes</u> that protect "defenseless" players and penalize dangerous techniques and other plays, such as using the helmet as part of a bull rush.

SEASON STRUCTURE

Under the 2020 Collective Bargaining Agreement, the NFL and NFLPA agreed to a new season structure, moving from 16 regular season and four preseason games to 17 regular season and three preseason games. These adjustments to the training camp schedule aim to better prepare players for the start of the preseason and regular season. There was no substantial change in injury rates over the course of the 2021 season following the 17-3 format.



USE OF THE GUARDIAN CAP IN PRESEASON

New for the 2022 season, the NFL has mandated the use of Guardian Cap, a helmet shell add-on device that is worn over the helmet, for certain positions during every preseason practice up to the second preseason game. Engineers appointed by the NFL and NFLPA have conducted laboratory tests that found Guardian Cap results in at least a 10% reduction in severity of impact force if one player is wearing it, and at least a 20% reduction in impact force if two players in a collision are wearing it. This mandate is the latest development in the league's broader efforts to reduce head impacts.

THE ENGINEERING ROADMAP

Since 2016, the NFL has allocated over \$60 million to the creation and funding of the Engineering Roadmap. It's a comprehensive effort-funded by the NFL and managed by Football Research, Inc. (FRI)—to improve the understanding of the biomechanics of head injuries in professional football and to create incentives for helmet manufacturers, small businesses, entrepreneurs, universities and others to develop and commercialize new and improved protective equipment, including helmets.

- » HeadHealthTECH Challenges: For five years, HeadHealthTECH Challenges have attracted innovative grant proposals from institutions, individuals and corporations interested in designing the next generation of protective equipment. The Challenges are operated and managed by Duke University's Clinical and Translational Science Institute, which provides constructive feedback for all applicants. Thus far, the NFL and FRI have awarded grants totaling nearly \$3 million to help advance the development of 17 new technologies.
- The NFL Helmet Challenge: In 2019, the league launched the NFL Helmet Challenge to stimulate the development of a new helmet that outperforms all helmet models currently worn by NFL players. In 2020, the NFL and FRI awarded \$1.37 million to help four teams create their helmet prototypes to be submitted as part of the challenge. The challenge culminated in 2021 with the award of \$1.55 million in grant funding to three teams Impressio, Kollide, and Xenith to advance their innovative designs and technologies and to help get their projects on the field as soon as possible. NFL Helmet Challenge submissions achieved up to a 13% improvement above the top-performing helmet currently worn in the NFL, based on the laboratory testing the NFL and NFLPA use to test and rank helmets each year. Heading into the 2022 season, the NFL continues to work with awardees to drive forward innovation, with winning projects currently under continued development.
- » Ist and Future: From 2016 to 2021, the NFL hosted a start-up competition at the Super Bowl to drive innovation in athlete safety and performance. Innovators and entrepreneurs share technologies to improve player health and safety, including protective equipment, medical devices, sensors and training devices. Ist and Future includes an Analytics Competition that enables data scientists to analyze NFL game data and propose new ideas for reducing injuries.



EQUIPMENT TESTING AND EVALUATION

The NFL and NFLPA work together to evaluate the performance of protective equipment and to ensure players are informed about the latest advances in equipment technology when making decisions about their helmets, cleats and other equipment.

In collaboration with the NFLPA, this includes cleat evaluations conducted by the NFL Musculoskeletal Committee, helmet laboratory testing, and playing field assessments by the Field Surface Safety & Performance Committee.

SHARING PROGRESS

The NFL is committed to sharing its progress in health and safety across all levels of football, with other sports around the world and for the benefit of society at large.

This includes publishing peer-reviewed research, convening leaders in sports medicine for important conversations, sharing data and crowdsourcing new ideas.

THE NFL, IN COLLABORATION WITH THE NFLPA, THROUGH THEIR RESPECTIVE APPOINTED BIOMECHANICAL EXPERTS, ANNUALLY COORDINATE EXTENSIVE LABORATORY RESEARCH TO EVALUATE WHICH HELMETS BEST REDUCE HEAD IMPACT SEVERITY. THE RESULTS OF THOSE TESTS, WHICH ARE GENERALLY SUPPORTED BY ON-FIELD PERFORMANCE, ARE SET FORTH ON THIS POSTER.

The helmet models are listed in order of their performance, with a shorter bar representing better performance. The rankings are based exclusively on the ability of the helmet to reduce head impact severity measures in laboratory testing. Performance variation related to helmet fit, retention, temperature-dependence, and long-term durability are not addressed in these rankings.

All helmets in green are recommended for use by NFL players. Based on a statistical grouping analysis, helmets in the Top-Performing group have been further distinguished into two green categories. The dark green group represents those that performed similar to the top-performing helmets from the 2022 poster, while the light green group performed better or similar to the lowest ranked dark green helmet from the 2021 poster. Helmets with poorer laboratory performance were placed in the yellow (not recommended) or red (prohibited) groups. Helmets in the yellow group may be worn only by players who wore them during the 2021 NFL season. Players may wear helmets that are: (1) certified based on the standards established by NOCSAE (National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment); (2) less than 10 years old; and (3) not prohibited pursuant to the NFL and NFLPA's joint Helmet Laboratory Testing program. The information presented here is based solely upon the results of this research and the expert opinions of the scientists involved.

The laboratory conditions are intended to represent potentially concussive head impacts in the NFL. The results of this study should not be extrapolated to collegiate, high school, or youth football.

ENGINEERING ROADMAP



Since 2016, the NFL has allocated over \$60 million to the creation and funding of the Engineering Roadmap. It's a comprehensive effort-funded by the NFL and managed by Football Research, Inc. (FRI)—to improve the understanding of the biomechanics of head injuries in professional football and to create incentives for helmet manufacturers, small businesses, entrepreneurs, universities and others to develop and commercialize new and improved protective equipment, including helmets.


DRIVEN BY EXPERTS: BIOMECHANICAL ENGINEERS

FRI, a nonprofit corporation formed and financially supported by the NFL, manages the Engineering Roadmap. The Board of Directors includes leading engineers and experts who advise FRI on how best to advance the understanding of biomechanics in football and create an environment where new and improved protective equipment will be developed. Jeff Crandall, Ph.D., chairman of the NFL Engineering Committee, serves a leading role in managing the Engineering Roadmap. Dr. Crandall is the Nancy and Neal Wade Professor of Engineering and Applied Sciences at the University of Virginia and Principal Scientist and Consultant at Biocore. The Board also works closely with Dr. Kristy Arbogast and Dr. Barry Myers, consultants to the NFL Players Association, who each serve as co-leads on essential elements of the Engineering Roadmap.



RESEARCH: MEASURING THE ON-FIELD ENVIRONMENT AND SHARING TOOLS


The NFL is advised by many of the world's preeminent experts in medicine and football. As part of the Engineering Roadmap, biomechanical engineers completed a comprehensive video review of all reported concussions sustained in NFL games since the 2015 season to better understand concussion-causing impacts. The data is shared widely with helmet manufacturers, designers, innovators, entrepreneurs, universities and others to stimulate new ideas and designs for protective equipment. FRI has also collaborated with university partners to develop new tools to encourage innovation and advance equipment design, including finite element models of modern football helmets, impact test dummy components and test conditions simulating on-field impacts.





EDUCATION: EXPERTS AND INNOVATORS LEARNING FROM EACH OTHER

Experts share the latest knowledge regarding the causes of concussion in professional football, including the best tools available for assessing and optimizing the design and manufacturing of protective equipment. These discussions are an important step in educating and creating incentives for those in the marketplace to design and manufacture protective equipment that performs better than current models. Periodic symposia, webinars and other educational efforts allow experts to share the most up-to-date biomechanical and biomedical information.


The NFL engages experts to stimulate new developments in engineering, biomechanics and materials science designed to better protect against injuries.



» The NFL Helmet Challenge

In 2019, the league launched the two-year NFL Helmet Challenge, an innovation challenge that aims to stimulate the development by experts, innovators and helmet manufacturers of a new helmet that outperforms all helmet models currently worn by NFL players. The challenge culminated in 2021 with the award of \$1.55 million in grant funding to three teams - Impressio, Kollide, and Xenith - to advance their innovative designs and technologies and to help get their projects on the field as soon as possible. NFL Helmet Challenge submissions achieved up to a 13% improvement above the top-performing helmet currently worn in the NFL, based on the laboratory testing the NFL and NFLPA use to test and rank helmets each year. Heading into the 2022 season, the NFL continues to work with awardees to drive forward innovation, with funded projects currently under continued development.







» HeadHealthTECH Challenges

For five years, HeadHealthTECH Challenges have attracted innovative grant proposals from institutions, individuals and corporations interested in designing the next generation of protective equipment. The Challenges are operated and managed by Duke University's Clinical and Translational Science Institute, which provides constructive feedback for all applicants. Thus far, the NFL and FRI have awarded grants totaling nearly \$3 million to help advance the development of 17 new technologies.

SYMPTOM LIMITED ACTIVITY

The player is prescribed rest, limiting or, if necessary, avoiding activities (both physical and cognitive) which increase or aggravate symptoms. Under athletic training staff supervision, limited stretching and balance training can be introduced, progressing to light aerobic exercise, all as tolerated.

AEROBIC EXERCISE

Under direct oversight of the team's medical staff, the player should begin graduated cardiovascular exercise and may also engage in dynamic stretching and balance training. Neurocognitive and balance testing can be administered after completion of Phase Two and the results should be interpreted as back to baseline.





FOOTBALL-SPECIFIC EXERCISE

The player continues with supervised cardiovascular exercises that are increased and may mimic sport-specific activities, and supervised strength training is introduced. The player is allowed to practice with the team in sport-specific exercise for 30 minutes or less with ongoing and careful monitoring.

CLUB-BASED NON-CONTACT TRAINING DRILLS

The player continues cardiovascular, strength and balance training, team-based sports-specific exercise, and participates in non-contact football activities (e.g. throwing, catching, running, and other position-specific activities). Neurocognitive and balance testing should be completed no later than the end of Phase Four with the results interpreted as back to baseline.







FULL FOOTBALL ACTIVITY / CLEARANCE

Upon clearance by the Club physician for full football activity involving contact, the player must be examined by the Independent Neurological Consultant (INC) assigned to his Club. If the INC concurs with the Club physician that the player's concussion has resolved, he may participate in his Club's next practice or game.

2 ORTHOPEDISTS

Evaluate and treat players for injuries to the bones and joints



1 UNAFFILIATED NEUROTRAUMA CONSULTANT

Evaluates players for possible head injuries and concussions



1 CHIROPRACTOR

Provides back/spinal adjustments for players and treats muscular iniuries





2 INDEPENDENT ATHLETIC TRAINERS

Notify on-field medical staff of possible injuries from press box. The independent AT spotters can call a medical timeout to stop the game to have a player receive medical attention



1 VISITING TEAM MEDICAL LIAISON

Local emergency physician certified to practice medicine in the state where the game is being played. The VTML works with the team to provide access to care, medication and first-rate medical facilities



1 AIRWAY **MANAGEMENT PHYSICIAN**

Provides emergency intubation to severely injured, non-breathing players



1 RADIOLOGY **TECHNICIAN**

Takes x-rays of injured players at the stadium



2 EMTS/ **PARAMEDIC CREW**

Transport players to hospital in the event of serious injuries



1 UNAFFILIATED NEUROTRAUMA CONSULTANT

Monitors broadcast video/audio and notifies on-field UNCs of possible head, neck or spine injuries


